PREMIUM LIST

Of the Shawansee County Agricultural Association, for the Twenty-first Annual Fair, to be held on the Fair Ground, in the City of Owosso, on Tuesday, Wednesday and Thursday, September 21, 22 and 23, 1880.

GENERAL RULES.

1. All exhibitors must become members of the Society by the purchase of a membership ticket.
2. Tickets of membership one dollar each, with which will be given four admission tickets. The membership ticket will not admit to the ground. Checks or passes will be issued to each exhibitor of stock where a groom necessarily accompanies stock entered for exhibition.
3. A payment of ten dollars will procure a life membership certificate which will entitle the purchaser of the same to all the privileges of a member of the association during his or her life time.
4. There are no family or season tickets. Single tickets, twenty-five cents; children under twelve years, ten cents. No tickets will be required to enter the grounds, until the morning of the second day, when the gates will be closed.
5. Articles and animals entered for competition must be owned by the exhibitor. Entries in all departments will close at 12 o'clock m. on the second day of the fair, at which time all animals or articles for exhibition must be on the ground, and be subject to the control of the officers of the society through the fair.
6. All tickets must be purchased at the ticket office.
- No variation from the above rules will be made, except in the case of clergymen, editors, officers and executive board to whom complimentary tickets will be given. All others will be required to purchase tickets before entering the grounds.
7. Pamphlets, containing the general rules, programme, premium list, etc. for the next annual fair, will be sent by mail to all persons applying to the secretary. Tickets can be had on application to the treasurer for some weeks previous to the fair.

ENTRIES

Can be made at any time previous to the first day of the fair by applying to the secretary, at his office in Owosso, and it is earnestly requested that entries be made as early as possible.

All other entries must be made at the entry office on the fair ground, previous to 12 o'clock m., on the second day of the fair. This rule will be strictly enforced.

Entries will be received from any one who may wish simply to exhibit, and all cards given in accordance with said entries will be marked "for exhibition only."

All entry cards will contain the name of owner, number of entry and class, division and name of stock or article except in Floral and Vegetable Hall.

Rules 13 and 14, relative to Thoroughbreds.

13. Persons exhibiting thoroughbred stock shall have furnished and filed with the secretary at least ten days before the first day of the fair, satisfactory evidence of the pedigree of their animals to be supported by affidavit, so as to establish the purity of their blood.

14. All thoroughbred horses and cattle shall be shown in a ring in classes, except those animals to be shown in harness.

E. L. Brown, E. S. Burnett and E. J. Cook are appointed to act as a Financial Committee to settle accounts, purchase all necessary books, blanks, tickets and other printed matter required by the Association; also to superintend the raising of booths, hiring of police and other employees during the fair, except gate keepers, who will be hired by C. Hubbard, Superintendent of gate.

The "horse for all work" is intended to be capable of being trained for the saddle, and for the harness, and be able to go on the road or in draught, as he may chance to be broken. It may be that the "horse for all work" shall, after a few years training, make a useful, spirited, handsome family roadster, or he may be brought up to be a good draught horse, true to pull any load that is put behind him. Hence, the committee will note that he is not to be judged by the speed he may make for a single mile. It will also be noted that he must have size, action and spirit, as well as constitution, if he is worthy of a premium as a breeding animal.

National rules to govern. Any horse distancing the field will be only entitled to one premium.
