Although the machines are all charged with explosive substances, there is tolerably conclusive evidence that there was no intention on evidence that there was no intention on chief. the part of the senders that they should explode in the hold of the steamers while in transit from Boston to Liverpool. The machine is enclosed in an oblion case of zinc, of which it occupies the upper portion. There is a clock work arrangement, which, upon being set, runs about six hours, then it causes a lever to descend upon a tube bearing a cap, and communicating with the lower half of the case. The tube is filled with explosive matter, which upon being fired sets off a detonating cap placed in the middle of the dynamite compound in the bottom of the case. 


