The commission provided by the legislature last winter to revise the tax laws have agreed to report to the legislature at its first session in favor of the Ohio system, which provides for the assumption by counties of all lands delinquent for taxes and the repeal of all laws now in force relative to the assessment and collection of taxes and the return to the auditor general of delinquent taxes.

Guiteau's Trial—Attempt to Kill the Assassin.

The trial of Guiteau increases in interest daily. The prisoner has been very turbulent at times, interrupting the progress of the trial by remarks, quarreling with his counsel, and threatening to manage his case himself, and complaining because the government has not furnished him a first class criminal lawyer. Mr. Scoville gave notice that the plea of the defense would be insanity. Guiteau's letters to the president asking for a mission were read.

Dr. Bliss testified he gave a history of the lead president's case and said the wound was a mortal one. Mr. Scoville cross-examined him as to the treatment of the wound. A portion of the injured vertebrae was exhibited, and Guiteau looked at the ghastly evidence of his crime, but showed no emotion. Surgeon General Barnes, Dr. Woodward and Dr. Lamb, who conducted the autopsy, testified to the character of the president's wound, and declared that it was necessarily fatal.

The prosecution rested their case and Guiteau having permission to address the jury, said he wanted to have it shown that up to a certain time he was sane, and that he was not a dangerous man, and that he was not a murderer. In his defense, Mr. Scoville, sums up the family history, showing hereditary insanity, and Guiteau has been a violent man in his life, and that he was lacking in business ability, and that at one time physicians said he could be put into an insane asylum, but the family objected, so long as he was not dangerous, Guiteau frequently interrupted him with, "you are a liar!"

ATTEMPT TO KILL OF DEATH.

Saturday, at the close of the day's proceedings in court, as Guiteau was being conveyed, handcuffed, in the prison van to the jail, attended by officers, a man about 30 years old, rode along on horseback and fired two shots in rapid succession at the cowering wretch within, but the aim was bad and no harm was done beyond a flesh wound on the arm. The horseman put spurs to his horse and rode away, before the officers could capture him. Guiteau was frightened almost to death. A man named Jones was arrested as the would-be avenger.

Monday on being taken to the court house Guiteau's teeth chattered and he shrank all over from fear. Eight mounted police guarded him on the way.

Ann Arbor Correspondence.

Rain seems to be the principal subject of the day in Ann Arbor, that is, out of doors. It has rained nearly every day since the 29th of Sept.

College life is passing off quietly and pleasantly. Dr. McLean, Professor of Surgery, to the great satisfaction of the medical students has withdrawn his resignation.

Last Saturday 12th afternoon, twenty-four members of the Senior class, Law Department, applied to the circuit court, then sitting in this place, for admission to the bar. Three leading attorneys had been appointed to examine the candidates, but only two of them put in an appearance. They at once objected to proceed with the examination, on the ground that it was incompetent to admit students to practice, as they are not residents in any sense in which that word is used.

Judge Morris, the judge on this circuit, overruled the objection, stating that the Supreme Court had held that otherwise though he himself had raised the same objection when he first came on the bench. The committee yielded and proceeded with the examination, which resulted in Messrs. Edward George of St. Paul, Minn., D. E. Roberts of Constanceville, N. Y., and Miss Laura A. Wood of Rome, Mich., the only lady member of the class being admitted to the bar. The others were informed that they were neither rejected nor admitted; that they would have to wait until some future term of court before they could be examined. The following Monday three more students presented themselves, and one, Mr. Austin Jones of Oregon, was admitted.

Edward Dearey, Indian commissioner for Manitoba has been appointed lieutenant-governor of the Northwest territory. The seat of Government will be removed from Bismarck to some point on the Canadian Pacific road.

Pick Little, one of the James gang, for whose capture reward of \$15,000 was offered, was surprised by the sheriff of Bourbon county, Kas., about thirty miles from Fort Scott, and jailed to await identification.

Hon. Asa Hildgraves, one of the first settlers of Kansas, who died at Del Norte, Cal., was one of the free-state leaders left for dead in the Marais des Cygnes massacre in 1858, which formed the subject of a poem by John G. Whittier.

GENERAL NEWS.

There are renewed rumors that the Missouri Pacific road will purchase the Kansas and Missouri bridge at Fort Leavenworth and remove it to the city, thus cutting the Rock Island road out of its connection with Topeka.

The Treasury Department desired to buy \$200,000 in 34 per cents, Wednesday only \$28,000 were offered. It is now expected that Secretary Folger will call in \$200,000 to \$300,000 of extended 6 per cents.

Malitin, W. Va., a desperado named Robinson shot Marshal Allen Belcher through the heart and fired three times at the Mayor, mob collected to lynch the murderer, and the State riflemen were placed on guard around Charleston jail.

Sheriff Goodell, Lebanon, Mo., has at last recaptured William F. Martin, the murderer, who was set free by the niece of Sheriff Wilson, the couple traveling together for months. Martin's second escape was made by leaping from a train.

The five men who robbed Jesse Baldwin of Boardman, O., of \$20,000 in gold, took a train at Columbus and rode to Pittsburg. As they carried no baggage, it is believed that the coin was buried near the scene of the robbery.

In the National House of Congress, at Pittsburg, resolutions were offered demanding the repeal of the conspiracy act and the abolition of penal labor and declaring that no man should be permitted to hold more land than he can till.

A conference was held in Philadelphia by twenty-five prominent Republicans who supported the regular ticket at the late election, to take measures to abolish the control of Pennsylvania by the Camptons by capturing the next State convention.

Col. Cook, special counsel for the Government, has advised the State that the Department of Justice has furnished only \$700,000 of \$5,000 expended in pursuit of evidence, the remainder coming from the pockets of criminals.

About four years ago Charles J. Guiteau appeared in the Cook county, Ill., court to testify before the autopsy, testified to the character of the president's wound, and declared that it was necessarily fatal.

A mulatto named Chris Davis, lying in jail at Athens, O., for an outrageous assault upon Mrs. Luckey, was lynched by a masked mob on Sunday evening. The sheriff was overpowered while Davis was taken out and hanged to the timbers of a barn near the Rocking river.

In a lecture at Baltimore, Comptroller Knox said the national banking system was now managed by the railroads, and the public debt, as the minimum amount of bonds required to secure the circulation of all the banks is less than \$100,000,000.

The man arrested at Grand Island, Neb., for murders in Peoria county, Wis., has admitted that he is Edward Maxwell, who killed the Coleman brothers. He stated that while besieged in the Eau Claire woods and his brother Len went eighty-five hours without food.

J. Stanley Brown, who was appointed private secretary by President Garfield, has resigned his position at the white house and will resume a salary of \$1,000 as the chief magistrate. John C. Reed will succeed to Mr. Brown's duties at the executive mansion.

The rail of the Mexican National road have been joined on the bridge across the Rio Grande at Laredo, and the Mexican officials advised themselves of an opportunity to visit Fort McIntosh. The international road running from San Antonio to Laredo will close the thirty mile gap in twenty days.

In the Utah election contest at Washington, George Q. Cannon has filed an answer stating that he is a member of the Mormon church, living with plural wives, who have borne him children, and that as a religious teacher he has defended the polygamous text of his church as a revelation from God.

The Ohio idiot asylum, three miles west of Columbus, containing 625 pupils, took fire Friday morning. The inmates were marched out as if on dress parade, and quartered in neighboring buildings. The asylum cost \$500,000, and the greater portion of it is in ruins, for lack of an adequate supply of water. Dr. Doran believes that incendiaries caused the fire for purposes of plunder.

In the hope of securing lenient treatment, the principals in the recent prize fight in Ohio quietly accompanied Sheriff Stiles from Erie to Conneaut. The stake holder, William E. Harding, and an Ohio officer at Dunkirk, N. Y., but was arrested by another at Buffalo, from whom he escaped and made his way into Canada.

Commander Cheyna, of the British navy, lectured to a large audience in New York the subject of England and America to contribute \$150,000 to enable himself and Lieutenant Schwatka to reach the north pole by balloons from St. Patrick's bay.

A gentleman of Bannock City, Montana, asserts that in the government list of mail contracts is one from Red Rock, Montana, to Salmon City, Idaho, for which \$14,443.48 is said to be the present rate of pay. He declares that no government mail was ever carried over that route, as he can prove by the postmasters on the line, and as officials at Washington have been repeatedly advised.

Two-thirds of the Hoosac Tunnel track between Troy and Saratoga has been laid and the engineers have located the route through River street, the main thoroughfare of Troy, for a mile and a half. The street is only forty feet wide, and is already used by the horse-car lines. Property owners threaten a lively fight.

The fraudulent assignment of N. B. Harwood, the Minneapolis dry goods merchant, has been set aside by the suit of Rose Campbell & Co., who held in fifty-three garnishee creditors, who represent over \$100,000. The assignee holds \$45,000 from the National Bank in that city about \$42,000.

Edward Maxwell, the bandit recently captured in Nebraska, was lynched by the citizens of Durand, Wis., at 9 o'clock Saturday afternoon. While on his way to the surrounding country flocked in by squads to hear the impudent wretch confess murdering the Coleman brothers. A rope was thrown over his neck in the court room and he was strangled while being hauled out of the courtroom and thrown to the nearest tree, where his corpse was left to dangle nearly all the afternoon.

The crowd who desired to witness the Guiteau trial Monday, was five times as large as could be accommodated. The doors and corridors were lined with police. The assassin, livid with fear, was escorted from the jail to the court room by five officers. Mr. Robinson rose to criticize the treatment he had received from Mr. Scoville, and withdrew from the case Guiteau making a hot protest. After the examination of Drs. Woodward and Lamb and the exhibition of the fatal bullet, the prosecution rested its case. The assassin was given permission to speak in his own defense, and made a brief address to the jury, whether or not the prisoner killed the president, and whether or not the accused was in such a condition mentally as to render him responsible for his act.
