**THE LEGISLATURE.**

The opening proceedings of the Legislature and the Governor's Message are now elsewhere in this paper.

The House has completed the voting on the Tax bill in committee of the whole. The consideration of the sections is completed, except so far as relates to amendments to be offered to the body of the bill. Some amendments were made.

The chief struggle was over the question whether the State should relinquish the claims against the counties for taxes returned and charged up against counties, or whether it should continue the present system. A resolution was finally adopted that the Tax Commission should prepare a measure that taxes now charged up against the State should be relinquished, the lands so held sold for what they will bring, the titles to be made good by the State and the same received to be taken by the State in liquidation of all claims arising from unpaid taxes from the respective counties. This understood the Commission will prepare a separate measure embodying this idea.

There is quite a lively time over the question of the exemption of church property from taxation. Protests against it are numerous. S. B. McCracken, of Detroit, engineering a long list from that city. By way of a test, Representative Earl moved to strike out the subdivision exempting houses of public worship, parsonages and rights pews from taxation. Result: Yeas 21, nays 8.

The leading new feature of the Tax bill, that constituting the township board a board of review to check and approve the assessment roll, was agreed to by the House without discussion.  
The Senate has passed a bill appropriating \$8,000 for improvements for the School for the Blind.

There are many schemes for appropriation, some suggested by Representative Young of Wayne, makes the Fourth District consist of Genesee, Shiawassee, Clinton and Livingston counties.

The examination of Hugh S. Peoples and Dr. Hollywood, on charge of murdering Martha Whittla, was adjourned last week till to-day, Mr. Conely, attorney for the defense, asking time to determine whether or not to introduce a defense in that court.

Our ever-welcome exchange, the Clinton Independent, comes out in quarto form, a very handsome paper.

Good Taste at Home.
