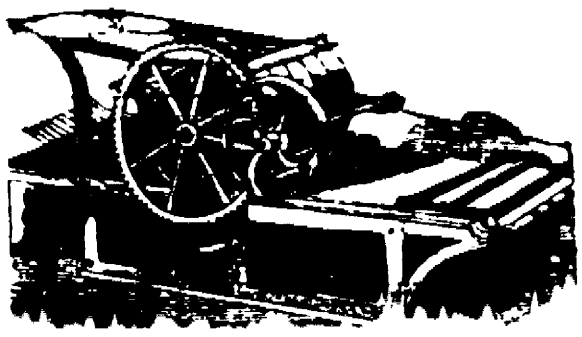

Local and Miscellaneous.

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Lansburg Gossip.
Lansburg, March 27, 1882.
Rev. Wm. Mulder of Victor, has been compelled to leave off preaching on account of ill health. He contemplates a trip north as soon as the weather will permit. His many friends here are pained by his misfortune.
Rev. O. Martell of the Baptist church, has tendered his resignation as pastor, with what result has not transpired. In this connection, there has been an immense amount of slang slung which like every effort of the kind, bounds back on the slinger. Vituperation only shows weakness. It is the wounded bird that flutters, and it would be common sense advice to those most interested in the matter, to seek their closets as a medium through which to express their feelings rather than the weekly means heretofore used.

Franklin, Lenawee county, this State, having located there in 1836, and he resided there on the farm he cut out from the wilderness, until about 16 years ago when he came to Owosso township near Bennington Station, to spend his last days with his daughter. He was a native of the town of Westfordland, Oneida Co., N. Y.

These men here, were good men as the doctor says, but they are politically dead! They died triumphant and happy in the consciousness that they had

Narrative of the Wanderings and Sufferings of the Crew of the Lost Arctic Exploring Vessel the Jeannette.

The steamer Jeannette left San Francisco July 8, 1879, under command of Lieut. De Long, Lieut. Chippas second officer, Master Danenhower, third officer, and George Melville, as chief engineer. Jerome J. Collins accompanied the expedition as correspondent of the New York Herald, the party numbering 33 persons all told. The remaining months of the summer and early autumn were occupied in explorations and scientific observations in the Alaskan islands and on the east coast of Siberia, and at the approach of winter the expedition passed through Behring's straits and entered the

REGIONS OF PERPETUAL ICE AND SNOW, in which navigation is possible only during three or four months of each year, and from which even the hardiest natives flee at the approach of winter. The mean temperature of the winters in this section is 40 degrees below zero, and for the three or four warmer months 40 degrees above. The expedition circumnavigated Wrangel Land, off the northeast coast of Siberia, and discovered that it was a comparatively small island instead of a continent, as has hitherto been believed. The route taken was comparatively new, nearly all the former Arctic expeditions having devoted their attention to the polar section lying to the northward of Alaska and the British possessions.

TWO YEARS' IMPRISONMENT.

From Wrangel island the Jeannette worked to the north and east. The results, geographical and scientific, of the voyage into this hitherto unexplored region are unknown at this time. The Jeannette did not reach a point as far north as some other expeditions, but must have nearly approached it. The winter following proved a terrible experience to the navigators. The close of navigation, in this instance on October 1, found them somewhere to the northward of the island of New Siberia, where, frozen in among mountains of ice, their vessel was badly crushed, and they passed the weary months in a monotonous round of useless existence that none but well balanced minds and healthy bodies could safely encounter. Contrary to their expectations the advent of spring and summer brought no release from their imprisonment. Fast bound in an immense ice field, from which it was found impossible to extricate the vessel, they drifted hither and thither in the great Arctic ocean for a period of 22 months.

SINKING OF THE JEANNETTE.

On the 12th day of June, 1881, in latitude 77.45 north, longitude 155 east, the Jeannette was crushed and sunk by the ice, and the crew compelled to trust to open boats and sledges to reach land some miles distant. The officers and crew dragged three boats and provisions over the ice to latitude north 76.28, longitude 120 degrees 3 east, where they landed upon a new island—Bennett Island. July 23, from thence they proceeded southward in boats, sometimes dragging over the ice, until September 10, when they reached Smolke island, about 90 miles northeast of the Lena delta. They

SEARCH FOR DE LONG.

On the evening of the 5th of November I started north to the relief of Lieut. De Long with two natives and two dog teams, with provisions for 10 days. November 6, reached Bulcun. Found two deserted houses and traces of two men Ninderman and Noro. Examined the small hut where the two men had slept and where a number of sleds were stored.

Traces of Ninderman and Noro were found on the route to Upper Belum, where a native brought to Melville one of De Long's records that had been cached and reported that others had been found, and which Melville afterward obtained. He continued the search, and on November 14 found a cache on the coast, three miles east of the Lena, containing a lot of effects including sextant, log-books, rifles and other property that De Long's party were no longer able to carry with them, and a letter from De Long stating that he was looking for a settlement. The letter had been copied in six languages. Melville then continues:

THE SEARCH CONTINUED.

On November 17, I left Upper Belum with fish for 10 days food, and with three dog teams driven by natives. I visited the place at which the De Long party crossed the Lena, and traced the party to Sistorouk, from which place I wished to search for the hut in which Erickson died, but a storm was raging either to Belum or Upper Belum, because there was a lack of food and the dogs refused to work. We had only raw frozen fish to eat, so I determined to return to Belum, and arrived there November 27, in a nearly exhausted condition with feet, hands, legs and face badly frostbitten, having been ten days

DE LONG'S PROBABLE FATE.

The father of S. P. Noro has received a letter from his son, dated Yakoutsk, Siberia, January 7. Noro was one of the men selected by Lieut. De Long to go ahead for relief. In the letter he says: "We traveled about two weeks short of food, and then the captain decided to send Ninderman and myself on ahead to look for assistance. We walked 120 miles without anything to eat. For six days we had not a mouthful of food. We were most starved when found by natives. The captain and 10 men, I fear, have died from starvation and cold."

THE LATEST INTELLIGENCE.

After sending the report given above Melville must have returned to the Arctic coast, as January 31 he sent the following message to Yakoutsk to be telegraphed to the navy department: "We are just entering the wilderness in search of De Long and party."

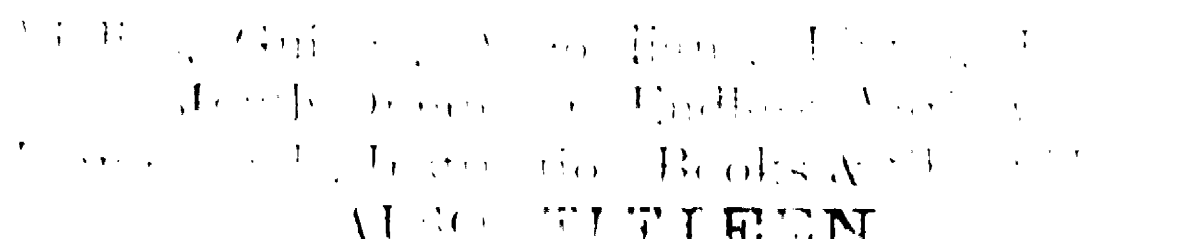

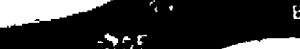

Many fine and successful efforts have been made in the Owoosso schools, and the general satisfaction does not seem to us to be the proper thing to say. We have learned from the more serious efforts in the Owoosso high school, we say, that a few boys who had outgrown their studies, were about to drop out, and were suspended by the superintendent. Still on this account some progress was made, has been made. In the Owoosso Evening News, the statement that considerable feeling prevails among the management of the Owoosso schools, and that papers, if possible, are the instigators of the Owoosso school, is a little all the more curious, as it is stated that all of its own knowledge is an indisputable fact.

So far as the Owoosso official paper of the county at Cornelia, the American, prints a communication from Owoosso, in which it is stated that Cornelia stands a fair chance of securing the pupils of our high school in a body, next term, unless it is restored in Washington. Well, now, we have not been able to ascertain that more than one of these three or four boys threatens to go to Cornelia to finish his school course, and we have to reluctantly confess that the writer of that communication is very much more credulous than we ever took him to be. If he believes that there is the slightest indication that the pupils of our high school will leave in a body on account of any dissatisfaction, for ourselves, we have the utmost faith that the Owoosso schools will go through the next term, beginning next Monday, just as if nothing had happened.

Judge Samuel Blatchford.

Judge Blatchford was born in 1820, and is therefore in the sixty-first year of his age. His education was effected at Columbia College, where, throughout the course of his studies, he held the highest rank of his class, at the head of which he finally graduated. He studied law in the office of R. M. Blatchford, Esq., his father, and upon being admitted to the bar, became the law partner of the late William H. Seward. When Mr. Seward was elected Governor, young Blatchford became his private secretary, and throughout his official career shared his political sentiments. Upon the resignation of Judge Betts, President Lincoln appointed Mr. Blatchford Judge of the District Court of the United States for the Southern District of New York, which position he now resigns to accept the higher honor conferred upon him by President Arthur.

On a farm near Pittsburg, Wednesday, T. T. Lawson demonstrated his theory that boiler explosions do not occur from low water, but are caused by the bursting of water into steam when the vacuum is caused by opening the valve. The test was made before Fehrbach, the general supervising inspector, and the boiler filled up fragments at a pressure of 250 pounds.

At Richmond, Va., Sunday, noon, flames broke out in the Petersburg railroad bridge, and burned that structure into the river, extending to the tobacco factories of T. M. Rutledge & Co., B. A. Patterson & Co., J. C. Williams & Co., the steamships of J. A. Hutchinson, C. R. & F. D. Barkdale, and Alborn & Edwards. The Vulcan iron-works, twenty tenement-houses, ten freight-cars, and I. P. Smith's grist-mill, all of which were destroyed. At the Manchester end of the bridge the Virginia coal-works were burned. The loss aggregates \$300,000.

Chief Clerk Crosby, of the war department at Washington, after a service of nineteen years, has passed into retirement. He claims to have resigned, but there are rumors that he was suspended by Secretary Lincoln. He is said to have almost wrapped the functions of his chiefs. With him also steps out Thomas H. Bradley, a lieutenant in the 21st Infantry, who has been detailed in the department for the past fifteen years, and whom General Sherman has unsuccessfully tried to have ordered to his regiment in the field.

Henry Wadsworth Longfellow, the sweet poet, gentle scholar, genial gentleman and admirable citizen, whose pure thoughts embodied in verse carried joy and peace to the hearts of millions of many nations on Friday at 8:10 p. m., yielded up his life peacefully and calmly, in the midst of his friends. He had been ailing since his 75th birthday, Feb. 27, but only became seriously ill on Thursday, when pneumonia developed. He grew rapidly worse and soon all hope of his recovery was abandoned. He was surrounded by his family except his brother, Rev. Samuel Longfellow, pastor of the Unitarian church of Germantown, Pa., who arrived too late to be on hand at the last moment. In person Mr. Longfellow was something less than a medium height, having a strong, well-built figure and a feminine head. His hair and beard, snowy white, fell carefully from his head and face. In speaking he was buoyant and earnest, and was much given to story-telling. It is said that word of his disparagement never escaped him, and that he was always kindly disposed toward his most severe critics. He leaves a wife and four children, three of whom reside with him, while one, Ernest Longfellow, the artist, resided near him. His death is a severe and irreparable loss to English literature, for he is almost the last of those who have achieved so much renown and compelled respect for American letters abroad. Hawthorne, Bryant, Prescott, Motley, and Cooper have finished their great work. Whittier's alone remains, but he is trembling on the threshold of the tomb.

WASHINGTON NOTES.

President Arthur has been informed that the Owoosso schools are in a state of dissatisfaction, and that the pupils are about to leave in a body. The president has expressed his confidence in the Owoosso schools, and has ordered that the pupils be allowed to finish their course. The president has also ordered that the Owoosso schools be restored in Washington.
