It is in simihr shape to the curved-handle stick, which has always been in vogue, but generally carried by old gentlemen -There are two styles, the shepherd's, crook, shaped like a fish hook, and the Zulu crook, a plain curved handle. Both styles originated on the other side. as do most of the fashions in canes. --The Zulu is from Paris, and the shep herd from London. They were introdated there last spring, and took the alace of the crutch, which was so popular last year. These new styles are made from natural wood, with handles, and yet there are a great many made with chamois and buffalo horn handles. When I was a young man a whalebone cane was the proper thing, and since then there have been the agate-topped Malacca, the bamboo and barked sticks of different shapes. The makers here get woods from all over the world, the most expensive being the Malacca, which comes from the swamps in the Straits of Malacca, and the leopard wood, olive and snake wood, from Africa --America can supply the wants of the world for pretty barked wood. For canes, the ash plant, very popular among Englishmen, comes from Great Britain, where it is cultivated for cane use alone. When used as a walking stick it is never varnished, but used just as it was pulled. The fancy woods, such as Malacca, Penang and Waukee bamboos, are generally mounted in gold
