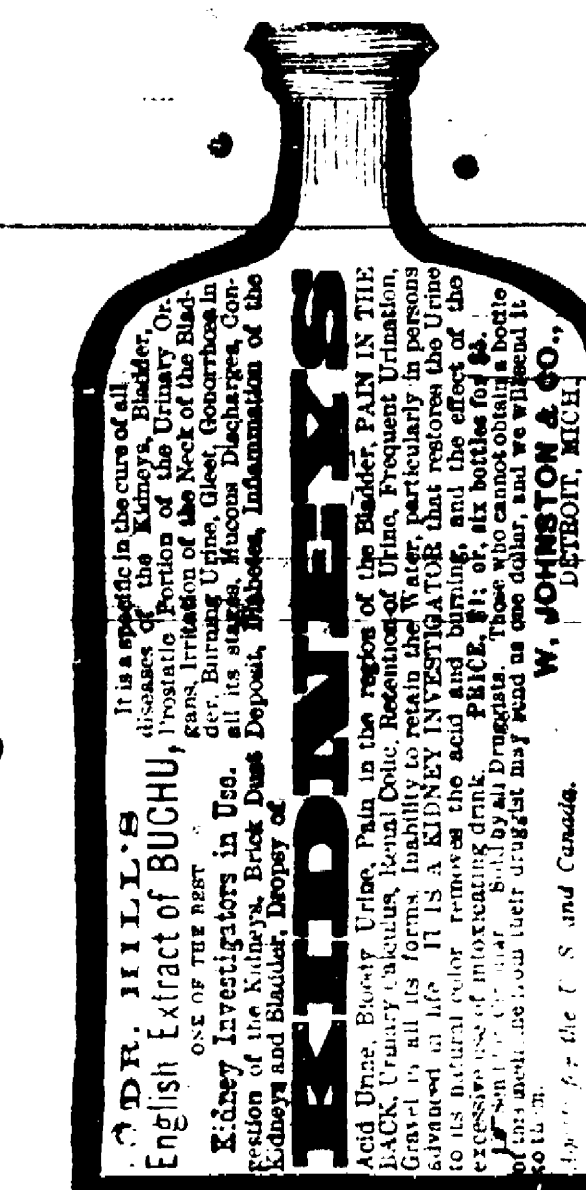

Minneapolis, Minnesota, the strongest and most reliable Republican city of the state, at the late election gave a Democratic majority of 1,700 on mayor and elected four of the five aldermen.

The Democrats carried the city of Springfield, the capital of Illinois, at the late election—the first time in years. Their unexpected victory in Chicago, also, is prophetic of democratic victory in the State in November next.

The Democrats carried the leading cities in Wisconsin at the recent election, electing Mayors in Milwaukee, Oshkosh, Madison, Janesville, Watertown and La Crosse. (Barry County Democrat.)
