Another Bond Call. The secretary of the treasury has issued a call for \$16,000,000 of 6 per cent. bonds, continued at 31 per cent. from July 1, 1881. The principal and accrued interest will be paid September 13 next, and interest will cease that day. The following is a description of the bonds: \$500, numbers 801 to 900, both inclusive; \$100, numbers 5,501 to 5,500, both inclusive; \$500, numbers 3,601 to 4,150, both inclusive; \$1,000, numbers 19,001 to 24,000, both inclusive; \$5,000, numbers 6,401 to 6,900, both inclusive; \$10,000, numbers 12,501 to 14,550, both inclusive.

The Egyptian Muddle—What It Is All About.

THE BOMBARDMENT OF ALEXANDRIA OFFERED.

In 1834, Said Pasha, Ottoman sultan, became ruler of Egypt, which was then a dependency of Turkey. During his period of nine years the long contemplated Suez canal was begun, a great deal of money went into various wars, and the country plunged into debt. Karamanli, the Turkish governor of Syria, who by tact and a liberal use of funds secured various important concessions from the Turkish government. Among these new privileges was the power to ~~assume~~ relate to the

An order from the sultan that the khedive abstain in the future from all diplomatic transactions and from making foreign loans was met with the reply that he would make no concessions and would effect loans in England and wherever he pleased. Since 1875, when the khedive's power was apparently limited, and Egypt raised from a province into an almost sovereign kingdom. But as before, the khedive took good care not to lose her hold on her long dependency. The building of the canal and other expenditures of the khedive have been the source of the charge of bankruptcy. The day of evil was plainly seen to be at hand when the khedive disposed of his controlling number of shares in the canal to England. This act, together with the immense sums already secured from France, put Egypt completely in the power of these two countries, a position which has since been confirmed and strengthened.

Four years ago Twick Pasha, the present khedive, began to try his hand as the ruler of Egypt and the vassal of the sultan. What he might have done for the country had it not been for her bankers and her treasury it is difficult to say. The Suez canal was originally owned by England, while English and French bondholders had a decided interest in the way things went in Egypt. This fact, therefore, that England and France have a mortgage on Egypt, furnishes one im-

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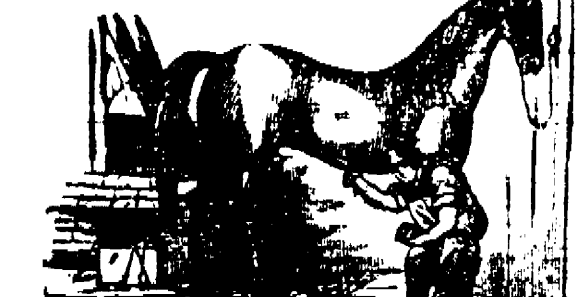
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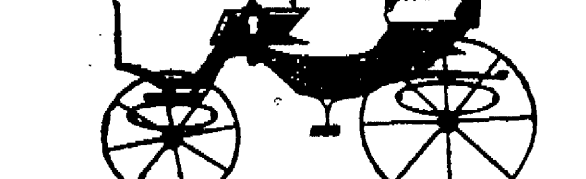

"Here, here! what's all this row about? What's the matter?"

"The matter is that this woman owes me for driving her around for two hours, and won't pay me for more than an hour and a half."

"Ha! Well, madam, what have you to say to this? Let us hear your side of this question."

"I took this man's carriage just an hour and a half ago, and I'm willing to pay him for that, but not a cent more."

"Hum! Well, driver, you are sure there's no mistake—that's two hours?"

"Quite sure, your honor."

"Well, and you won't pay him for more than an hour and a half?"

The stranger reflects for a moment and then says severely:

"Well, settle it between yourselves; it's none of my darn business; and walks rapidly away. *Le Figaro.*

The speaker of the house is generally known as "the chair," so called because he is sat down on so often.

Notwithstanding the fact that congress is almost on the eve of adjournment and the calendars of both houses are crowded with bills that will never again come to the surface, the introduction of new bills continues at every opportunity.

The number already introduced in the present congress approaches close to seven thousand, a figure that is greatly in excess of that of any former session.

Many of the measures thus introduced are merely for amusement, but they indicate the amazing fertility of the American mind in the way of extending the recognized limits of legislation.

Third Assistant Postmaster General Hazen has completed a statement of issues to postmasters by a list of postage stamps, stamped envelopes and postpaid letters for the fiscal year.

The total number issued was 1,747,571,033 pieces, of the aggregate value of \$40,977,931.

Increase over the issue of the preceding fiscal year were 236,259,493 pieces, or 15.7 per cent, equal in value to \$6,533,571.

The appropriations for supplying these articles amounted to \$1,036,000, of which \$78,734 was expended, leaving an unexpended balance of \$957,266, or 15.4 per cent. of the appropriations.

Over 1,000,000 3-cent stamps and 250,000 10-cent stamps were sold the past year.

As a result of these figures, department officials feel warranted in asserting that, when the final statement of receipts and expenditures for this year has been completed, it will be found the postal service is self-sustaining.

of the deficiency appropriation of \$4,162,339 made by congress last year to meet the expected deficiency in the postal revenues not one cent has been drawn from the treasury.

This is the first year since 1861 in which the receipts of the postoffice department balanced its expenditures, with the exception of one year during the war of the rebellion.

There were 16,222 postoffices in the United States on June 30, 1881, an increase of 1,710 over 1880.

CONGRESSIONAL

HOUSE.

JUNE 27.—The house accepted from Messrs. Moran and Ranney a portrait of Hon. Robert C. Winthrop.

In the case of Smith vs. Shelley, from the same state, the committee reported a resolution declaring the bill variant.

Mr. Page, as a question of privilege, explained how it happened that the bill passed to regulate immigration was not the one agreed to by the committee.

He stated that in handing the bill to Mr. Page he had no intention to deceive anybody.

After a hot debate the error was corrected by the passage of the committee bill.

The act to reduce internal revenue taxation was passed up. Mr. Springer moved to recommit the bill, with instructions to report a measure abolishing all internal revenue taxes, except those on bank circulation and distilled spirits.

The motion was rejected 53 to 127. Mr. Hewitt said the bill gave no relief to the great industrial interests of the country.

Mr. Dannelly warned the republican side that the measure would not meet the approval of the people.

Mr. Kelley expressed regret that the bill did not make a more sweeping reduction.

The bill then passed by 127 to 88. The back-chamber bill was taken up and most of the senate amendments were concurred in, the exception being the one relating to gold certificates.

A conference report on the consular appropriation bill was agreed to.

JUNE 28.—In the house, Mr. Orth reported a resolution, which was a logical request for the president to state if any officers of the United States had made propositions to American citizens in British prisons to accept their release upon conditions.

Mr. Robinson insisted that for one hundred days the president had been on his knees before Lord Granville, and gave notice that he would move to impeach Minister Lowell.

The naval appropriation bill was taken up in committee. The committee rose, when a senate bill was passed appropriating \$20,000 for a memorial column on the battlefield of Monmouth.

JUNE 29.—The house passed a resolution to continue to July 15 all appropriations for necessary government expenses, a bill was passed authorizing the construction of a bridge across the Cumberland river near Nashville.

The naval appropriation was considered in committee of the whole, Mr. Robeson explaining its provisions. The bill was taken up, Mr. Dannelly reported a bill to tax the manufacture and sale of oleomargarine.

JUNE 30.—In the house, the death of Mr. Hawk, of Illinois, was announced. A committee of three senators and seven representatives was provided for, to escort the remains to Mount Carroll, when the house adjourned.

JULY 1.—In the house Mr. Kelley asked unanimous consent to report from the committee on ways and means a joint resolution authorizing the secretary of the treasury to issue \$20,000,000 2 per cent. bonds, or certificates, in exchange for bonds bearing the higher rate of interest.

Mr. Hastings objected, but subsequently withdrew the objection, and after some explanations by Messrs. Kelley and Ranney the joint resolution passed.

The house then went into committee on the naval appropriation bill. The senate bill to authorize the construction of a bridge across the Saint Marie river passed.

The bill to repeal so much of section 3,343 of the Revised Statutes as imposes a tax on tobacco passed.

The speaker laid before the house a message from the president, returning, without his approval, the bill to regulate the carrying of passengers by sea.

When expressing his entire sympathy with the objects of the bill, he points out some serious defects in it.

The first defect is that it does not provide for the carrying of passengers by sea.

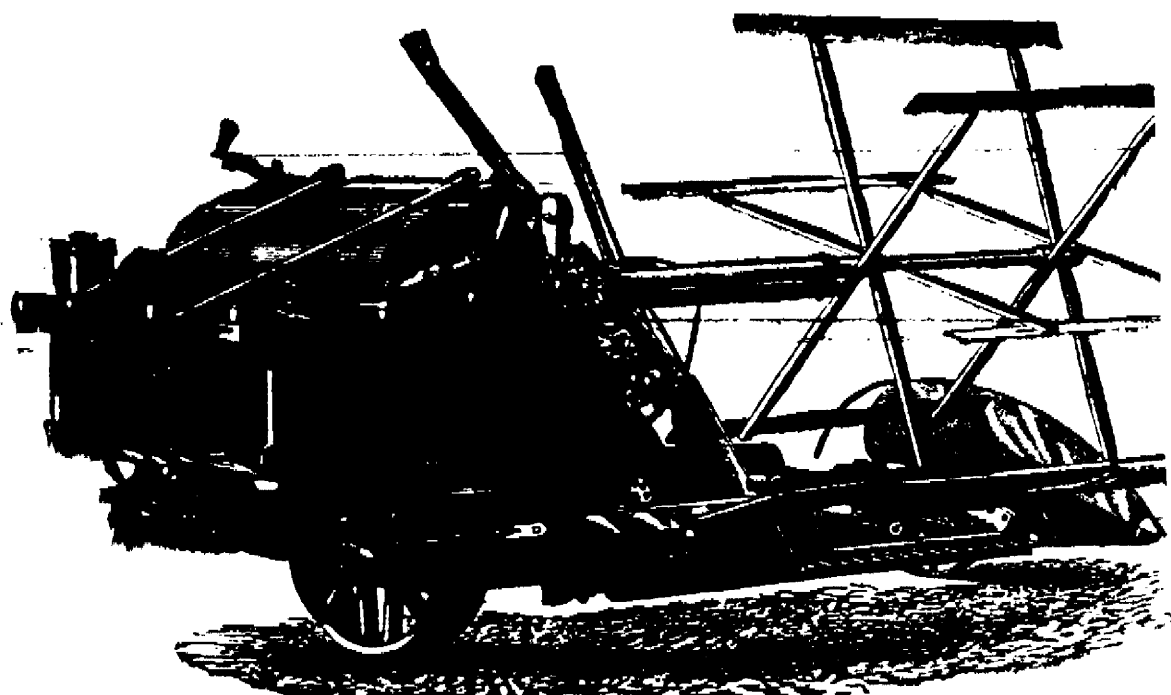
