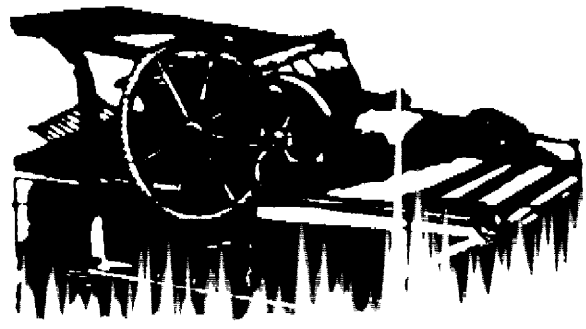

The body of Minister Marsh arrived in Rome Friday morning, and was received by the mayor. A troop of cavalry, the Italian ministry, and representatives of seven leading powers escorted the remains to the Protestant cemetery, where they were deposited in the mortuary chapel. The widow of the minister will continue to reside in Italy.

Four drunken men, three American sea captains and an Austrian, while on a spree in Ningpo, China, nearly murdered the captain of a war junk, and placed in great peril the lives of all foreigners. The Americans have been committed to await the result of the officer's injuries.

In the famous Varney divorce case at Fond du Lac, Wis., which has been before the courts for five years, the wife has been granted her freedom. For failure to support, and has been exonerated from the charge of attempting to poison her husband. He is ordered to deliver a homestead and pay her \$1,850 and costs, and it is probable that his expenditure in the contest will aggregate \$2,000.

At Chicago a workman preparing a charge was opening a twenty-five pound can of powder with a steel chisel and wooden mallet. A spark fired the magazine, in which two loads of powder were placed, on Thursday. John Sobel, John Anderson, and Mike Britton were badly injured. The buildings of the Chicago Rubber company and the sheds of the St. Paul road were riddled, and windows were broken for a distance of a mile from the explosion.

In the French chamber of deputies, De Freycinet proposed that France occupy the ends of the Suez canal with four thousand men, and stated that the ministry was unanimous in making a direct appeal to the confidence of the chamber. By a vote of 450 to 75 the credit demanded by the government was rejected. The ministers proceeded to the Elysée and tendered their resignations to President Grevy, who requested them to transact all necessary business until the appointment of their successors.

Jerome Eddy, who has been a prominent figure in the racing world, was seen at the track on Sunday, July 21, 1882. He was accompanied by his wife and family. The race was a grand one, and the spectators were numerous. Eddy's horse, the Shiwassawee, was the favorite, and it was expected that it would win. However, the horse was unable to reach the finish line, and the race was a disappointment for the spectators.

A report from the Board of Health, submitting several bills amounting to \$183.46, contracted by that Board, for payment by the council, was received and ordered placed on file.

The committee on Grading and Sidewalks submitted a report, recommending that a crosswalk be constructed across Main Street on the west line of Michigan Avenue, as asked for. Adopted.

An ordinance to provide for grading Water Street from Oliver Street to the fair ground, was introduced by Ald. Bedford, and passed by the council.

Ald. Bedford also introduced an ordinance which passed, to provide for the construction of a drain in the south-west quarter of the city, as described in last week's Press, to be known as Turnbull drain.

VARIETIES.

President Arthur has returned to the secretary of war a petition from the Garfield club of New York, bearing 49,000 signatures, for the pardon of Sergeant Mason.

A yacht is being constructed at Bristol, R. I., for a gentleman of Fort Harrison, on condition of making one hundred miles in five hours or no pay. Her estimated cost is \$50,000.

An ex-alderman of Brooklyn, named James Dunne, is matched to fight Tug Wilson in Louisville or Mississippi for \$2,500 a side and the championship of the world.

The Russian crooks in Alaska are being decimated by scurvy, fever and measles. Brandy is said to be greatly appreciated, but its importation is a penitentiary offense.

The Indians of the Turtle mountain country have posted notices warning white men against encroaching on their lands until a treaty is made with the government.

A birthday party at Kimbamy, Ill., was attended by thirty gentlemen and fifteen ladies, each of whom was over 70 years of age. The gathering was skillfully photographed.

Many members of the Navajo tribe are off the reservation, and are daily committing depredations. One band was driven back to the agency by a company of New Mexican militia.

The steamer Rainbow, with seventy-five passengers on board, struck the rocks at Louisville and settled in shallow water. She remained all night in the Indiana cove.

August Gregory, 18 years of age, sneaked into the bed room of his mother in a Denver hotel, and took \$4,000 from under her pillow, but was speedily caught.

A heavy thunder storm was of great service in checking the forest fires in the sections east of Oklawaha, Mich., where farms and timber tracts were burning by the acre.
