

ANTILL-CHOSEN SITE.

A citizen writes to a Washington paper as follows: "Among the acts passed during printing \$400,000 for a pension office building. It appears that the site selected is the cow-yard on B street, between Hooker's division and Murder bay. The cow-yard is situated on the lowest ground in the city, but little if any above ordinary high tide. The old canal lately filled up ran through it, and it is frequently covered with the over-flow water of the B street sewer. A year or two ago the yard and its locality were covered with six feet of water during a freshet. It is a bottomless lot, and no building can be erected upon it except by piling. A cellar or basement could only be used for propagating sightless fish, and even the first floor of the building would have to be at least seven feet above grade to insuragainst overflow. As to its surroundings, the cow-yard is bounded on the north by low groggeries and houses of nameless character, junk-shops, soap-grease and gua-no stores, on the east by horse and cattle bazaars, tar, turpentine, and tallow stores, depots for hides, hair, bones old iron, and rags, grain, lime plaster, and cement houses. with stores, stalls, and streets used as a country market. On the south by the E street sewer, manure, malarial, and Smithsonian grounds; on the west by saw and planing inills, iron foundries, livery stables, lumber yards, asphalt works, gin mills, and the filthy old rookeries of Munday bay. To reach the locality from Pennsylvania avenue you are compelled to pass through the lowest and vilest section of the city, not safe for gentlemen at night or ladies by lay. And this is the sight selected for this building (containing records of incalculable value), emiangered to destruction by fire from the combustible nature of its surroundings; and all in the name of economy. The government seizes upon the only free market place in the city, for the alleged reason to save the expense of the purchase of a lot. Economy? Why, it will cost twice the amount to obtain a foundation in the cowyard that a good-sized lot in a suitable location would have cost. Is it too late for the blunder to be corrected?" 

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
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
