Dr. Hamilton Says that Garfield Was Drugged to Death.

Washington, Dec. 12.—A letter from New York says that Dr. Frank H. Hamilton, who gained much notoriety as consulting physician in the Garfield case, is lying dangerously ill with a cerebral trouble, accompanied by hemorrhages. There is a great deal of anxiety over the doctor's condition, not simply because of his personal worth, although he stands exceedingly high in his profession. The anxiety is chiefly of a prurient character. Before Hamilton was taken sick he declared, in effect, that the late president was dosed to death. It is reported that he asserts positively that the use of morphia had been prohibited by the council of physicians. Dr. Bliss continued its use, and had it not been for this course of treatment the wound might have been successfully probed, and the president's life saved by judicious surgical treatment. Dr. Hamilton's friends say he is anxious that congress should investigate the subject, and if the subject cannot be investigated in any other way, he would like Dr. Bliss to him for libel. These statements are directly traceable to Dr. Hamilton, and the medical fraternity, as well as many laymen, would like something definite in regard to this matter, which is prominent in the shape of undeniable proofs, as soon as the doctor's health will permit. There is one thing to be said in Dr. Hamilton's favor in regard to his connection with the Garfield case. 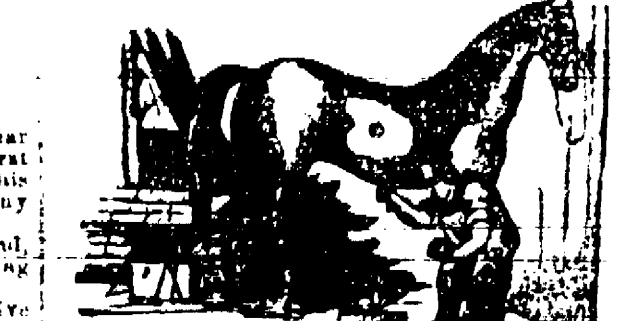

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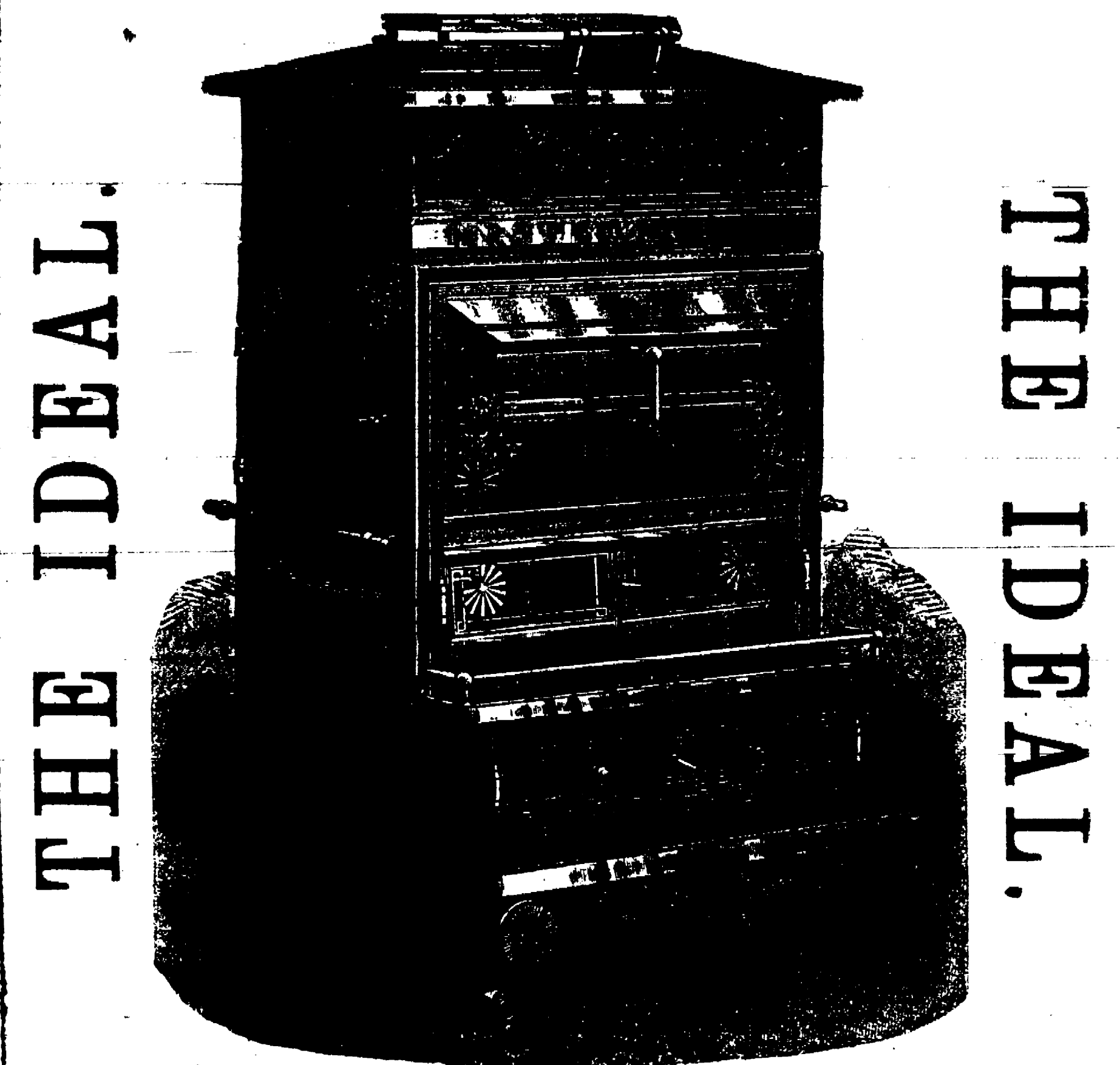
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
