The Attorney General in answer to the secretary of the State Board of Health relative to the construction of the new law requiring physicians to register-whether physicians can lawfully register after the time tixed by statute for registration - states that they can men have but little weight in either. Chinese Examinations.

The Chinese have a peculiar way of conducting the examination of candidates for their universities. There are three trials allowed on the ninth, twelfth and lifteenth day of the cighth moon-and each lasts two days. During the time the applicant is confined in a cell about eight feet square. In it are two boards, the one to sit upon, and the other to serve as writing desk and eating table. Besides this "furniture" there is a teapor and cup for retreshments, the eatables being handed in by the examiners through the gratings on the door; but no one is allowed to speak to those in charge. As the cell is hardly large enough to lie down in, those students who are unfortunate enough to be above the average size are compelled to sit up during their fortyeight hours of solitary continement. The examination is conducted wholly in writing.




