Disastrous Fire at Jackson—Several Lives Lost.

Last Sunday morning, about 6 o'clock a fire broke out at Jackson in the wooden building occupied by J. J. Barnes as a cigar store, destroyed the Union hotel block, occupied by the Union hotel, Union hall theater, Waldron & Curtis' drug store, Jackson savings bank, H. H. Case and C. K. Elliott, groceries; N. H. Ekler, saloon; the block owned D. B. Hubbard and costing \$125,000, together with five frame buildings, occupied by Wm. Aultman, boots and shoes; John Roth jeweler, Charles Amba, barber shop and residence; J. J. Barnes, cigar store; Rutson Bros., confectioners; Barrett & Daly, tinmiths; and Moses Weiger, saloon. The loss by fire and water will exceed \$175,000, partially insured. Several lives are reported lost. One body, that of Charles Cornell, crippled soldier, has been recovered. Four others are injured so that they will die—John Prior and Mrs. Banks, waiters, and an unknown colored man. James Herne of Cleveland, in attempting to jump from the third story window struck the telegraph wire, was whirled around in such a manner as to strike on his head and shoulders on the pavement and injured so he will die. Charles Kimball of Kalamazoo, also received a bad scalp wound in jumping from the balcony in front of the hotel. His injuries are not fatal.

Congressman Cutler is preparing a bill providing for the establishment of a soldier's home in Michigan.

A State Republican Convention will be held at Grand Rapids, April 21, to choose delegates to the National Convention at Chicago, which will elect a presidential candidate.

A paper has been published recently, and entitled in the estimation of the Detroit Daily Times, "The very old edition," and the time is far from over, when and fair as an independent paper. It is also well filled with excellent news.

The State Central Committee of the Independent Republican Party have called a State Convention to be held at Battle Creek, March 25, to elect delegates to a national convention of colored voters to be held at Richmond, and to choose a representative to a conference to be held by representative colored men from several northern states. The declaration of purposes shows the conference to be a branch of the radical "outage mill."

The Independent Republican Reformers—Carl Schurz, ex-Gov. Potts of New Jersey and others—held a meeting Saturday in New York and resolved that administration reform is absolutely essential to the success of the republican party, but when the time for action comes it will be seen whether they are firm enough to break away from party shackles.

There is another "southern outrage" to record. Last week John Barnett stabbed and killed H. C. Turpin, at Marion, Ga. But they were both Michigan men—rival sewing machine agents from East Saginaw—the affair will not add much to political stock for campaign purposes.

Ex-Attorney General Wayne MacVeagh, in an article in the March Century on "The Next Presidency," says: "There is a great and noble work awaiting a President able and willing to do it," and then sums up the virtues needed for the next presidency. Well, let Mr. MacVeagh find his model candidate and then elect him over the politicians' candidate—if he can.

Democratic National Convention to be held July 8, at Chicago.

The Democratic National Committee, which met in Washington the 22d inst., fixed upon July 8 as the time and Chicago as the place for holding the National Democratic Convention which will nominate candidates for the Presidency and Vice Presidency. Democrats in Congress generally express satisfaction with the action of the committee. A determined effort will now be made to adjourn Congress before the convention meets. To that end, the Ways and Means Committee hope to dispose of the tariff bill in the house before the first of April and the Appropriations Committee will crowd on all sail.

The call agreed upon, after stating the time and place of the convention, says:

Each state is entitled to a representation therein equal to double the number of its Senators and Representatives in the Congress of the United States. The Democratic of each organized Territory and the District of Columbia are entitled to send two delegates, subject to the decision of the convention as to their admission. All the Democratic conservative citizens of the United States, irrespective of past political associations and differences, who can unite with us in the effort for pure, economical, and constitutional government are cordially invited to join in sending delegates to the convention.

The call makes no reference to the tariff question, and "Yucca" says this fact has caused some members of both parties to jump to the conclusion that a majority of the National Committee is opposed to making an aggressive campaign on the tariff issue; but the truth is that a majority of the committee is in hearty sympathy with the revenue reformers of the House. The call for the convention is a verbatim copy of the call issued four years ago, with the exception of the date and place for holding conventions.

Bonds Called—Those Which Mature May 1.

The Treasury has called \$10,000,000 in three months maturity May 1. Total \$10,000,000.

WIND AND FLOOD.

PARTICULARS OF THE APPALLING SOUTHERN CYCLONE.

WHOLE TOWNS SWIFTLY WAXED IN A TWINKING OF THE EYE.

The cyclone which swept over the southern states, and which was the cause of the destruction of so many lives and property, was the most destructive in the history of the United States.

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Scottish. Many of their ancestors came over with Lord Macdonald. The people are overwhelmed by the disaster. It is estimated that the loss of life in the track of the cyclone exceeds three hundred, besides the incalculable damage to property.

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WASHINGTON. The state government is officially advised that the army has removed the embargo on American ports.

Somehow, however, a bill for \$3,000,000 for the purchase of land for the army has been passed by the house.

Feb. 20.—In the senate a bill was reported providing that the trespassers on Indian lands may be imprisoned for one year and fined \$500. An adverse report was made on a bill to amend the act relating to the payment of the bounty on the capture of the pirate.

Feb. 20.—The senate passed a bill appropriating \$400,000 per annum for arms and equipment for the militia. Mr. Plumb reported a bill to raise the agricultural bureau to department with a secretary. A resolution was passed directing the secretary of the interior to report the amount of lands patented to railroads in Iowa. A bill was introduced for the time for holding federal courts in Iowa. Some progress was made on the bill to provide circulation for national banks.

Feb. 20.—The senate passed a bill to provide for the punishment of persons falsely representing officers and employees of the United States. Bills were introduced to authorize the creation of a public building at Detroit and to improve the navigation of the Mississippi river by strengthening the levees. An adjournment to Monday was taken.

HOUSE. Feb. 18.—In the house, bills were introduced to grant \$20,000 of public lands to each survivor of the Mountain meadow massacre to make freight pools unlawful on roads added by government bonds; to appropriate \$100,000 for additional salaries; to amend the sinking fund act; to amend the act relating to the secretary of state to furnish information as to the action taken on the resolution in regard to the death of Herr Lasker. The house refused to fix a day for the consideration of the copyright bill, but agreed to take action on a resolution to amend the act relating to the punishment of desertion and to make the rate of postage on second-class matter one cent. The house passed a resolution to restore to the Mexican pension rolls the names of confederate soldiers stricken off for disloyalty soon left the house without a vote. Feb. 18.—The house sat through Monday night. A quorum was obtained at 8:15 o'clock this morning, when a resolution was passed to make the Mexican pension bill the special order for February 21. An adjournment to Wednesday was then taken.

Feb. 20.—The house passed a resolution calling on the postmaster general to submit a report on the post-office system. A joint resolution was passed appropriating \$150,000 to be expended for fortifications in the Hawaiian Islands. A resolution was passed to amend the act relating to the Oregon Central land grant, and a resolution requesting the president not to deliver Senator Carlos Aguero's Spanish authorities until an investigation is made by the attorney general.

Feb. 21.—The house passed the military academy and post-route bills. A message received from the president announced that the British government had contributed the steamer Alert for the Greely relief expedition. It was resolved that the steamer Alert be sent to the Arctic region in recognition of the generosity of Great Britain in presenting the vessel. The house adjourned to Saturday.

Feb. 25.—In the house, bills were favorably reported to transfer five courts from Illinois to the northern judicial district and hold courts at Peoria; to prohibit the importation of foreigners on contracts to perform labor, and to amend the statute prohibiting the delivery of registered letters and the payment of money orders. Some time was spent in committee of the whole on a bill to amend the act relating to the control of cattle, which would be taken from their owners and placed in the hands of the government inspectors. The house passed the bonded-whisky extension bill from the majority of the ways and means committee.

FOREIGN. Bradlaugh was re-elected to parliament by the largest majority ever given him.

At a meeting of Suez canal bondholders in Paris it was resolved that the agreement made by De Lesseps with British shipowners was unacceptable.

The British house of commons on Thursday reaffirmed its resolution excluding Bradlaugh from the hall—the vote being 238 to 133.

By a vote of 311 to 292, the British house of commons defeated Northcote's resolution censuring the government for its policy in Egypt.

Mr. Gladstone informed a deputation from the house of commons that the government intended the passage of a bill providing for a minister for Scotland.

The British government has tendered the use of the steamer Alert for the Greely relief expedition, and she will be used as a supply ship.

Friends of Herr Lasker in the German reichstag propose to demand of Prince Bismarck an explanation of his conduct in regard to the resolution of the resolution of condolence passed by congress.

A sensation was created in the British house of commons by John O'Connor Power who attacked Parnell and his lieutenants in the language of a revolutionary and policy adverse to the interests of Ireland ever since the land act was introduced.

Tokar was on Thursday surrendered to the Egyptian rebels. A portion of the garrison at Khartoum has been killed. There are thirty-two thousand British troops at Trinkitat and twelve hundred at Suakin. General Gordon telegraphed Admiral Hewison to call a conference of the British and French governments to arrange terms of peace, and to ask German Digma to meet him at Khartoum.

General Gordon has placed in command of the troops at Khartoum a negro who won decoration under Bismarck in Mexico. The general demolished a prison in which two hundred men were chained, burned the instruments of torture, and opened his office to the people. He has also ordered the Austrian consul sent \$2,000 to El Mehdi to secure the release of Catholic missionaries.

A British relief expedition will arrive at Suakin next Sunday and advance on Tokar Tuesday. It is learned that two hundred men of the garrison at the latter city made a sortie, killing and wounding many of the enemy. The British army of occupation at Cairo is to be reinforced. So great is the influence of General Gordon that no fears are felt for the safety of Khartoum.

Runners have reached Suakin that the Egyptian rebels on Sunday night carried off by assault and massacre the garrison. The commander had written that he needed arms and ammunition, but had sufficient commissary stores. A letter reports that the French government represents to England that if the garrison at Cairo be weakened there is danger of a massacre.

The Deutsch Tagblatt, commenting upon Bismarck's reply to the Lasker resolution, repels the interference of a foreign legislature in the internal affairs of Germany, and criticizes the diplomatic intermediary method employed in the transmission of the resolution. The Tagblatt says: "We believe Herr Lasker was unknown to a majority of the congressmen. Their object in adopting the resolution was to gain German votes in the coming presidential election, and win the love of Germans at home who are desirous to throw the gates of the fatherland wide open to American imports."

It is beginning to be suspected, in fact, that the actor, and not society, is the principal victim of the profession. He is the sufferer from insincere conditions, if there is any. His ideas of virtue are apt to be characterized by the peculiarities of a remote and fanciful ideal. The moral persuasions of a distinct order are visibly impressed on his mind. Both his virtues and his vices are incident to a calling that shuts him up in a species of isolation from his kind. His temptations are his own; his victories, too, are his own. Other men have stronger supports, and deserve sterner judgment for errors. In my own experience, both the men and the women merit more honor than is meted out to them.

An Enterprising City.

Numereburg was a place of consideration even in the time of the Emperor Henry IV., who ennobled thirty-eight families there. In 1219, Henry V. raised it to the rank of a free imperial city, and during the middle ages it was very important on account of its enormous traffic between the great sea-port of Venice and the countries of the east, and all northern Europe. Through its commerce it became a very rich city, and its burghers established manufactories of various sorts, and so built up its trade that skillful artisans flocked there, and many discoveries were made which still have a great influence in the world.

The first paper-mill in Germany was

in Nuremberg, and Koberger's printing-house, with its twenty-four presses, was so attractive to authors that they settled at Nuremberg in order the more conveniently to oversee the printing of their works. Watches, called "Nuremberg Eggs," were first made about 1600; the clarinet was invented there, and church organs were better made than in any other German town. A new composition of brass, the air-gun, and wire-drawing machines were made at Nuremberg. Jewels, the filigree silver and gold work—the medals, images, seals, and other artistic jewelry which were made by the fifty master goldsmiths who dwelt there—were famous far and wide; and this variety of manufactures was increased by Hirschvogel, an artisan who traveled in Italy, and learned to make majolica. His factory, established at Nuremberg in 1607, was the first in all Germany in which such ware was made. It is not certain that playing-cards were invented in Nuremberg, but they were manufactured there as early as 1580, and cannot have cast there in any iron bars to this they have been made of iron bars and then made into rings and placed in place by hoops. In short, the manufacturers of Nuremberg were so widely known as to give rise to a proverb.

"Nuremberg's hand
Goes through every land,"
and thus the city had the sort of im-
portance which success and wealth

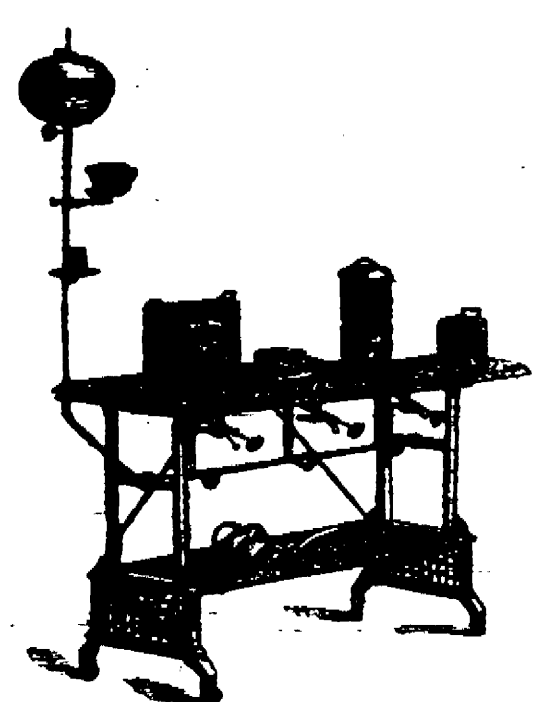
