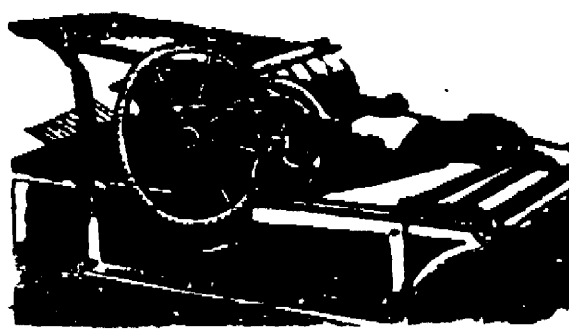

The World's Exposition at New Orleans.

The World's Industrial and Cotton Centennial Exposition to be held at New Orleans, will commence on the first Monday in December, 1884, and close not later than May 31st, 1885. He is extremely popular with the workingmen for he has always been considerate for their interests, and the capitalists will feel secure with him because he has shown a capacity for managing large business concerns." "What has been his political career?" "He never held an office of any kind, never thought of it till the time came for nominating a candidate to run against W. W. Astor for congress. The district was hopelessly Republican, and no Democrat 'haunted' after the empty honor. In this state of affairs the party urged Mr. Flower to make the race. He replied that he didn't care for political honors, as they would interfere with his business, but rather than allow Mr. Astor to have a walk-over he would take the fight. He did so. The Astors poured money into the district, but Mr. Flower's personal popularity carried the forlorn hope and he won. A victory like this in a Republican stronghold, and against the array of Astor wealth, not only marked him as a coming power in politics."

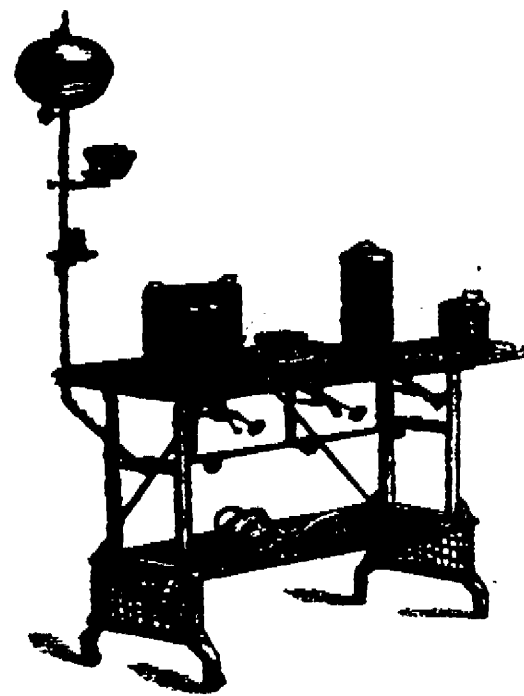
