GENERAL NEWS.

Godfrey Wentzel, whom General Butler promoted from his position as 161st regiment general at New Orleans, and who since the war has been lieutenant colonel in the engineer corps, died Wednesday.

The slaughter houses in Jersey City and Hoboken, employing two hundred butchers, have been forced to close on account of the competition of dressed meat from Chicago. The workers are organizing for a concerted movement against their western rivals.

The Kansas house, in making a cattle law, is making it so strict that the amount of compensation to be paid to the owners of condemned animals, it is believed that not over one hundred hives need to be killed to stamp out the disease.

J. B. Johnson, of St. Joseph, Missouri, confesses having killed the worth of his own horses. From the wholesale house of Smith & Co., with which to equal two stores in Colorado. He is a preacher of the Christian denomination.

The striking lasters in the shoe factories at West Abington, Massachusetts, have resumed work after the former rates. The engineers and firemen on the Great Western railway in Canada resolved not to entertain a proposition for a reduction of 10 per cent.

Charles Langheimer, who recently died in the penitentiary at Philadelphia, after serving half a century, is the convict made famous by Charles Dickens. Not long since he was set at liberty, but was permitted to return and die in prison.

E. J. Bennett, of Milwaukee, now awaiting sentence for setting fire to the building in which he lived, wrote a letter charging his wife with false statements, and then made an attempt to end his life by opening veins in his arm with broken glass.

Andrew Peterson, an avowed polygamist of Salt Lake, is on trial in that city for registering and voting in violation of the Edmunds act, who swore that they would obey divine law rather than statutes enacted by congress.

The crevasse at Carrollton, Louisiana, has been closed. A break occurred Tuesday morning in the Mulatto levee, near Baton Rouge, and at last, after forty feet wide and feet deep, threatening all the plantations down to Plaquemine.

Governor Cleveland has been asked by prominent citizens of New York to remove Sheriff Davidson for extortion and fraud. The senate has passed bills making the comptroller and the president of the board of aldermen elective officers.

Forty masked citizens of Marysville, Kas., forced the jailer to deliver to them Samuel Frayer, who had been convicted of the murder of John Pennington and wife. The offender was taken to the wagon bridge and hanged, after he had made a full confession of the crime.

The judge of the criminal court at Nashville, at the instance of a politician claiming an equitable interest in the paper, has enjoined the president of the American Newspaper company and the corps of editors from advocating in that journal a protective tariff or opposing a railroad commission.

Commissioner Fink has been advised by the Pennsylvania road that tariff rates are not being maintained, and has ordered a reduction on three classes and in live hogs from Chicago to New York. It is alleged that the Great Trunk has cut rates on 200,000 bushels of wheat destined for Liverpool.

A letter from Miles City, Montana, states that nearly six thousand Indians are slowly but surely starving to death at the Fort Peck agency. The game has suddenly disappeared, and the red men realized almost nothing from one thousand acres of land which they zealously cultivated.

Fire is still raging in the Pocahontas coal mine in West Virginia, where 153 men recently lost their lives by an explosion. Engineers have been sent there to locate fire chambers, and a force of oil-well drillers will set outwork to penetrate the mountain from the top in order to flood the mine through the borings.

In the criminal court of Chicago a woman who had stolen goods from three dry goods houses undertook to turn state's evidence against her pupils. She testified that with two indictments hanging over her, and her counsel demanding a retainer of \$100, she had to make a third raid to secure funds for her defense.

The discriminations said to be practiced by the Northern Pacific road have attracted the attention of the Chicago freight bureau. Commissioner Wicker has issued a circular to wholesale houses and their customers inquiring as to the effect of the recent advances in rates, and asking an opinion as to the best course to pursue.

The limited express train on the Port Wayne, ran into a land-slide near Salem, Ohio, Thursday morning, and plunged down an embankment. The boiler instantly exploded, killing James Richards, the engineer, and Charles Rhodes, the fireman. Eight passengers received serious injuries, but were able to proceed to Pittsburgh.

In the Canadian senate Hon. D. L. McPherson, minister of the interior, denied all knowledge of the bribery scandal in the Ontario legislature. H. G. Peters, a lumberman of Marquette, Mich., authorized an agent to expend \$10,000 for favorable legislation as to timber on pine lands along the Pigeon river.

Farmers in the vicinity of Hillsboro, Ill., claim that winter wheat has been greatly damaged by the recent changeable weather. The roots being generally exposed. On the contrary a Milwaukee grain exporter has received advices that the excellent condition of the growth crop in half a dozen states, with some slight damage in Michigan.

In the police court at Toronto, Tuesday, John A. Wilkinson and P. S. Kirkland were arraigned for attempts to bribe members of the Ontario assembly and were lodged in jail, bail bonds for \$50,000 being refused. Kirkland is a lawyer of Nashville, Wis., and is interested in the timber-land question along the border.

The veterinary surgeons investigating the cattle disease at Neosho Falls, Kas., happened to think of examining the hay fed to the sufferers. They

found wild rye containing twenty times more ergot than was ever before known in feed. It is claimed that the feet of the cattle froze because the ergot contracted the blood vessels and retarded the circulation.

Advices from Dodge City, Kansas, are to the effect that the cattle drive to the north has been abandoned, owing to the fact that the ranches on the Arkansas and adjacent rivers report the losses of the winter at 10 to 15 per cent, while in northern Colorado the average will be five per cent. Prices for hives may be a little lower than usual.

R. M. T. Hunter, ex-Secretary of the Southern Confederacy and ex-United States Senator, and who for the past fifty-one years has taken great interest in the politics of Virginia, is dying at his home in Essex county. He has been in feeble health for some time. He was a cousin of Edgar Allan Poe, the poet, at the University of Virginia.

O. A. Carpenter has been acquitted of the murder of Zora Burns. Five jurors on the first ballot voted for conviction. The wife and daughter, waited at night at the murder's residence to hear the result. The father of the murdered girl is so wild from grief that he is constantly watched. Carpenter would only say to interviewers, after the verdict, that he was at home on the Sunday night when the deed was done.

The New York senate committee on public health, which has been investigating adulterations of food, reports that half the butter placed on the market in that State is mixed with tallow, lard, or bone oil. Only ten samples out of thirty proved to be genuine. Many dairy farmers have been driven out of the business. Four-fifths of the milk sold in New York city is previously watered or skimmed.

Senator Sabin, John C. New, and others, representing the national republican committee, met in Chicago, Saturday, to arrange details for the national convention. Positive orders have been issued that the attendance at each session shall not exceed six thousand persons. The director of the musical festival, to be held in May, stated that the Exposition building would be arranged for the accommodation of 7,700 persons on the main floor.

Mrs. Georgiana Griffin, of Erie, Pa., whose elopement, with Charles Holmes, a colored hod carrier, created a sensation Thursday, was found concealed in the house of a colored man named Saunders. Holmes, who fled from the city to escape a coat of tar and feathers, got off at a way station and returning met Mrs. Griffin, and they at once went to the house of a minister and were married. Mrs. Griffin has been jailed by her relatives.
