

Mr. Roosevelt's hat and scratched him on the head. The soldier, with two companions, escaped. It is thought that he mistook Mr. Roosevelt for a superior officer against whom he had a private grudge. The house committee on public lands has

directed a favorable report on the bill appropriating \$250,000 to reimburse persons who settled upon or purchased lands within the grant made to the Northern Kansas railroad company and to whom patents for such lands were issued but against whose right to the land decisions were rendered by the United States courts on account of the priority of the grant to the railroad company. The bill provides that the reimbursement shall be at the rate of \$3.50 per acre. A metalic bomb with fuse attachment and bearing evidence of containing dynamite was stopped in the mails here a few days ago. It had appended to it a letter addressed to O'Donovan Rossa, New York. The bomb was sent to the postoffice department and greated considerable considerable. created considerable consternation among the clerks there. It was first sent to the inspector's office, but he refused to receive it. The chief clerk alarmed at its appearance, had it sent to the war department where some expert gunners succeeded in opening it. It was found to contain sawdust. Secretary Frelinghuysen has informed Congressman Curtin, of the house committee on Foreign affairs, that he will present to that body in confidence correspondence showing the necessity for the item of \$2:30,000 recommended to be added to the consular and diplomatic appropriation bill.

required to insure the control of the United States over the proposed waterways across the Isthmus of Panama along the Nicaragua route. Capt. Eads, of jetty fame, is opposing the appropriation, and accuses those who are advocating it of personal dis-

ADJUSTING DIRECT TAXES. Secretary Folger has sent to the house. with his approval, an opinion given by Controller Lawrence as to the equitable method troller Lawrence as to the equitable method of adjusting the matter of payments for direct taxes by a part of the states. He recommends that the sums paid by any of the states be refunded to these states, and that those which have heretofore falled to pay be relieved from the obligation. In cases where property has been sold by the government to meet these taxes, that the sums realized at such sales be refunded to the former owners of the property. The secretary adds a similar recommendation in regard to the partial distribution of the surplus revenue under the act of 1836. This plus revenue under the act of 1836. This money was to remain with the states subject to call. The secretary recommends that the sums heretofore paid to the states un der this act be formally passed to their pos-session, and that those states which did not receive the sum to which they were entitled upon the passage of that act be now paid

*FRELINGHUYSEN'S SCHEME. The house appropriations committee held a meeting Friday, at which Secretary Fre-linghuysen explained his scheme regarding Without puffery simply on the good words of those who have used it, it has made friends in every State in the Union.

Ilinghuysen explained his scheme regarding the Niearaguan Canal. It is, in brief, to buy from the present owners of the Nicaraguan Canal the concession of their rights and obtain the renewal of the same by treaty. It is understood that the De Lesseps people are watching for the expiration of the Nicaraguan concession in October next, for the purpose of gobbling it up and preventing the United States or any private company getting in and constructing a canal. It is alleged here that they have already captured the Eads scheme by some means, and if they can scoop in the Nica-raguan they will thus control the canal business of the isthmus. Charles Colne, the American secretary of the De Lesseps company here, is watching the movement of affairs very closely. The committee, after hearing Mr. Frelinghuysen's statement, agreed to recommend to the house to send the matter to a conference committee, and that that committee would agree to the appropriation as made by the senate, and thus probably be able to push it through the house without discussion.

DESERTIONS FROM THE ARMY. The senate placed a provision in the army appropriation bill which, if permitted to remain, will go far toward removing the principal cause of desertion. The amendment provides that enlisted mendetailed for extra duty as mechanics, clerks, laborers, or teamsters shall be paid for such extra duty at the rate of 50 cents per day for mechanics, clerks, and school-teachers, and 35 cents per day for laborers and teamsters. This pay is in addition to pay proper as soldiers. It is now the custom in the army to order enlisted men to perform mechanical, clerical, and farm labor at frontier posts and allow no additional compensation for labor thus imposed, and the result has been discontent and numerous desertions. Recently an order was forwarded to a frontier post to have enlisted men cut 400 cords of wood during the present summer and within two weeks the present summer, and within two weeks from the receipt of the order at the post thirty-live men descried. The omcers of the army have alway deprecated this policy of forcing soldiers to perform labor not contemplated by the terms of their enlistment. but the imposition has been necessary be-cause congress has uniformly refused for several years past to make appropriations for furnishing proper supplies. The senate amendment appropriates \$250,000 to pay for such extra work in the future, and if it be retained in the bill there will be less desertion hereafter from the ranks of the army
