Acting Land Commissioner Harrison says the Land Office has not force enough to straighten out all fraudulent surveys and entries and eject illegal settlers. The department has only twenty-five agents, or about one for every four land districts. "Now," continued Mr. Harrison, "the territory of Wyoming is divided into two land districts. That gives you an idea of the size of a district. There ought to be at least one agent to each district, and then he would have his hands full, but with only one to every four districts it is utter y impossible for him to cover the field. Mr. Harrison say that Congress has repeatedly been asked for an increase of the force, but has never granted it, and with its present force the department cannot make much headway in rectifying the wrongs and the frauds. The only case yet tried involving the fencing of public lands without authority has been decided in favor of the government. Other cases are pending. "There is one in Colorado against the Prairie Cattle company," said Mr. Harrrison, "and the surveying alone will cost the government several thousand dollars. We have to identify the land and that must be done by re-surveying." Commissioner Harrison added that the reports of fraudulent entries and illegal fencing had not been exaggerated, and whenever Congress sees fit to provide the means to correct these abuses it will be done. Chief Clerk Lockwood, of the interior department, says that the area of good lands is being steadily reduced, and the department is desirous of preventing seizures of large tracts, but congress has not responded to appeals for legislation to enable
