Potatoes are good; corn, what there is, and there are some fine pieces, is well loaded; clover seed is a big crop and a week more will put it beyond the harm of frost.

Death of Secretary Folger.

Charles J. Folger, Secretary of the Treasury, died at his home in Geneva, N. Y., Thursday. He has been failing for some time from a complication of diseases, produced, it is said, from overwork, but the general impression is that the foundation of his disease was laid in his defeat for Governor two years ago, when Cleveland had nearly 200,000 majority. It is said that he felt that such an overwhelming defeat must impair public confidence in him as a Cabinet member. He was a faithful official, but, like poor Horace Greeley, was too sensitive to wrestle with political defeat.

The Maine election, Monday, went, as was foregone conclusion, Republican. The Democrats made but a weak canvass, conceding the state to the Republicans, and claiming in advance that with the money and labor expended by the Republicans anything short of 25,000 Republican majority would be a Democratic victory. The result is the Republicans elected 16,000 and the Democrats conceded 12,000 plurality. The prohibitory amendment was carried by an overwhelming majority.

GENERAL NEWS.

Henry B. Anthony, who died yesterday at Providence, in his 70th year, was governor of Rhode Island in 1840.

Sergeant Fredericks, of the Greek expedition, who is now in Indianapolis, says the sentence of death pronounced upon Private Henry was executed by himself and Sergeants Brainard and Long, who put two bullets into his back.

An attorney of Syracuse, representing a Philadelphia woman, has applied to the court for an order to compel the \$50,000 estate of a Catholic priest named Guerdet.

A fight, forty-five rounds, with hard gloves, between Jim McHugh, of Glasgow, and Dave Fitzgerald, of Toronto, occurred Thursday morning at Rockaway Beach, Long Island.

Mr. St. John, an employee of the general land office, was sent to Colorado to investigate certain complaints.

All the cotton factories in the vicinity of Petersburg, Va., have stopped work, throwing out a large number of men, women, and children.

George P. Hargus, assistant postmaster at Alvan, Illinois, was trapped by detectives by means of a decoy letter which he opened, and he now lies in jail at Chicago.

The trunk-line roads centering in Chicago are taking grain openly at 20 cents to New York.

Scalpers are selling tickets from Chicago to Council Bluffs at less than the regular rate.

Members of the Salvation army to the number of two thousand paraded the streets of Toronto Monday.

A plot of land in the business quarter, designed for army barracks, was formerly dedicated, and a wedding ceremony was performed for a Toronto captain and a handsome English girl.

Charles J. Folger, secretary of the treasury, died Thursday afternoon, at Geneva, New York, in his 60th year.

Col. E. B. Cash, the South Carolina desperado, indicted for complicity with his son Bogart, in the murder of Marshall Richards at Cheraw last winter, will not be prosecuted.

Last Friday the British war-ship Mallard encountered the British brig Resolute in Trinity Bay, off the Newfoundland coast.

A BRAVE MAN'S DEATH.

The Story of the late Mr. Kistlingbury.

Greely, Sept. 10.—That he was a brave man, who died his duty on every occasion, and did it well, is a fact which is well known to all who knew him. He often spoke of his boys and of his friends in Detroit and Windsor. Just before he died he sang the doxology. While lying there he made a box from the fruit cans, and in this box he placed his wife's ring, the plants and minerals they had collected, and said that he wanted them buried with him, or sent to his boys, if the party was rescued when he died. He wanted to be buried in the North, where his trials and sufferings had been.

Kistlingbury was the most religious man in the party and he did much good among the men. He held services over the dead and prayed frequently with the living. His last words were, "Aggie, Aggie," his wife's name.

Lieut. Greely and his wife both knew Kistlingbury long before this ill-fated expedition, and both spoke of him in the highest terms of praise.

Among the party there was the kindest feelings. Mr. Clark saw and talked with all the saved, and they corroborated what Greely said. Officers and men shared the hardships alike. They slept together, and ate from the same dish.

It has been said that an American will joke even in the presence of death. The wretched, starving men had their daily joke by getting up and making a list of fare. While they were living on seal-skins they wrote out bills of fare, many of which are in Kistlingbury's journal. Each day one of the men would write a bill of fare, putting down the articles of food which he would like to have. It must have been rather grim humor when the starving men read of fried oysters, oxtail soup, breaded chops, etc., as they took their scanty rations. These terrible Barmecide feasts, however, ceased as death began to thicken the ranks.

When Mr. Clark spoke to Greely about the remarks that had been made in reference to the destruction of the boat and the failure to make an effort to reach the food on Littleton Island, Greely said: "My God! do you think there was any effort under heaven that was omitted by men in our position to better our condition? Our current between us and Littleton Island ran six miles an hour out to the open sea. Examiner Ellis reports the actual losses of the Second National bank of Xenia, Ohio, at about \$53,000, of which amount \$38,000 is charged to the cashier, and \$15,000 to the directors. It is deemed certain that the institution will resume soon, as an assessment of \$16,000 would be sufficient for that purpose.

A jury in the Cook County Probate Court, after listening to the testimony of Mr. William F. Storey, proprietor of the Chicago Times, pronounced that gentleman insane. The court appointed Mr. Austin L. Patterson, the present business manager of the Times, conservator of Mr. Storey's property.

Dr. Salmon has submitted his report concerning pleuro-pneumonia in Illinois to the Bureau of Animal Industry. If the infection shall be traced to the herd of Mr. Dye, an extensive Ohio speculator in Jersey cattle, he says it is probable the disease has been sown among animals of nearly every State in the Union. The malady is unquestionably pleuro-pneumonia.

A company to work the newly-discovered silver mines near Ontonagon, Michigan, has been formed at Milwaukee under the presidency of N. N. Smith, formerly warden of the Wisconsin prison.

The rail shipments eastward from Chicago for the past week were about thirty thousand tons, a decrease of nearly one thousand from the same week last year. The lake shore and West end of the Great Lakes secured 10.5 per cent.

A masked highwayman, displaying a rifle and three six-shooters, robbed the driver and four passengers of the stage between Weatherford and Graham, Texas, and is now being pursued by a blood-hound posse.

In the circuit court at New York, Judge Wallace decided that the Texas Pacific railroad must pay in cash the interest for the past two years on its income and land-grant bonds, amounting to \$400,000.

With the honors of the Greely expedition still fresh, the public is ill-prepared to learn that the Russian ministry of marine has planned a trip to Jeannette Island and a pedestrian tour across the ice-fields.

A tramp who was refused lodging at a farm-house near Indianapolis, spent the night in the orchard, and on Sunday morning he set fire to a straw-stack and caused the destruction of all the outbuildings.

John A. Robertson, a well-known theatrical manager of St. Louis, has been arrested for an attempt to blackmail gamblers, claiming that he had secured an agreement with the chief of police to secure protection.

Maggie Jones, of Baltimore, in filing a bill for divorce, alleges that she believed she was marrying a bachelor of 60 years, but discovered at his residence nine grown children, eight of whom were older than herself.

Over five hundred members of the British Scientific Association have since Saturday arrived in Montreal from Liverpool. A free excursion over the Canada Pacific road will be tendered at the close of the meeting.

Forest fires are still raging in the vicinity of Tawas Lake, Michigan. The hamlet known as Harmon City was on Sunday afternoon wiped out by flames. The black muck in the swamps burns down to the roots of large trees.

A storm in Manitoba Wednesday night injured fifty buildings in Winnipeg, destroyed a church, a paper-mill, and the Canadian Pacific freight-sheds at Portage la Prairie, and leveled the growing crops in a large territory.

A cow which cost \$3,000 in England, one of a train-load of imported short-horns en route from Massachusetts to the farm of James J. Hill near St. Paul, was burned to death by an accidental fire on the track near Albany.

The University of Notre Dame has received from the king of Spain a copy of the ancient portrait of Columbus, recently found at Madrid, and from a resident of Shanghai, a library of Chinese books with Latin translations.

Royal B. Conant, who was pardoned from the Massachusetts penitentiary by President Arthur, after serving some years for embezzling from the Eliot National bank, lost his right leg Monday by falling under a train at Peabody.

Two hundred striking brickmakers in the northern suburbs of Chicago assaulted their successors with stones and clubs. They wrecked the windows of a former employer and wounded his wife with a stone. A squad of police restored order.

The four villains who last May wrecked an Illinois Central train at Duck Hill, Mississippi, have been captured by Pinkerton detectives. The motive was revenge on the engineer, who was killed by the plot. The offenders are in jail at Winona.

The lake schooner W. V. Brigham was captured on Monday forenoon, and her captain and crew of three men battled with the waves until Thursday morning, when they were rescued and taken to Muskegon by the schooner Walter Smith.

The police of St. Paul are searching for Edward Mason, a lad employed in the People's bank, who is suspected of having taken \$10,000 from the safe last Sunday. No locks were broken, and the combination was believed to be known only to the cashier.

Richard S. Storrs, a professor in the deaf and dumb institute at Hartford, killed himself at Long Meadow, Mass. It is represented that he was a great sufferer from insanity, but that insanity has caused other suicides in the family.

The stockholders of the Second National bank of Xenia, Ohio, have agreed to assess themselves 33 1/3 per cent on the capital. The controller of the currency has given permission for the resumption of business when the amount named shall have been paid in.

An Old Enemy.

Macpherson, an eminent cholera historian, says that cholera is one of the most ancient diseases of which distinct description exists, and that there are few disorders respecting which such an uninterrupted chain of evidence has been preserved.

Epidemic, or spasmodic, cholera prevailed in the time of Hippocrates (B. C. 460), of which he gives a description, showing all the characteristics of the disease at the present time.

Avicenna, of Sicraia, in Saraceni, describes a fatal disease called vichula, embracing all of the striking symptoms of the cholera of the present day.

In A. D. 7, Celsius gives a full account of the disease. At that time, as also Galen in A. D. 181; Alexander of Tralles in A. D. 281; Aretaeus in A. D. 300; Rhazes in A. D. 800; and others, and we find a history of its prevalence down to the present date.

The high places of cholera are afflicted by the Ganges, spreading thence over the globe through the medium of the religious and commercial gatherings.—Chicago Labor Union.

"PROMINENT IRISHMEN."

Hollow Claims of the Jingo Organs Shown to Be False.

Edward Ryan writes to the Chicago Times from Shenandoah, Iowa, as follows:

A Shenandoah correspondent of a Chicago paper, in what purports to be a report of a recently-spouted Democratic rally held here some days ago, says, with incredible truth as it seems, "Edward Ryan, a prominent Irishman, intends to vote for Blaine." The "prominent Irishman" is at present ubiquitous. Always an alleged supporter of Blaine, he is painted by his new admirers in the chronic attitude of longing to see the "plumed knight" arrayed in reluctant pomp, potted in the arena against the British lion.

For my part, however, while realizing the honor done me by this local undescribed scribbler, I do not claim as a "prominent Irishman" either voice or vote in the coming election. My influence, my privilege on the 4th of November next will be that of an American citizen.

Further, more American than the duffers who would use the "prominent Irishman" at the polls, and after the election hold the species up to ridicule, I resent the graduation of citizenship by which you can tell the "Irish vote" and control it by fancied foreign issues. The distinction between the American and the naturalized vote is, however, no idle one in the minds of those who make it. Having its origin in the spirit of know-nothingism, of which Mr. Blaine has ever been the devout exponent, it served him recently as Secretary of State, and virtually president during the illness of Mr. Garfield—for the only apology he has offered the country for allowing American citizens to pine in British prisons, untied and unaccused. Deprived of their liberty solely because they were, as Americans, suspected of breathing the spirit of Democracy, these gentlemen with the papers of citizenship in their pockets, were denied by Mr. Blaine the fundamental rights of citizens. Why? Because they were not naturalized. They, forsooth, American citizens! No! They had not landed on Plymouth rock, nor yet could they boast one drop of puritan blood. They had only—renouncing allegiance to foreign potentates—sworn fidelity to the American flag, and the American constitution. They were for this—poor fools!—called citizens by courtesy, or "naturalized" citizens, but on behalf of such (international) tramps "it would be evidently ridiculous for our Government to interfere," says Mr. Blaine.

Blaine, indeed, the "foreign" citizen. For the "prominent Irishman" he will twist the tail of the British lion until the world may hear the roars of the royal brute, while to "entertain the 'Dutch' he will simply force Bismarck to eat American citizenship. The truth is, sovereign protection to the citizen in any part of the world, has ceased to convey rights that in Europe need be respected.

Under the pusillanimous administration of the party of "personal liberty," citizenship has been permitted to be dragged by monarchs in the mud.

In Germany the American citizen has no more rights as such than the American hog. Bismarck has long been wont to wash the deck of his proud ship with the blood of the "foreign" citizen, making the deluded "citizen" who trusting to his hollow certificate for protection, sets foot again on his native German soil give years of military service to the King, allegiance to whom the hollow document with the eagle on its crest has no more value than a piece of paper.

The "prominent Irishman," then, if he be not a myth, will hesitate before he votes for Blaine and the party of "personal liberty." If he ever did, with the motto that "now and then" is to offer an insult to the present Republican nominee with a blood-and-thunder foreign policy he has at length got vaccinated against the old disease by Mr. Blaine's hearty endorsement—officially given—of the cowardly conduct of "Lord" Lowell at London.

Finally, Mr. Editor, the "prominent Irishman" and his pledges to Blaine are, in the most of cases, evolved from the miniature brain of some garret scribbler.

The real man, however, will materialize at the polls in November. He will not then, as his new admirers would advise him, he cannot, by issues foreign to his duties, as an American citizen, make the deluded "citizen" who trusting to his hollow certificate for protection, sets foot again on his native German soil give years of military service to the King, allegiance to whom the hollow document with the eagle on its crest has no more value than a piece of paper.

ELECTION NOTICE.
STATE OF MICHIGAN,
SHERIFF'S OFFICE, CORUNNA, AUG. 20, 1884.

To the Electors of the County of Shiawassee:—
1884.—You are hereby notified that the General Election to be held in this State, on the Tuesday succeeding the first Monday of November next, the following officers are to be elected, viz.: Governor, Lieutenant Governor, Secretary of State, State Treasurer, Auditor General, Commissioner of the State Land Office, Attorney General, and Superintendent of Public Instruction; also, a Member of the State Board of Education of George F. Edwards, whose term of office will expire December 31, 1884; also, a Representative in Congress, for the Eighth Congressional District of this State, to which your County belongs; also, a Senator for the Twentieth Senatorial District, composed of the Counties of Livingston and Shiawassee; also, a Representative in the State Legislature for each of the two Representative Districts, into which your County is divided.

You are also hereby notified that at said election the following proposed amendments to the Constitution of this State will be submitted to the people of the State for their adoption or rejection, viz.:
An amendment to Section 6, Article 6, relative to Circuit Courts, provided for by Joint Resolution No. 15, laws of 1883.
Section 6. The State shall be divided into judicial circuits, in each of which the electors thereof shall elect one circuit judge, who shall hold his office for the term of six years, and until his successor is elected and qualified. The Legislature may provide for the election of more than one circuit judge in the judicial circuit in which the electors thereof are or may be situated, and the circuit judge or judges of said circuit, in addition to the salary provided by this Constitution, shall receive from every county of which such circuit is composed, such additional salary or compensation, as may from time to time be fixed and determined by such board of supervisors of each county in the paper Penitentiary is hereby authorized and empowered to give and pay to the circuit judge of the judicial circuit to which such county is attached, such additional salary or compensation, as may from time to time be fixed and determined by such board of supervisors.

An amendment to Section 15, Article 4, relative to the compensation of members of the Legislature, and to prohibit the use of papers or fire-locks on railroads, provided for by Joint Resolution No. 23, laws of 1883.—
The compensation of the members of the Legislature shall be a salary of seven hundred dollars for each regular session, and at such regular session they may legislate upon such subjects as are submitted to them by special message of the Governor, after the expiration of the fifty days of the session limited for the introduction of bills; when convened in extra session their compensation shall be a salary of one hundred dollars, and they shall be entitled to no other salaries than those actually received in going to and returning from the place of meeting on the usually traveled route. Each member shall be entitled to one copy of the laws, journals and documents of the Legislature of which he was a member, but shall not receive at the expense of the State, books, newspapers, or other personalities of office or any other perquisite or compensation not expressly authorized by this constitution; and no member of the Legislature shall be entitled to use any free pass or free ticket on any railroad during his term of office.

You are also hereby notified that at the General Election to be held above, County Officers are to be elected as follows: A Judge of Probate, Sheriff, County Clerk, County Treasurer, Register of Deeds, Foreclosing Attorney, two Circuit Court Commissioners, County Surveyor, and two Coroners.

The Nickel-Plate road recently took to Niagara Falls an excursion train of thirty-seven coaches, containing eighteen hundred passengers.

While boring a well on a farm near Savoy, Illinois, a vein of gas was developed which threw water and sand to a height of forty feet.

Dr. Paaren, state veterinarian, announces that quite a number of horses in Peoria, Illinois, are afflicted with glanders, and will order their shot.

Charles J. Osborne has been appointed receiver of the First National Bank, and has received orders to pay a dividend of 6 percent to depositors.

During a sham battle at a soldiers' reunion at Fremont, Nebraska, forty spectators were injured by the collapse of a platform, but none of them fatally. The Postal and Baltimore and Ohio telegraph companies intend to help the Bankers and Merchants out of their financial difficulties to maintain the pool.

The prohibition state convention in Wisconsin comprised three hundred delegates. Hon. S. D. Hastings was nominated for governor by acclamation.

Daniel Sifford, of Anna, Illinois, was thrown from a carriage with such force as to tear his left leg apart at the knee, the thigh bone protruding several inches.

Hanna Rutledge, a resident of Chicago since 1843, died on Saturday, in her 103rd year. On one of the coldest days last winter she walked seven miles.

The Northwestern base-ball league has sunk \$50,000 this season. The Minneapolis club has dissolved, and the Milwaukee nine will follow suit this week.

Indian Commissioner Price denies reports of an Indian outbreak in Montana, and says the stories are originated by herders to deprive the Indians of their lands.

Abraham Loeb, a Book Island, Ill., clothing dealer, gives a present to every purchaser of goods. Several other clothing stores have him arrested for running a lottery.

The corporation counsel of the city of New York declares null and void the Broadway railroad franchise, because the special meeting of aldermen was illegal.

The window-glass factories and most of the bottle factories at Pittsburgh, Pa., have resumed after the usual vacation, giving employment to several thousand men.

A deputy sheriff from Logan county, Ohio, locked a prisoner to a seat in a railway coach at Indianapolis, and on his return from the ticket office found his charge had vanished.

Edward J. Howe, cashier of an insurance agency in Montreal, after openly speculating for some months, has disappeared, leaving a deficiency of \$4,000 in his accounts.

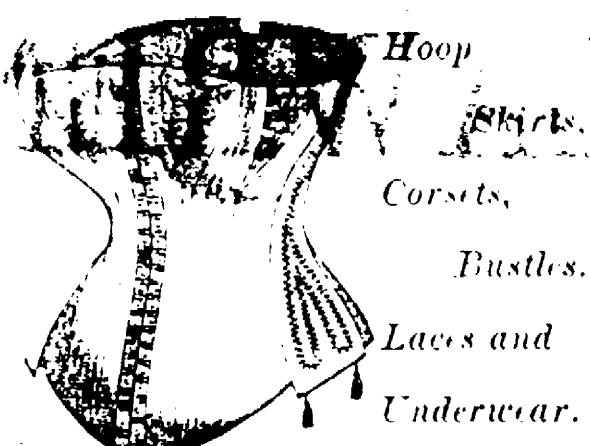
