MORE SHEEP KILLING BY DOGS.—A few nights after Mr. Converse had sheep killed by dogs, Bruce Buckminster lost a lot in the same way, and now comes a third case, the worst slaughter yet. Last Sunday night dogs got among J. F. Billmeyer's sheep and nearly destroyed his entire flock of 24 head, only one escaping uninjured—15 were killed and the remainder badly injured. All of these outrages occurred in the same neighborhood, just south of this city, and an aggravating feature is, no clue can be obtained as to the ownership of the dogs.

Wright, of Owosso township, wants to show what apples are doing in his part of the county, and he has brought us a basket of large, smooth, elegant Northern Spy and Spitzenbergs, which would have graced the shelves of the County Fair. They are placed carefully away, and next winter we shall test their superb eating qualities.

—The Saginaw Courier speaks in very high praise of the recitations of Miss Hattie Rowell before the Saginaw High School. In closing a eulogistic critique on the several recitations, the Courier says:

Miss Rowell's natural manner, the almost entire absence of anything like affectation, the natural rather than the exaggerated voice, all indicate that she has attained to an unusual degree of that perfection of art—artlessness. Her object is to organize a class in elocution and nearly one half of the High School remained after the usual hour yesterday, for the purpose, as Prof. Thomas expressed it, "of learning what Miss Rowell could do for them and what they would be expected to do for her."

Miss Rowell will give a reading and recitation, full program, at Opera Hall, Corunna, Monday evening, Oct. 20.

AN AFFECTING SCENE.—In a tribute to the late Wm. Frain, of Laingsburg, the Greenbacker relates the following incident of the funeral ceremonies:

One of the most affecting scenes we ever witnessed occurred at the church after the minister had finished his discourse. "Mr. B. O. Williams, of Owosso, the oldest pioneer in this county, and a brother Mason of Mr. Frain, attended the funeral. Mr. Williams has lived to see almost all of his friends and neighbors pass away. He asked the privilege of speaking a moment. Consent was given and Mr. Williams arose, but was so overcome by his emotions as to be unable to speak. While the old man stood there, the memories of the past rolling through his mind, the thought of the few who are left of his early friends, and the fact that while their number is growing smaller their feelings are growing more frequent, the tears streamed down his face, and a sob burst from almost the entire congregation. Finally, his strong frame shaking with grief, Mr. Williams was compelled to sit down and leave unsaid what he had designed to say.

St. Johns Independent: Our brilliant young townsman, Herbert A. Thompson, who, little over a year ago, constructed a Newtonian telescope, which was purchased by our school board, has added to his laurel another honor, won by industry and hard study, in the construction of a Cassegrain telescope, the large mirror of which is 12 inches; focal length 115 inches. The small mirror is 6 inches with focal length minus 32 inches. The telescope is the finest exhibit on the fair grounds, where it may be seen and tested.

Another Pioneer Gone—Mrs. William Warren.

Mrs. Wm. Warren, of Bancroft, died Saturday night, Oct. 11. She was one of the pioneer women of the county. Her husband, with his family, came to Shiawassee township from Rochester, N. Y., in the fall of 1836, and purchased 120 acres on section 35; later he removed to section 36 where he still resides. Of the privations and hardships of the pioneer family, we copy from the County History:

"The country was entirely uncleared, and as there were no bridges he was obliged to ford the river at each of the teams and an infant child was carried by him from Detroit, a distance of sixty miles, in his arms or placed in a handkerchief which was suspended from his neck. He began the labor of clearing at once, and at the expiration of the year had built a log house and improved eight acres. A pilgrimage to Pontiac was made for supplies, and the prevailing prices were such as to appal the settler who did not possess a plentiful wallet. Pork was sold at \$50 per barrel, while flour brought \$15, and often more, per barrel."

J. W. Jones, editor of a Welsh journal, died Wednesday at Utica, N. Y.

Heavy frost fell in the Yankton district Tuesday night, and is a severe one.

It is rumored in New Haven that Theodore D. Woolsey has resigned the presidency of Yale college.

John F. Steinman, a veteran of the war of 1812, died near Lancaster, Pennsylvania, in his 96th year.

Four men were killed and two others injured by the explosion of a powder mill at Cambridge, Ontario.

A circular saw burst at Green Bay, Wis., Tuesday, partially wrecking the mill, and slightly injuring two men.

Burton Parker, of Michigan, has been appointed Indian agent at Fort Peck, Montana, vice Snider, resigned.

The Pennsylvania company has again barred the Baltimore and Ohio road out of its entrance to New York.

The international electrical exhibition at Philadelphia closed Saturday. The net profits of the affair were about \$50,000.

The Brotherhood of Locomotive Engineers, Tuesday, at San Francisco, re-elected E. S. Ingraham first Grand Engineer.

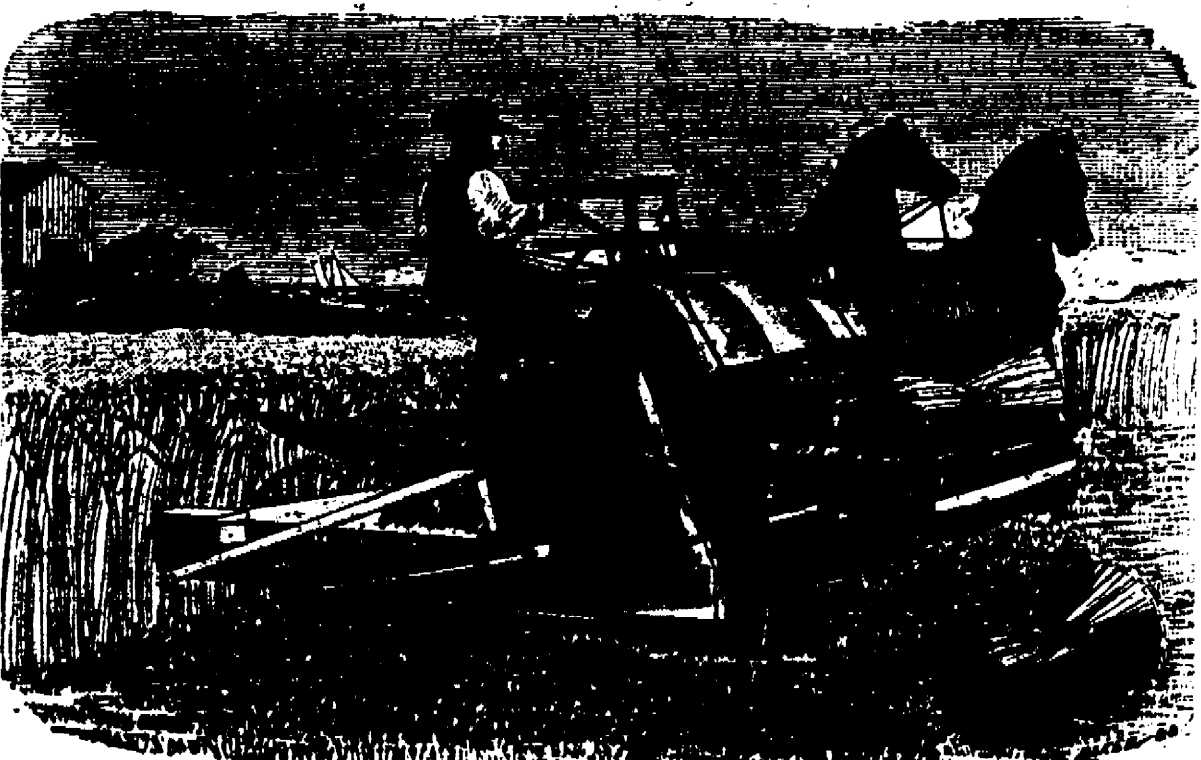
