United States Treasurer Jordan said in relation to his recent conference with New borrow gold not buy gold. I told them that we had no proposition to make. Three-fourths of the treasury's business is done through the banks. The treasury is paying out gold and legal tenders. The bulk of its receipts is a silver and silver certificates. Of course we can't go on indefinitely paying out gold and taking in silver.
