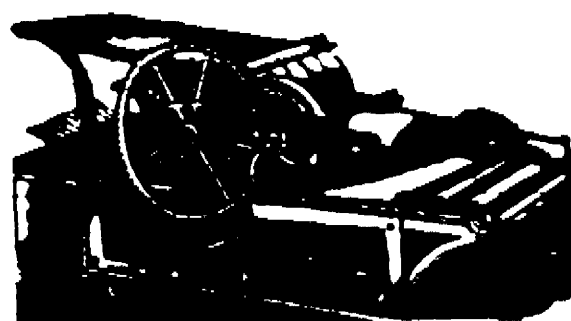

THE BEST ONE.—Just now there is a big crop of Grant anecdotes. Here is the best one we have seen:

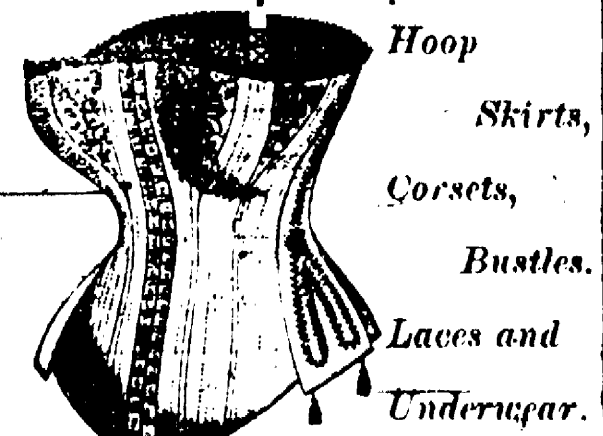

The bloody chase, was fairly ended over in the death of our Grant. The mail driven at Appomattox was over the grave of the conqueror. In the funeral cortege, as per custom, the federal Gen. John Johnston rode upon the Union flag. Sherman and the federal Gen. Buckner followed in the West Point classmate to the front, with Gen. Sheridan. At the rear, on the opposite side, Gen. Sheridan and Sheridan, stood Pritchard Lee, Gen. Buckner, and others of the south. Only a few partisans at the north, and so far a solitary, non-representative voice at the south, has uttered a protest against this fraternal demonstration, which exemplifies the varying of sectional feeling. The masses, both north and south have long been ready for this hour, but scheming politicians have kept alive, for partisan purposes, the bitterness of the war long since past. Grant, the conqueror, at last conquered the selfish schemers who sought to keep up a bitter feeling between sections of an already united country. Who shall say it was not his greatest conquest?

NEARING HIS HOME.

With Stately Honors the Body of the Illustrious Dead is Borne to His Final Home.

Funeral Services of General Grant Held at Mount McGregor.

Dr. Newman's Sermon an Eloquent Tribute to the Departed Soldier.

At 10 o'clock on August 11, the body of the illustrious dead was borne to his final home. The funeral services were held at Mount McGregor, where the body was interred. The services were conducted by Dr. Newman, who delivered an eloquent sermon in tribute to the departed soldier. The body was borne to the cemetery in a caisson, and the funeral procession was one of the most impressive ever witnessed in this country. The caisson was drawn by a team of white horses, and the procession was led by the Grand Army of the Republic. The body was interred in a vault, and the services were concluded with a prayer for the soul of the departed.

At 8:30 o'clock the doors of the Grant cottage were thrown open, and a stream of visitors poured in steadily for over an hour. At about 10 o'clock the head of a long line of people, composed of men, women and children, began to appear climbing up the steep incline near the eastern outlook, and soon the area in the vicinity of the cottage was thronged with horses and wagons and farmers with their wives and families. At 12 o'clock a train of two cars brought General Hancock and a number of distinguished visitors. The two companies of regulars were drawn up to receive them.

At 10 o'clock services were held in the cottage in the presence of over a thousand persons. The services were conducted by Dr. Newman, who delivered an eloquent sermon in tribute to the departed soldier. DR. NEWMAN'S TRIBUTE.

Dr. Newman's text was from Matthew: "Well done, thou good and faithful servant; enter thou into the joy of thy Lord."

The preacher said that some comrade in arms should speak of the splendor of his martial genius, some statesman review the majesty of his civil administration, some historian place him on the pedestal of renown, but as a minister of religion he wished to dwell upon the great character, which would ever be the Old Commander's crown of glory and the imperishable heritage of the country he loved so well. 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LAST SCENE OF ALL

The Tomb at Riverside Finally Receives the Illustrious Dead.

A Funeral Demonstration Unequaled in the Annals of the Republic.

LIVING IN STATE.

NEW YORK, Aug. 5.—Dr. Brush of Grant post, and Deputy Coroner Grant made an examination, and decided that it would be practicable to expose the face to view for a week if necessary. Mayor Grace came into the room with the head and stood looking upon the face for several moments. Two ladies stood beside him. The face of the dead was a chalky white, and there were dark blue lines under the eyes, but the mayor said that he thought the expression was natural and peaceful. As he stepped back, Lieutenant Colonel Floyd of the 22d Regiment, the badge of the Order of the Republic, pinned the badge of the Order on the left lapel of the General's coat, and Senior Vice Commanded Johnson of U. S. Grant post, fastened on the right lapel the badge of the Grand Army of the Republic. These were all the decorations placed on the body. They were put there at the request of Colonel Fred Grant. The plate-glass cover was screwed down on the coffin, and the coffin was carried out by the guards at the foot of the stairs, and the head turned toward the catafalque. The General Hancock then formally transferred the care of the remains to Supt. Murray, who with his police, will be in charge of them until the hour of the funeral on Saturday morning.

It was decided immediately to allow the public to view the remains.

VIEW THE REMAINS.

from 9 o'clock in the morning, and tomorrow from 6 a. m. until 1 a. m., and on Saturday from 6 a. m. until 10 a. m.

The 22d regiment furnished the first detail of the guard of honor, which will be on duty until the coffin is removed on Saturday morning. Fifty men of U. S. Grant post, No. 327, commanded by Commander Calvert, comprised the Grand Army guard of honor. The Grand Army veterans formed in single file on either side of the catafalque, and their hands locked behind them. Colonel Hancock, who was in charge of the catafalque, and the eight officers of the 22d regiment ranged themselves behind the veterans, and stood like statues in spiked helmets.

At 10 o'clock a central iron door was swung open to the public. Five thousand people who had been massed outside of the police lines on the plaza were ranged in double file at the edge of the plaza opposite the gate, and marshaled across the plaza straight up the steps. They passed through the gateway two at a time, at the rate of 100 a minute. Within each pair separated, one man or woman going to the right and one to the left of the catafalque, and leaving the building by the north door. Each one who passed the catafalque bent over slightly.

TO LOOK AT THE FACE.

In the first five minutes 10,000 people, and a court made during the day, passed, and showed that 5,800 had passed the coffin. All sorts and conditions of people were in the throng. Two Chinese laundrymen wearing flannel shirts slipped on the stairs, and fell over the edge of the catafalque. A colored man looked at the face of the General and a Grand Army veteran caught their sleeves and hurried them on. One of the Chinamen pressed his hands to his eyes and wept away with bowed head. A faded new-boy, negroes, and aged men passed up quickly, and women and girls walked by in groups. Every man lifted his hat reverently as he entered the building. At 10 o'clock, for a short time, 100 persons a minute were counted. A policeman at the head of the procession, passed him along to a policeman at his elbow, and so on past the coffin. Many persons complained that they had no time to look at the remains. As the throng dropped off only 125 a minute passed. In the hour, from 10 to 11, 6,897 persons, by a count, passed through the corridors.

NEW YORK, Aug. 6.—Not since the Duke of Wellington lay in state at Whitehall for an entire week, while countless thousands of countrymen swept in silent and sorrowful procession past his splendid bier, has the world witnessed such an ovation to a dead hero as was given to-day in New York to the remains of Gen. Ulysses Simpson Grant. All day long, from early morning to midnight, the city was a scene of an endless line of people flowing noiselessly through the rotunda of the city hall to pay last tribute of respect to the dead soldier.

The appearance of the hall where the remains are lying in state is strikingly picturesque. The walls and pillars are heavily draped with black. In the center of the rotunda is a catafalque on which rests the coffin. Behind the catafalque is a magnificent and highly artistic floral tribute to the great commander. Its design is that of a broken shaft resting on a large granite

foundation. The shaft is one solid piece of white marble, and is surmounted by a helmet. The helmet is a reproduction of the one worn by the General. The shaft is fluted, and is decorated with a wreath of olive and oak leaves. The helmet is flanked by two eagles, and the whole is surmounted by a star. The catafalque is a masterpiece of art, and is a fitting tribute to the great commander.

A LONE THREE MILES LONG.

The gates of the city hall were closed to the public at 1 o'clock this (Friday) morning. During the last hour seven thousand people hurried past the coffin, and when the gates closed it was estimated that there were ten thousand in the slowly-moving column who were obliged to disperse without viewing the body. At 10 o'clock the line was three miles in length, and continued over twenty thousand people. Those who look

on the city hall, the crowd along Fifth Avenue, and the line of people passing the catafalque, were a sight to be remembered. The line of people was a living river, and the city hall was a sea of people. The scene was a most impressive one, and a fitting tribute to the great commander.

are large palm leaves, and behind this dossal is an excellent bronze bust of Gen. Grant. Surrounding the bier on which rests the coffin of the illustrious dead, are the members of the Grand Army of the Republic who comprise the guard of honor. Hanged at intervals around the walls in stately attitudes and thrown into relief by the somber drapery, are soldiers of the 24th New York regiment in shiny uniforms of white, with brazen helmets, from which streamers of red and blue hang down. The room is lighted by eight powerful electric lamps, which make it as light as day.
