The Fearful Record of the Deaths from Cholera in Europe.

The Mayor by his deceit really compromises the health of all France, since for some days the suburbs have been afflicted. To-day he confesses to thirty-five deaths by cholera out of a mortuary total of 696. The suddenness of the attacks and the speedy deaths

are increasing features of the epidemic. MADRID, Aug. 17.—Returns from the cholera-infected districts of Spain show a total number of new eases Sunday of 4,706 and a total number of deaths from the discase of 1,758. The plague has appeared in Barcelona, where twenty-three cases and sixteen deaths are reported.

The cholera reports for to-day show that there were fifteen new cases and twelve deaths in the City of Madrid, and sixty-five new cases and thirty deaths in the province. The slight panic which broke out a few days ago has subsided. The epidemic shows no further sign of an increase. Wherever the disease prevails most stringent precautions are taken to prevent its spread. Parliament was prorogued Friday, the

Owosso, Aug. 17, 1885.
To Principals of Public Schools and Proprietors of Private Schools.

In pursuance and addition to an ordinance. of the city of Owosso entitled, an ordinance concerning the duries of the Board of Health, of the city of Owosso, providing for the maintenance of the public health, now in force. It is hereby requested by the Board of Health of the city of Owosso, that the council of said city adopt the following:

Istr Resolved, That whenever the Principal of any public school or the responsible head of any private school in the city of Owosso receives from the health officer of weight of the city a notification that contagious, infectious, or nestilential desease exists in any fectious, or nestilential desease exists in any of the city of Owosso entitled, an ordinance said city a notification that contagious, infectious, or pestilential desease exists in any household of said city, such principal of pub-tic school, or responsible head of private

school, shall reject from his school all pupils from such household, until he receives further notice from the same source, that such disease no longer exists in said household, and that the premises have been properly disinfected and renovated-2nd. The principals of all public schools hall reject from the schools under their charge, all pupils who have not been properly vaccinated, or have not had the small

pox or Varioloid, during an epidemic of Neglect or refusal to comply with these regulations will be followed by prompt prosecution, the penalty for which shall be \$100, (one hundred dollars) fine, or imprisonment,

On motion the council adjourned.
