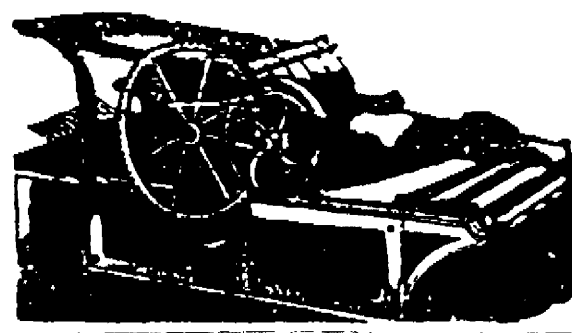

—The Grove Meeting one-half mile
south of Bell's Corners, last Sunday, was
a very pleasant occurrence. The grounds
were well seated and good stands were
provided for the ministers. There were
six ministers present and there was
a large assemblage of hearers. Eighty-
four partook of the communion; every-
thing was conducted in a very becoming
manner, and the weather was highly
favorable. We hope there will be many
more of the same kind.

—The Mexican Mine Owned by C. J.
Wimple and E. A. Todd, of Owosso.

Through the kindness of Mr. C. J.
Wimple we have been enabled to place
before our readers a sketch relating to
the Santa Felipe mine in Mexico, which
is a late and valuable discovery and has
recently been purchased by Messrs. C.
J. Wimple and E. A. Todd.

The Santa Felipe is four miles north-
east of Zacatecas, Mexico, and is the
south-east extension of the mine known
as the Veta Granda. The Veta Granda
is undoubtedly the richest mine in
North America. It has yielded to the
Mexican Government in bounty for
the period of 25 years \$700,043.33.

The adjoining claim to Santa Felipe from
1785 to 1838 yielded \$37,535.548.

In Mexico a ledge must be found be-
fore a claim can be taken. For 18 years
this point has been sought for by an en-
gineer superintendent who was a Mexi-
can. About 4 p. m. this Mexican stepped
into the hotel where several Americans
were seated when Mr. Wimple noticed
that something had occurred, and know-
ing of the search for this ledge he ac-
cused the Mexican in Spanish, and after
some conversation had passed between
them he went with the Mexican to the
new mine where he took out some of
the ore which he found very rich, being
loaded with Brittle silver, wire silver,
and sulphides. These Mexicans had
spent all they had to find the mine and
had nothing to work it with and there-
fore wanted to sell. They dug thirty-
seven feet and struck a pay streak of
four inches and at the depth of sixty
feet it widened to three feet of solid ore.

Mr. Wimple drove back with his speci-
mens and the Mexican, and ere Old
Sol shined his beams on Mother Earth
again, Messrs. C. J. Wimple and E. A.
Todd were sole owners of the Santa
Felipe mine which is causing much ex-
citement in the mining regions where
located.

A new shaft is being sunk and it is
expected that in sixty or ninety days
from \$3,000 to \$5,000 per day can be tak-
en out. Mr. C. J. Wimple will return
in a week or two to take full charge
of the mine. Zacatecas is 875 miles from
El Paso and is reached by the Mexican
Central railroad. It has 45,000 inhabi-
tants. The Zacatecas district has pro-
duced since 1548 \$1,000,000,000, an esti-
mate made and published by C. DeBorja
in 1932. The mine Santa Felipe is 157
miles from the city of Mexico. The
property is not for sale.

900 bushels from the yield, which he will
sell at \$1.25 a bushel for seed.

A Great Crowd and a Final Success.

Last night a great crowd of the general
public gathered at the Owosso Post
and neighboring community for the closing
of the exercises.

Local Post No. 145, A. R., and a large
embush W. R. C. N. 2. Everything A. R.
was in order for a fine presentation of the
visiting Posts and a street procession, but
but a drizzling rain came to mar the
program. The streets were crowded
with a waiting crowd, sheltering them-
selves as best they could under awnings,

crowd could all be present at the exer-
cises, but this part of the program was
also doomed to disappointment and after

The body of the Hall was soon filled
with members of the Posts, and the gal-
lery was packed by others who were for-
tunate in gaining early admission, while
outside stood a waiting, disappointed
crowd, far exceeding in numbers those
inside.

Henderson—T. C. Crane Post No. 128,
Commander, Charles Freeman, had 32 mem-
bers in line.

Byron—D. G. Rorpe Post No. 117, Com-
mander, L. G. Norton, had 23 members
in line.

Perry—Crawford Post No. 310, com-
mander, H. Hawley, had 26 members in line.

There were G. A. R. men present whose
Posts were not in line, from Cheesing,
Elsie, Gaines, Corns, and New Lathrop,
numbering at least 150.

Over one thousand took dinner at the
rink.

The band played an overture intro-
ductory to the exercises, and Duff's quar-
tette—C. C. Duff, T. J. Horsman, Henry
C. Moore and Wellington White—sang
"Home Again," with Mrs. Ida Lyon at
the organ. The music, both of the band
and choir, was very fine throughout the
exercises and was heartily enjoyed and
applauded. Prayer by Rev. Mr. Joslin.

Mayor Nolan made a very appropriate
address of welcome to the visiting Posts.

It was brief and to the point. Depart-
ment Commander C. D. Long, of Flint,
responded; he said that just as generously
as the citizens of Owosso had tendered
these hospitalities to the G. A. R., just
so happily does the G. A. R. accept them.

He spoke of the G. A. R. organization of
years ago from which has grown the
present organization with its great num-
ber of Posts and Comrades; all G. A. R.'s
should keep alive a spirit of patriotic de-
votion to country which should be hand-
ed down to their children with a love of
the old flag which the soldiers followed
through storm and blood. He closed by
expressing pleasure at being selected to
respond to the Mayor's welcome. [Ap-
plause.]

Mr. Quincy A. Smith, of Ingham coun-
ty, a former resident of Owosso, was next
introduced. He acknowledged his ap-
preciation of the honor of having been
invited to speak at this meeting of the
boys in blue, to meet with them 'mid the
stars and stripes, in a free, united coun-
try. Addressing the Comrades he said,
"millions will in future unite and call
you blessed—while we have one flag and
one country, the benefactors of our race
will live in story and song." It is fit
that those who fought for the Union
should band themselves together to per-
petuate the memories of those days; he
spoke beautifully of the non-partisan
character of the G. A. R. organization as
above political meanness—parties may
change but the immortal names of the
G. A. R. will rest secure in the archives
of a nation's love. In honoring those
whose names are written in glory, we
must not forget the brave boys who
stood shoulder to shoulder in the storm
of death. For our soldier dead, an im-
mortal crown for each; for our country,
liberty and union now and forever, one
and inseparable! [Cheers.]

Mr. C. A. Byerly. Especially fine was a
cross suspended from the balcony, con-
taining portraits of our nation's heroes,
with Washington for the central piece.

Among visitors present were Col.
Lechehead of Flint, Hon. C. Y. Osburn,
and his friend Mr. Kemick of Oakland
County.

A profound sensation has been created
in England by the action of the nationalist
conference at Dublin, and Mr. Parrell's
utterances are savagely denounced by the
London press. A banquet in honor of Mr.
Parrell and his colleagues will be given by
the lord mayor of Dublin next Tuesday.

In a speech at Rosendale, Lord Harting-
ton repudiated the socialistic programme of
Mr. Chamberlain, but advocated moderate
measures of land reform and the extension
of local self-government. He declared Mr.
Parrell's demands inadmissible, and said
that no party in England would consent to
acquire or retain office by concealing them.

During his recent visit to Kromsler the
ear was accompanied by his famous mas-
tiff, which has been carefully trained as a
body-guard. His majesty looked pale and
anxious, and evinced much anxiety for his
personal safety. The Grand Duke George,
his second son, was appointed a lieutenant
in the Imperial Austrian ulans by the Em-
peror Francis Joseph.

It is believed in London that peace be-
tween England and Russia is completely as-
sured. The final details of the agreement
as to the Afghan boundary are now being
arranged by the two governments. It is re-
ported that at the recent conference between
M. de Giers and Count Kalkofsky, at Kren-
shir, the latter pledged Austria's interest in
securing Turkish neutrality in the event of
an Anglo-Russian war.

GENERAL NEWS.

About 5,000 people witnessed the
sparring-match between Sullivan and
McClure at Chester park, Cincinnati,
Saturday. Six rounds were fought
when the referee gave a decision in
favor of Sullivan on the ground that
he had made the greater number of
"points." McClure, not having been
knocked out, and being anxious to con-
tinue the contest, was hailed by the
spectators as virtually the winner.

Conrad B. Day, of Philadelphia, was
nominated for treasurer of state by the
Pennsylvania democrats at Harris-
burg Wednesday. The speeches and
resolutions were severely denunciatory
of the deal between Vanderbilt and the
Pennsylvania Railroad company. The
platform endorses the administration
of President Cleveland and Gov-
ernor Patterson, favors a revision of
the tariff, and condemns sumptuary
legislation.

The recent explosion of the steamer
S. M. Felton at Philadelphia has been
traced to the agency of a man named
Adrian Spears, who carried a line of
accident insurance which would have
yielded him \$150 per week if he had
been seriously injured. Spears, how-
ever, was killed, and the payment of
his life policies, which call for \$35,000,
will be resisted. The deceased is said
to have bled the accident insurance
companies handsomely during the last
thirty years.

In the case of Metcalf vs. the City of
Watertown, Wisconsin, an appeal has

been taken to the United States circuit
court at Milwaukee. The case involves
the right of the city to require the
owner of a building to install fire
alarms.
