Washington government. England has submitted the Russian proosals to Lord Dufferin and the Ameer beore taking definite action regarding them. Meanwhile the British militia, called out at the time of the Penjdeh incident, has been ordered to demobilize, and the furloughs of Russian officers have been extended.

A profound sensation has been created in England by the action of the nationalist conference at Dublin, and Mr. Parnell's utterances are savagely denounced by the London press. A banquet in honor of Mr. Parnell and his colleagues will be given by the lord mayor of Dublin next Tuesday. In a speech at Rosendale, Lord Harting-

ton repudiated the socialistic programme of Mr. Chamberlain, but advocated moderate medsures of land reform and the extension of local self-government. He declared Mr. that no party in England would consent to acquire or retain office by conceding them.

During his recent visit to Kremsier the exar was accompanied by his tamous mastiff, which has been carefully trained as a body-guard. His majo gareworn, and evinced much anxiety for his personal safety. The Grand Dake George his second son, was appointed a lieuten int in the imperial Austrian uhlans by the Emperor Francis Joseph.

It is believed in London that peace between England and Hussia is completely assured. The final details of the agreement as to the Afghan boundary are now being arranged by the two governments. It is remored that at the recent conference between M. de Giers and Count Kalnoky, at Krenisier, the latter pledged Austria's interest in securing Turkish neutrality in the event of an Anglo-Russian war.




