Bags for the store-room and for holding bundles and scraps must be of strong stuff. 



For many years under rulings of the Pension office and former Secretaries of the Interior it has been the practice of the office, when a father who was himself serving in death, claimed a pension as a "dependent parent," to reject all such cases on the ground that the father, being at the time of the soldier's death in the military service, and supported by the Government, was not in fact dependent upon said soldier son. Commissioner Black has in effect reversed this decision, and holds that the fact of a father having himself been in the military service at the date of his son's death-the latter having also been in the military servce-does not, per se, constitute unexceptionable or imperative cause for the rejection of his claim as a "dependent parent."
