City of Durango, Mexico.

LETTER FROM WILL A. TONN.

My sudden departure from Durango (only three hours' notice) and having been very busy while there, will hardly guarantee a good description of that city and its resources. Durango is the capital of the state of the same name; it is situated a little south and east of the center of the state and is about sixty-five miles north of the tropical line. It is about 6,200 feet above sea level with a delightful climate; the thermometer in midsummer seldom being above eighty-five and in midwinter below forty degrees. It is a very healthy city, and an old saying of the people may not be out of place here: "The people never die, but dry up and blow away." The city is very nicely laid out and well built; it has a population of about 30,000. The better class of people are mostly wealthy ranchmen and mine owners, are well educated and very hospitable to people who behave themselves.

The Mexicans here do not seem adverse to the investment of American capital, but the foreigners who have the control of trade do all they can to hinder American enterprise. Any person visiting Durango with the intention of investing money, and wishing information would do well to call upon Gov. Placio, who speaks English and is a well posted, educated and hospitable gentleman.

Durango has a public hospital, one college, two seminaries, several public schools, twelve churches, three or four very pretty plazas, an alameda, the indispensable Plaza de Toros (bull ring), splendid baths, three good hotels, a number of mesons (inns), also the necessary government building and prisons. The police protection is excellent and they need no fire protection as the buildings are all of stone or adobe (dried brick or mud). The water supply is abundant and good, the greater part of it coming from the government springs which are situated a short distance from the city. The largest banking and commercial houses are controlled by Germans, other nationalities not being very well represented here. There have recently been several stock and timber ranches sold to Americans, and there are others here now looking for ranches. All of these people are investing in

CLOAKS ARE WAY DOWN.

It is predicted by a great many persons who are acquainted with the numerous, labor, farming and stock raising resources of the state, that Durango will become one of the richest and largest manufacturing cities in Mexico. The city is on what is thought by many to be the only practical railroad route between Mazatlan on the Pacific coast and the Gulf of Mexico on the east. It has two woolen and cotton mills, and employs about three hundred operatives and the other six hundred, two flouring mills, one iron-works establishment which produces about four hundred tons of iron per year, employing fifty men. There are in the vicinity two saw mills, and in the city a planing mill, machine shop and foundry, about to start also in operation a Turfite factory, several scapra factories, eight or ten tanneries and a number of sugar and cigar works.

The Iron Mountain Company have a furnace foundry and machine shop with the latest appliances for working iron, and I hope to hear soon that the works are in operation.

Local and Miscellaneous.

The business of the week will hold a special in Owosso, on Wednesday, October 22, at the residence of Mr. L. W. Woodard, a social gathering of the friends of the Owosso Association.

The Owosso Association, which was organized on Tuesday evening, October 20, at the residence of Mr. L. W. Woodard, for the purpose of raising money for the purchase of a new building for the Owosso Association, will hold a social gathering on Wednesday, October 22, at the residence of Mr. L. W. Woodard.

The produce market of Owosso is great this season. We are informed that last Saturday no less than 3,500 bushels of potatoes were bought there, and there was a great quantity of wheat, apples, etc., bought during the week.

William C. Glenn, a son of the postmaster at Owosso, Illinois, has been lodged in jail at Chicago, to be arraigned for using the mails for fraudulent purposes. He had several forms of letter-heads, and assumed different names in ordering rare postage stamps from dealers, giving bogus references. When dunning letters arrived, he secured and destroyed them. He thus managed to obtain nearly \$900 worth of rare stamps without paying a cent, and has also confessed the theft of a registered package containing \$900.

Peter McGeech, of Milwaukee, was Friday morning brought almost face to face with death by a stroke of what appeared to be apoplexy, and suffered intensely for some hours. His gigantic operations in grain, and provisions made him known throughout the country. Four years ago he is said to have cleared nearly \$2,000,000 by a pork corner, and two years later he lost a large amount in a hard deal, selling at 50 per cent. Recently he met with considerable success in the Pacific coast.

Jan. 1 last the fourth-class post-office at Holdrege, Neb., was placed on the list of Presidential post-offices. The post-offices have elapsed since that occurrence, not a single application for the position of Postmaster at that place has yet been received at the Post-Office Department. The recommendation made looking to an appointment. Consequently the Postmaster, although holding a fourth-class commission, is receiving the compensation of a Presidential Postmaster. This state of affairs is said to be without a precedent in the history of the department.

Postmaster General Vilas some time since called on Attorney General Garland for an opinion whether, when a Presidential Post-office becomes a fourth-class office by reason of a diminution of revenue, the Postmaster holds for four years under his confirmation by the Senate, or the office becomes vacant and subject to a new appointment of Postmaster. Attorney General Garland has given an opinion that the office becomes extinct when the revenues were reduced below \$1,000, and therefore, it was proper to appoint a new fourth-class Postmaster. The President in the department in such cases, which has hitherto been confused, will now follow the rule laid down by the Attorney General.

FOREIGN.

The War Spirit in Turkey Rampant and Hostilities Inevitable Unless the Powers Restore Bulgaria.

LONDON, Oct. 14.—A dispatch from Constantinople says the war feeling throughout Turkey is rampant, and a clash of arms over the restoration of the Sultan's suzerainty by the recent union of Bulgaria and East Roumelia is avoided it will be disastrous. In a circular to the powers, the Sultan is determined to permit no further encroachments upon his European possessions unless by force of arms, and that it is the duty of the powers to restore the Sultan's suzerainty. Much color is given to these statements by the activity displayed in arming and equipping the Turkish army and placing it on a war footing. Large detachments of troops, with heavy guns, horses, etc., are being hurried forward to the Bulgarian frontier. Such military activity has not been known for many years. At the moment throughout the country a religious war is being preached against the invaders of the Sultan's dominions. The Muslims are enthusiastically in their demonstrations, and are eagerly offering their services to defend the rights of the country.

A cablegram from London says it is understood that the sentence of Louis Riel will be commuted to life imprisonment.

The Turkish government has reminded the great powers that the armament of Greece is a menace to peace. The Porte has purchased fifteen hundred cart-horses in Hungary, to be delivered at once.

Thirty cases of cholera, of which seven have proved fatal, have appeared aboard a training-vessel off the port of Toulon. Surgeon General G. de la Roche, who is now in command of the French fleet, has ordered the vessel to be quarantined at once.

Serbian troops in large force have crossed the Bulgarian frontier at Nis, and as Turkey has ordered forward her soldiers in that direction, a battle may be expected early. King Milan is in command of the Serbians, who are advancing toward Sofia. Austria has warned the king that he need expect no support from him, and railways and steamers in that country have been notified to be ready to transport troops and munitions of war.

Grimm has proposed a plan for the settlement of the Roumelian problem, which is said to have been sanctioned by Russia, Austria, and England. It contemplates among other things, the recognition of the Union between Bulgaria and Roumelia under Prince Alexander, the latter to acknowledge the Sultan's sovereignty; the rejection of the Greek and Serbian demands, and the moral support of Turkey in resisting any attempt to enforce them. Active military preparations are in progress in Greece and Serbia, and the war fever in both countries runs high. Mr. Gladstone has written approving the Bulgarian union.

FIRE AGAIN.

Two Fine Three Story Buildings in Ashes—Also One Wooden Building.

Loss Estimated About \$100,000.

Two fine three-story buildings, one of brick and one of wood, were destroyed by fire last night. The brick building, owned by Messrs. Brown & Mahoney, was on Washington street, and the wooden building, owned by Messrs. Brown & Mahoney, was on Main street. The fire was discovered at about 10 o'clock, and before any aid could be made available to check the fire the whole interior, filled with a very heavy stock of goods for the season's trade, was a mass of smoke and flames. Not a thing was saved, and it would have been useless as well as hazardous to attempt to save anything.

The flames lapped up to the second story, which was occupied in front by Mrs. Emma Barnes as a residence and in the rear as a furniture store room by Henry Woodard, whose furniture establishment joined the burning building, and instantly it was all ablaze. Soon the third story, a hall occupied by the Knights of Labor, Stationary Engineer Association, and Carpenters' Union, was reached by the flames, and the entire building was one fiery mass. Not one cent's worth was saved from it. The fire department was sent promptly but from several causes time was lost in getting a stream to playing upon the fire, and then the hose burst causing another delay.

Meanwhile the flames spread to Lewis's grain and commission store, a small wooden building north of the Wesener store, which was soon also a roaring mass of fire beyond any hope of being saved. Anxiety was next turned to Andrus's hardware store, in the Williams block (brick) the next north, but separated from the Lewis building by two vacant lots. By almost superhuman work this building was saved from anything more than a scorching, although at one time it was given up as lost, and it was feared the entire block to Exchange street would go, and goods were removed from the buildings to places of safety.

The fire had also attacked the Woodard building, joining Wesener's on the south. This was owned by Mrs. W. A. Woodard, Jr., and occupied by Henry Woodard as a furniture store; it was filled from top to bottom with furniture which was mostly consumed, but the Silby checked the flames soon enough to save a portion of the walls, and prevent the destruction of the Gregory & McHardy building adjoining, occupied by Stever Brothers & Williams, dealers in agricultural implements on the ground floor, and a portion of the second floor, from which everything was removed; also the law office of Prosecuting Attorney Smith, second floor front, was emptied and valuable papers secured. But by great exertion on the part of the firemen, and citizens with buckets and pails the flames were stayed, with damage only to the rear portions of the building.

The G. A. R. hall, in the upper story, was not injured, except the ante-room. The old sheds and other buildings in the rear of the block, from Main street to Andrus's store, were all swept away. The heat was intense on the opposite side of the street. The beautiful Thomas block with its magnificent plate glass windows, was hung in front with wet blankets, and escaped with some broken transoms and upper windows and a blistered cornice which will necessitate repainting. Black's store suffered some broken glass. All the magnificent plate glass front of Dimmick's fine grocery store, with the exception of one window, was cracked—fortunately they are insured. Wet awnings were kept the entire length opposite the burning buildings and people were on the roofs keeping them wet with buckets of water.

The wind was from the south-west and cinders were blown to the north-east as far as Oliver street, endangering buildings in that part of the town. People were on the roofs with pails, extinguishing the cinders as they fell, and two or three houses were on fire. It was a fearful time far beyond the burning buildings, and doubtless, but for the fact that roofs were still damp from recent rains there would have been destruction of residences from flying cinders. Some families remained up all night watching their homes.

As near as ascertained at this writing, losses and insurance are as follows:

Mr. W. A. Woodard, Jr., lost \$10,000 on building, \$400 on stock. Some grain and produce were saved.

The Gregory & McHardy building is insured for \$4,000, damage not great. Stever Brothers & Williams carry no insurance, and lose \$200 by moving goods and damage by water.

W. H. Andrus was a heavy loser by removal of goods. Every article from the heavy stoves to shelf ware—was ruined from his store, for at one time it was thought impossible to save the Williams block, and there was great damage by breakage, loss of articles, and things piled in helter skelter, so that it is as much as they are worth to sort them, and they are still in confusion. Mr. Andrus estimates his loss at \$2,000.

The Williams block carries no insurance, and B. O. says it would have served him right if it had been burned; it was somewhat damaged. B. O. also owned half the north wall of the Wesener building, no insurance.

Loring's stock of books, stationery, etc., removed and considerably damaged in the operation, for which the Fire and Marine Insurance Co., of Detroit, allowed him \$80. Christian's jewelry store was also taken out, but not damaged.

Expressman Green packed the valuables in the express office and removed them to a secure place, and Postmaster Ball had the mail matter packed ready for transportation if necessary. Others on Washington street and Exchange street east were ready to vacate if the fire reached them. The danger on Exchange street was from flying cinders. C. J. Stuart's residence and Mr. Loring's barn did take fire, we understand, also a house on Saginaw street.

Mr. H. Lewis & Son have resumed business, occupying the north side of Exchange street.

Mr. Henry Woodard has opened business in the Woodard Bros' brick building, west Main street.

The Woodard building will be rebuilt at once and there are many plans for the Wesener lot—some talk of extending it to cover also the Lewis lot owned by B. O. Williams.

Mr. Fred Pickert, clerk for Murray & Terhush, was prostrated by heat and exertion and was in a precarious condition all night. He is now recovered, and the thick smoke is still rising from the ruins, and a strong smell of burning woolsens tell the sorrowful tale of the elegant carpets smoldering in Brown & Mahoney's basement.

The work of clearing away the ruins has commenced, preparatory to re-building.

Fireman Jones says the Silby was ready for work in just eleven minutes from the first alarm of fire, and that the delay in getting to work was from the condition of the hose.

It is believed that the Gregory & McHardy building could not have been saved but for a fire-wall placed between it and Woodard's, by the late Henry Gregory, who was noted for his watchfulness against fire, and an iron door, also his precaution, from the hall into Smith law office.
