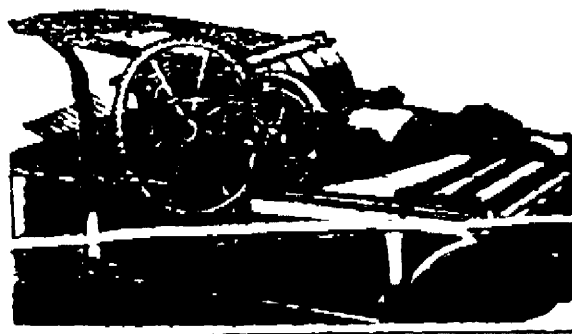

Precautions Against Thieving.

In the matter of pay for services the general assumption in the business of New York City has come to be that all men are thieves. That seems harsh and hard, but experience has taught that every hauler of one's money as possibly dishonest. It is only ten years ago that the street-car conductors were indignant because the bell-punch was introduced; but some of them soon proved, by ingenious devices to beat it, that they deserved the precaution.

Mechanical guards against stealing have multiplied, until now a machine for registering receipts is conspicuous on half of the cashier's desks in town.

Bar-tenders in the bigger groggeries have to hand all the money to a chap behind a counter, that stamps the amount of every sale on a strip of paper, and drops a clipped bit into a locked receptacle. There is a man who owns thirteen large bar-rooms, all extravagantly fitted up, and located in places of fashionable thronging. He says that he would be ruined in a year, instead of enriched by his extensive business, if he did not take such measures against pilfering. Every horse-car company uses a complicated and effective system of bell-ringing and registry for fares. Retail stores of all kinds are similarly outfitted. Even the more prosperous soda water and cigar-stands are provided with checks, and clock-work to enforce honesty. On the Brooklyn elevated railroad the ticket-sellers do not so much as touch the tickets, but jigger them out through the sport of a registering machine, from which the passengers carry them to the drop boxes at the gates. Thus nobody employed in the stations ever handles a ticket, and there is no chance for collusion. Rosentment over these things has worn away, and I shouldn't be much surprised at the early introduction of patent, self-registering contribution baskets in churches. The good Deacon Huyler, noted for piety and fresh-every-hour candy and wafers, eulogized after his recent death for having insisted that the girls in his store should all belong to his Sunday-school class, did not allow religion to be their only shield against temptation.

"What makes you use checks and a punching box on your counters, Brother Huyler?" a fellow churchman asked.

"Are not your young ladies honest?"

Great Fire in Galveston, Texas.

FIVE HUNDRED FAMILIES HOME LESS—LOSSES \$3,000,000.

A fire which broke out in Galveston Friday morning was so fanned by a high wind that it was beyond all control.

It burned until it had consumed the city, and there was nothing left in its track but ruins.

Some 300 houses are now in ashes; 500 families are homeless. The loss is not far either way from \$3,000,000. The insurance is about half that sum.

The fire broke out in a small foundry on the north side of Strand street, near the corner of sixteenth. The flames rapidly spread under a stiff north wind, and it was soon evident that there was to be a great conflagration. Immense clouds of sparks were carried four or five squares over the roofs of wooden houses.

The entire fire department was on the ground, but they seemed helpless and unable to help the flames because of the fierce wind and suffocating smoke. By 3:30 o'clock fifty buildings had been burned. By five o'clock the fire had reached the corner of sixteenth and Seventeenth streets. About 4 o'clock the fire began to spread to the east and to the west of Sixteenth and Seventeenth streets. The wind raised to a gale and the fire raged. For a time it seemed as though the entire eastern half of the city was doomed. The fire spread rapidly to the southward, licking up blocks of elegant residences, hastily abandoned by their inmates. By 7 o'clock the fire had reached Broadway, which threads the center of the island, running east and west. At 7 o'clock the wind gave signs of dying away, and shortly it began to shift, then to decrease, until by 8 o'clock only a fair breeze was blowing. But by this time the fire had eaten its way to Avenue O, where, at 9 o'clock, it seemed to exhaust itself, and the firemen coming up choked its further ravages at this point, or within two blocks of the gulf.

The burned district covers fifty-two blocks, seven of which are not swept entirely clean. It is sixteen blocks in depth, and averages a width of three blocks.

SUSPENSION OF SILVER COINAGE.

It is learned at the State Department that, contemporaneously with the mission of Stanton Macle to Europe in relation to the question of gold and silver coinage, the President delegated George Walker, the present Consul General at Paris, and well known as an ardent bimetalist, and a writer upon monetary questions, to attend the sessions of the congress of the states, comprising the Latin Union and make a report of their proceedings. Although not formally admitted to their deliberations, Mr. Walker held discussions with members of the congress, and addressed to them certain observations of the profound interest to the United States in the important question of bimetalism. Mr. Walker dispatches to the department that he will transmit copies of his observations, which in English and French were laid before the delegates.

The final action of the congress on this question was announced by Minister McLane in a dispatch to the State Department Tuesday, and is as follows:

France, Greece, Italy and Switzerland have renewed monetary conventions for the redemption of silver coin redeemable in gold. No additional silver coinage permitted. Convention open to Belgium.

TICK PORK PROBLEM.

Several Western members of Congress have expressed a determination to advocate retaliatory legislation of some sort against countries discriminating against or prohibiting the importation of American pork. Inquiry was made by the State Department to learn whether it is negotiating to remove such objectionable restrictions. Assistant Secretary of State Porter said that from its prohibitory decree and permitted the importation of American pork under certain restrictions, and to that effect the department would be notified.

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A. A. McLean, who has been elected president of the Michigan State Association of Political Life, has been given as his reasons. Perhaps also, Michigan has become a decidedly a doubtful state for the governor to care to enter the race.

The Democratic victory in Virginia is even more sweeping than was at first believed. Fitzhugh Lee captures the state by a majority of 10,000, and the Democrats control the Legislature by a two-thirds majority. This is Mahan's last day, and Mahan's organ, the Richmond Whip, has gone into the hands of a rival.
