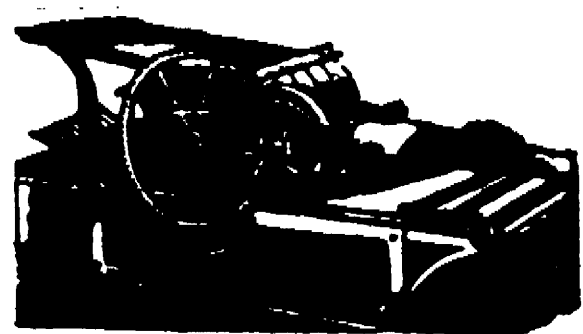

HENDRICKS DEAD!

Found Dead in His Room by His Faithful Wife. The Cause.

Indianapolis, Ind., Nov. 30. The remains of Vice President Hendricks

The Widow of the Dead Vice President Visits the Remains at Night.

INDIANAPOLIS, Nov. 30. Vice President Hendricks died at his residence, on North Tennessee street, this city, at 2 o'clock yesterday evening. The death was caused by a heart attack, which was brought on by the shock of the news of the death of his wife, Mrs. Hendricks, which occurred at the same time.

The shock to her nerves that it was with the greatest difficulty that she could talk upon the subject at all. The city is in mourning, and the great heart of Indiana is bleeding over the remains of her distinguished son.

Mr. Hendricks returned from Chicago Monday suffering from a very severe cold, but his condition was not such as to awake fears for his safety.

Dr. Thompson, the family physician, was called, and the patient insisted upon having colored admittance to him. This the physician refused to do, owing to the protesting efforts which the drug always refused to upon Mr. Hendricks, and he gave him an emetic and later in the day he was taken to his room.

At night the Vice President had so much improved that he and Mrs. Hendricks attended a reception at the residence of State Treasurer Cooper, where they remained till midnight, during the entertainment, Mr. Hendricks was in personal appearance as well as usual, and none save a few to whom he spoke about the matter supposed that he was suffering from any ailment.

He complained to one or two, however, that he was feeling unwell, but did not express any apprehensions of fatal consequences. He slept well during the night and arose this morning apparently refreshed and feeling better. An hour or two later he was taken with a rigor, and despite the efforts of the attending physician the chill remained unbroken for quite an hour. He was seriously prostrated as a consequence, but the doctor was not inspired and he engaged in conversation with the patient on several subjects, among which was the Vice President's expected departure for Washington, and his resumption of duties as President of the Senate. Mr. Hendricks, however, appeared to be oppressed by his sickness, and was very solicitous that Mrs. Hendricks should always be near him. If she left the room for a moment he inquired concerning her, and appeared ill at ease until she returned to the room.

His disposition was developed, Mrs. Hendricks continued by his side, and was present during the visit of the physician.

A few minutes before 5 o'clock Mr. Hendricks turned to the physician and said, "What do you refer?"

"I mean I am free from pain," was the reply.

The physician then left the house, and Mrs. Hendricks was called below to see a friend. When the caller was first announced, Mrs. Hendricks hesitated about going down, but being reassured by the remark of her husband, she left his bedside and passed down to the parlor. She was delayed longer than she expected, and when she returned to the room she found that Mr. Hendricks was dead. The end of a busy life had come peacefully and quietly. On his face there was no indication of pain or suffering, and his eyes were only half closed, as if in a gentle sleep. There was nobody in his room when he died, and only Mrs. Hendricks, the servants and a caller in the house.

The physicians attribute the Mr. Hendricks' death to paralysis of the heart, for had it been apoplexy there would have been some indications of it in the appearance of his face. He complained principally of his stomach this morning, although there was a nervous twitching of the muscles of his face.

At a meeting of a number of prominent citizens held in the United States District Court-room to-night, a committee, consisting of Senator Ben Harrison, W. H. English, Judge W. E. Niblack, Noble C. Butler and Aquilla Jones, was appointed to confer with the family and make all the arrangements for the obsequies. Mrs. Hendricks is in receipt of dispatches from all sections of the country, offering sympathy in this, her saddest hour of bereavement. The city, irrespective of party, mourns with her.

The funeral will be held at St. Paul's cathedral, Indianapolis, next Tuesday noon, and the remains will be laid in Crown Hill cemetery. The body has been embalmed. Mrs. Hendricks declines to permit an autopsy, feeling certain that it was a paralysis of the heart. Telegrams of condolence have been received from Samuel J. Tilden, David Davis, Senators Dawes and Edmunds, the Japanese minister, Mrs. General McClellan, and many others. The Troquois club of Chicago, after adopting a suitable tribute to the memory of the dead statesman, appointed a committee of twenty to attend the funeral.

INDIANAPOLIS, Ind., Nov. 28. President Cleveland and several members of his cabinet have decided to leave Washington on Monday morning for Indianapolis, notwithstanding the fact that Senator Edmunds, Speaker Carlisle, and several others have urged the chief magistrate not to take the risk incident to the trip. R. B. Hayes has sent to Mrs. Hendricks a telegram of condolence.

condolence. Governor Harrison, and said with the following: A President and a nation are united in grief.

Parsons, who was in the city, and east of Mr. Hendricks' residence, to his death, and was a great admirer of the deceased.

Another Natural Bridge—Chance for a

German Summer Garden.

In your last Saturday's edition was an interesting description of the "Rock Bridge of Arizona," which prompts me to give you a description of one of Nature's works more wonderful, I think, than the new wonder of Arizona. Some years ago, while rustling in the hills, I connected a lone cowboy, who guided me to a natural bridge and cave he had found while hunting for stray cattle in the canyons. So you can go by rail to Hutchinson, Kas., and from there by wagon road 120 miles to a little old-time trading post called Sun City near the west line of Barbour county, Kansas, and on the Medicine Lodge river. A mile east of said place Bear Creek empties into the river from the south. By following the creek bed you can drive up into the hills some four miles, where you must leave your vehicle, and go on foot or horseback if your neck is insured. Some five miles from the mouth of the creek you will find an almost unknown wonder. The canyon through which Bear Creek courses its way from the Indian Territory appears to have been crossed here by a backbone or ridge some sixty feet in height, and the water has worked a tunnel under the ridge, leaving a bridge of sparkling gypsum stone spanning the creek about sixty feet in length and twenty feet wide, over which an old and well-known buffalo trail passes. The arch through which the creek passes is from fifteen feet high at the ends to twenty feet in the center. The ceiling is well domed with swallow-nests, and there are no evidences of recent wearing away of the ceiling or walls. About twenty feet from the bridge, and some six feet above the creek bed, is an opening in the west bank or wall just large enough to let a person pass in a stooping posture. By the light of a faint of cedar I explored this cave, passing through rooms of irregular shapes, and again crawling through uncomfortably small apertures and coming out through an opening not more than eighteen inches wide and three feet high, a hundred feet or more below the bridge. Regular meeting of the Common Council of the City of Owosso.
Present—His Honor, Mayor Nelson, Clerk Turner, Ald. Friescke, McDonald, Lewis, Keyte, Titcomb, Stever, Struber and Woodard.

Minutes of the last meeting read, and after making one correction approved. Ald. Friescke presented a petition signed by A. D. Sutton and 12 other taxpayers praying for the opening and grading of Jeanette street, from Adam street to Mulberry street, also to open and grade Pine street to Jeanette street, at the north end, which motion was referred to the committee on Grading and Sidewalks.

Turner presented a petition signed by P. S. Crawford, praying for the construction of a sidewalk to be built on the west side of Saginaw street, commencing on the north side of Goodhue street and running south to connect with the walk on Oliver street, which petition upon motion was also referred to the committee on Grading and Sidewalks.

The committee on Opening Streets also presented a resolution for the opening of Stewart street, which was accepted and adopted, ayes 8, nays 0. The same committee also presented a resolution for the opening of Ridge street, which upon motion was accepted and adopted, ayes 8, nays 0.

Clerk Turner presented a petition signed by T. M. Wiley and 23 others, praying that the Council remit the license required to be paid for the Ella Adams Music entertainment, which upon motion was laid upon the table.

The committee on Ways and Means asked for and were granted further time in which to report upon the matter of the contract with the Owosso Gas Light Company.

Ald. Keyte moved that the matter of refunding sprinkling tax to George E. Thomas, which he had paid twice be referred to the City Attorney, which motion was adopted.

Upon leave of the Council, Rev. G. H. Nelson made some remarks in regard to raising entertainments.

Ald. Lewis presented an ordinance to regulate the licensing of entertainments; an ordinance was ordered read by its clerk the first and second times, unanimously consent was given, the ordinance was read in full, placed upon its passage and lost. Yeas 2 as follows: Lewis

and Woodard. Nays 6 as follows: Friescke, McDonald, Keyte, Stever, Struber and Titcomb.

The City Attorney presented the following resolution which upon motion was accepted and adopted, ayes 8 nays 0.

Resolved, That Section 1 of an ordinance entitled "An ordinance to prohibit, restrain and regulate sports, exhibitions of natural or artificial curiosities, caravans of animals, theatrical exhibitions, circuses and other public performances and exhibitions for money within the city of Owosso," approved Nov. 24, 1885, be and the same is hereby amended so as to read as follows:

Sec. 1. "The Common Council of the city of Owosso, do ordain that no person or persons shall exhibit or assist in exhibiting any sports, exhibition of natural or artificial curiosities, caravans of animals, theatrical exhibitions, circuses or other public exhibitions for money, unless such person or persons shall have obtained a license therefor as hereinafter provided, except churches, benevolent and humanitarian organizations existing in said city, which organizations within the meaning of this ordinance, shall be exempt from any license.

The City Attorney was instructed to employ assistant counsel if he so desired to help in the trial in the case of Everett T. Woodbury against the city, which is to come off at the December term of the Circuit Court.

On motion the Council adjourned.
