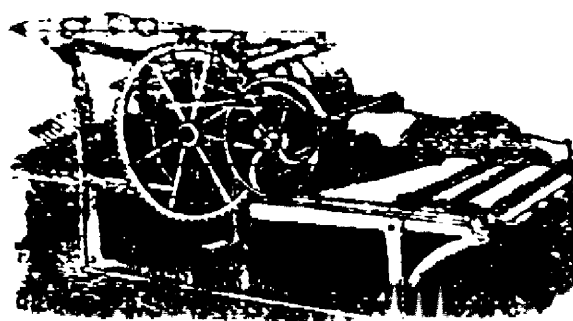

LANSING, March 26, 1886.

The Postmaster-General has sent a statement to the Senate showing that the number of removals of fourth-class Postmasters during the first year of the present Administration was 100. Of these there were 613 in Illinois, 429 in Indiana, 304 in Iowa, 305 in Wisconsin, 243 in Michigan, 244 in Minnesota, 130 in Nebraska, 131 in Dakota, and 236 in Kansas. There were 1,033 removals in New York State alone.

CONGRESSIONAL

Senate.

MARCH 22.—There was a lively passage of a bill for the relief of the army, which is implied in Gen. Logan's bill for the promotion of the efficiency of the army. Senator Hale could not see any necessity for the increase of the army. He thought we had troops enough ten years ago, and that the need for troops now was less than it was twenty years ago. He said that he had for years been trying to get the number of enlisted men fixed at 20,000, and that the generals of the army had been asking for more troops. Senator Logan's bill was strong in its effect. When both parties refuse voluntary arbitration it is hard to tell what can be done. It is a question how far force may be used under this form of government when there is no justice. The question of personal liberty is here involved.

MARCH 23.—Senator Van Wyck got through the Senate today a bill that is of very great importance in the public land states and territories, and especially to people who are perfecting claims under the timber-culture act. It provides that patents shall be granted for lands taken under the timber-culture act, or timber-culture law, if the laws have been complied with according to the established construction of the laws at the time the original entries were made. For years past the laws have been very liberally construed in the general land office. Commissioner Sparks is protesting the public interest by construing the laws strictly. The result is that some claimants to public lands have been refused patents on the ground that they had not complied with the law, when they had complied with the law as it was construed when they made their entries. For example, the law provides for the location of claims on lands devoted to timber. The law officials have been construing the phrase "devoted to timber" to mean "not having

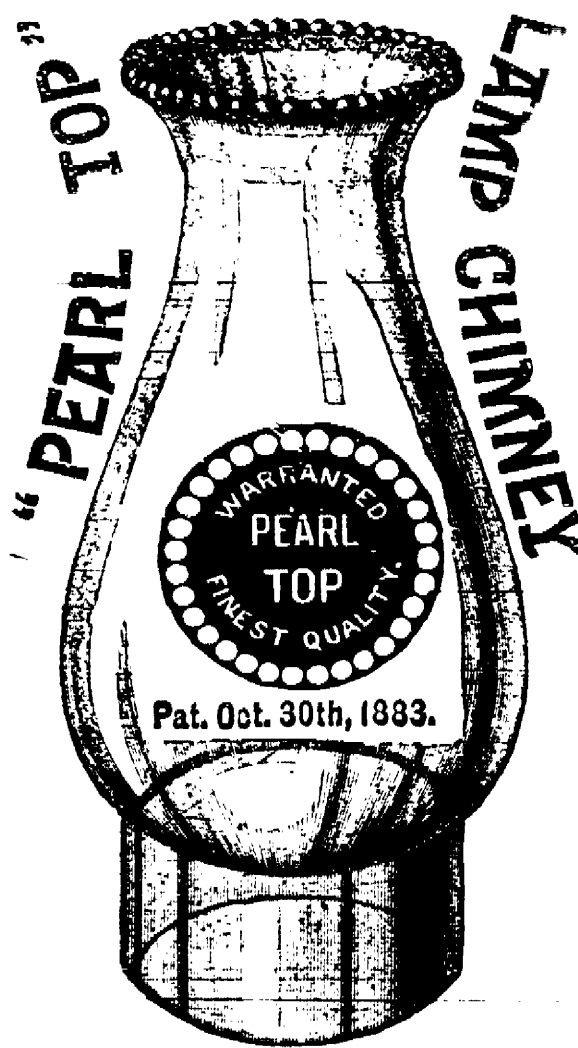

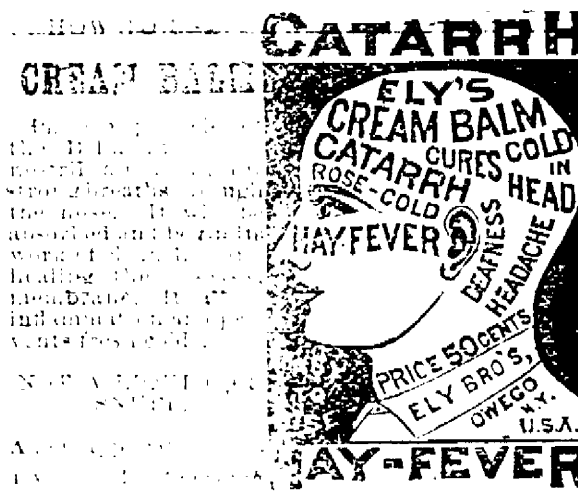
