

The only settled facts about earthquakes are that they are the result of ple. some shock imparted to the rocks at a considerable distance beneath the surface, and that this shock reaches the surface in a series of concentric rings, all points on the circumference of each ring receiving the shock at the same moment, even though they may be hundred miles apart. In other words, all points at equal distances from the center of the earthquake receive the shock at the same moment. Although this is theoretically the case, according to wellknown physical laws, still, in practice, the facts are somewhat different; for the shock is retarded or accelerated according as the rock opposes or favors the passage of the wave.



In his message to Congress on the labor troubles, which, he says, is a serious and pressing subject, President Cleveland says the interests of labor are ex-pecially entitled to legislative care. In our county, which offers the highest social and political attainments to all of its citizens, its working men cannot justly be irrevocably consigned to the limits of a class. "The laboring man, bearing in his hand an indispensable contribution to our growth and progress, may well insist, with manly courage and as a right, upon the same recognition from those who make our laws as accorded any other citizen having valuable interests in charge, and his reasonable demand should be met in such a spirit of appreciation and fairners as to induce a contented and patriotic co-operation in achievement of a grand national destiny.

The President ascribes the present unsatisfactory condition of the relations of labor and capitol to the grasping and needless exactions of employers and the alleged discriminations in favor of capital as an object of governmental attention. It must be conceded that laboring men are not always careful to avoid causeless and unjustifiable disturbance. While the power of the federal government to remedy the existing evils is limited by constitutional restrictions the President thinks that something may be done. He thinks the proper theory on which to proceed is that of voluntary arbitration. But he suggests that Instead of arbitra-. tors chosen in the heat-of-conflicting claims, and after each dispute shall arise, there be created a commission of labor, consisting of three members, who shall be regular officers of the government, charged among other duties with the consideration and settlement, when possible, of all controversies between labor and capital. A commission thus organized would have the advantage of being a stable body, and its members, as they gained in experience, would constantly improve in their ability to deal intelligently with questions which might be submitted to them. If arbitrators are balicsen for temporary service as each case of dispute arises, experience and far miliarity with much that is involved in the question will be lacking extreme partisanship and bias will be the qualifications sought on either side, and fre






