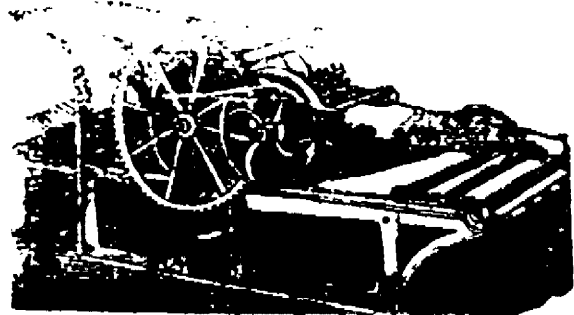

At the annual meeting of the Michigan Democratic Association in Washington, D. C., held at the Hotel de Ville, this week the following resolutions were adopted:

Congressman Tamm has been invited to deliver an address before the Ohio Democratic Association in Washington.

GENERAL NEWS

The papal secretary of state has informed Archbishop G. Meier of his elevation to the rank of cardinal.

John B. Folson, grandnephew of the fiancée of President Cleveland, died on Wednesday at his home near Buffalo.

Keely's motor had another trial in Philadelphia before a number of scientists, and it was pronounced a success.

Horace E. Conitt, who died Wednesday at Fond du Lac, was lieutenant colonel of the 25th Wisconsin volunteers.

Since the Chicago riot applications have been received from two hundred towns in the state to organize militia companies.

A bolt of lightning at Cedar Rapids, Iowa, tore from the bible on the pulpit the book of Numbers, leaving the other pages uninjured.

The widow of Louis Riel has never rallied from the shock of the execution, and her death is daily expected by the residents of St. Vital.

The taking of evidence in the telephone inquiry at Washington was brought to a close. A report will be made in about ten days.

The Ohio State Sinking Fund Commission has effected a one-year loan of \$500,000, with Albert Netter of Cincinnati at 3 1/2 per cent interest.

The nine deputy sheriffs who fired on the mob at East St. Louis were set at liberty at Belleville, the grand jury ignoring the charges of murder.

Dr. H. L. Harris has been lodged in the penitentiary at Joliet, to serve five years, for the murder of Dr. George W. Barton at Saybrook, Illinois.

By an explosion of gasoline in a theater at Wellsville, Ohio, seventeen persons were killed and three injured. Three of them are not likely to recover.

According to the latest reports, President Cleveland will meet Miss Folson in Baltimore. No one can yet say definitely where or when the wedding will occur.

Louis Railway Commissioners will investigate the case of the Union Pacific is discriminating against Council Bluffs, its legal terminus, in favor of Omaha.

John Y. Macomb, a Chicago manufacturer, was pronounced insane by a jury, and has been sent to a private asylum at Geneva, Illinois. He is rated at \$100,000.

Plymouth White, one of the most notorious confidence men in the United States, whose ill-gotten gains are estimated at \$1,500,000, died on Sunday at Reading, Vermont.

The chief of police of St. Louis has been instructed by the commissioners to arrest any person uttering incendiary speeches and disperse any assemblage of anarchists.

The sheriff at Chicago has seized the John B. Jeffery printing-house, in Dearborn street, on judgments aggregating \$107,328. Emma J. Jeffery appears as a creditor for \$54,434.

The rigid enforcement of the temperance law at Orangeville, Ontario, by Police Magistrate Monroe was doubtless the cause of the wrecking of both his house and office by dynamite.

The second largest steel-works in the United States are to be erected on a fifty-acre tract on the Monongahela river nearly opposite Port Perry by the Duquesne company, with a capital of \$1,000,000.

Hugh M. Brooks, who is being tried at St. Louis for the murder of C. A. Preller, has confessed that the victim died from chloroform at the Southern hotel, while undergoing a surgical operation by Brooks.

There are over one hundred thousand head of cattle on the trail from Texas to Colorado. So severe has been the drought that vast herds can be heard tramping the dry ground at night and howling for water.

A Detroit correspondent alleges that he has discovered that the Irish in that city have formed a company known as the "H. W. E.", which is interpreted to mean "Hell with England," and that they are nightly engaged in drilling.

The Republicans have nominated John Dalzel for Congress from the Twenty-second district of Pennsylvania, and Thomas M. Bayne from the Twenty-third district. The Democrats of the Thirtieth Illinois district renominated William M. Springer.

In the federal court at San Antonio, Colonel Nelson Platt was convicted of embezzling funds while collector of customs for the district of Corpus Christi. The jury recommended him to the mercy of the court, as that ends had previously made good his deficit.

Thomas J. Potter, vice president of the Burlington road, who once refused offers of \$30,000 per annum from both the Union and Northern Pacific companies, has been tendered by the Vanderbilt the presidency of the line road, at a salary of \$25,000 for five years.

A dispatch from Harrisburg predicts that the board of pardons will recommend the release of Milton Weston from the penitentiary. As he has been generally styled "a Chicago millionaire," the cashier of a Chicago bank, where Weston transacted business, wrote that he could not borrow \$1,000 at its counter.

The Senate Pensions Committee has decided to report unfavorably the Mexican Pensions bill as passed by the House, and to substitute the Senate bill of the last Congress. This bill only pensions those who actually served fourteen days or more, or their widows, and gives pensions to none below the age of 62 unless actually disabled.

QUESTIONS IN SENATE.
The House Committee on Pacific railroads, has agreed to report favorably a resolution instructing the secretary of the Interior to demand of the Northern Pacific Railroad company information as to whether it has arranged its stopping-places and running of trains so as to benefit certain towns which the directors of the company were interested in to the injury of other towns. Also, by what authority of law the company owns any interest in any town-site company. The resolution also requires the company to furnish a statement as to its freight and passenger traffic. All this information the secretary is to transmit to Congress.

DEMENT'S CASE.
The senate committee on public lands has returned to the consideration of Dement, surveyor general of Utah. The clerk was instructed to write to Mr. Dement that his nomination had been referred to the committee again, and if he wished to make any statement in writing to the committee he might do so. 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Not Hog Cholera.

Dr. Cyrus Edson, of the New York Board of Health, has lately been seizing hogs which have been afflicted with so-called hog cholera. He says: "There is no such thing as hog cholera. The disease is defined as contagious, and is of three kinds: Diphtheria, which is in the throat and glands of the neck, and typhus fever, where the glands of the neck break down and form an unhealthy fluid, collecting pus, and lastly typhoid, which is the most frequent and is characterized by ulceration of the intestinal glands, producing large amounts of pus. All physicians agree that animals in which inflammation has produced pus are extremely dangerous to human food. Moreover, these diseases have a tendency to tuberculosis, a disease to which the hog is particularly liable. It is a well-known fact that meat from animals having had tuberculosis will produce consumption in those eating it. The cause of all the trouble is that the farmers don't keep their hogs in a proper manner. The hog is very susceptible to surrounding influences, and instead of being kept as clean as possible the filthy condition of a hog pen has become proverbial."

Curious Act of Mind-Reading.

Looking of faces best results with a friend, who has been a professor until within a short time in an important institution, described a trial made at his residence by a company of acquaintances who were standing in a circle with their backs to him, and as an experiment which might afford amusement and instruction, a lady was chosen, was blindfolded and seated on a chair, and was furnished with a pencil and paper. The professor left the room, and in the hall drew a zigzag nondescript figure on a paper he held. Returning and standing behind the lady on a chair and watching her mind intently on his drawing, he began in a few moments to draw slowly the irregular line he had put on his paper. To test the matter still further, he again left the room and drew a perfect circle as he could on a fresh paper. He returned, and under the same conditions the lady drew a similar circle, then hesitated a moment, and then, to the surprise of all, drew a straight line from above the circle down into it. In a moment he remembered that on going out the second time his first intention had been to draw as perfect a rectangle as he could, and that he had carried out his intention so far as to draw the perpendicular line of one side of the figure, and inadvertently left this line on the side of the paper when he changed his mind in favor of the circle. The lady had followed a reversed order of the processes of his mind, and the first intention being indistinct in him, had in a hesitating way repeated the straight line and carried it into the circle instead of keeping it outside of it. —Christian Intelligencer.

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The Government of Servants.

Why should the government of servants be deemed of too little importance to merit the attention of those who must submit either to most indifferent service, or to the dictation of a class, inferior to that of the master, and unassailable. Where is the strength of this authority except in the willingness of the higher class to continue in subjection? and fear is the foundation of this willingness. They fear that the work of the servant will fall upon them, and, knowing their own weakness and ignorance, they prefer a life of anarchy and social captivity, to the physical exertion incident to the dismissal of a competent but overbearing servant. Any organization by united action does trouble will be in a great measure removed. If servants find that there is a united determination on woman's part to adjust the difficulties growing out of their reversed positions, and that woman can resist the unlawful claims of her domestics, they will begin to weigh the advantages of complying with all right demands. An arrest will be made of their attention, and it will begin to appear that mutual concessions will secure mutual benefits.

It may be urged that many circumstances arise in a home, which make endurance a necessity. Sickness or trouble may be the occasions upon which advantage is taken, and these occurrences will operate against an enforcement of just demands. But, again, by organization this evil may be modified. The character of a servant taking undue advantage in such cases, will be known to the organization, and she will be refused employment by the members. Some rate the organization, and it would become an institution for the record of idle complaints and petty annoyances of discontented housewives. But this need not be; these are grave issues, enough to interest intelligent women and the securing of obedience is one of the gravest. Let those who succeed in enlightening those who fail, remembering that justice should be the foundation of every attempt at control. All human beings will resist encroachments upon their reasonable rights and privileges, and though they submit for a time, it will be with the sullen submission of the discontented, and can result in no permanent good. —Mrs. E. J. Gurley, in Good Housekeeping.

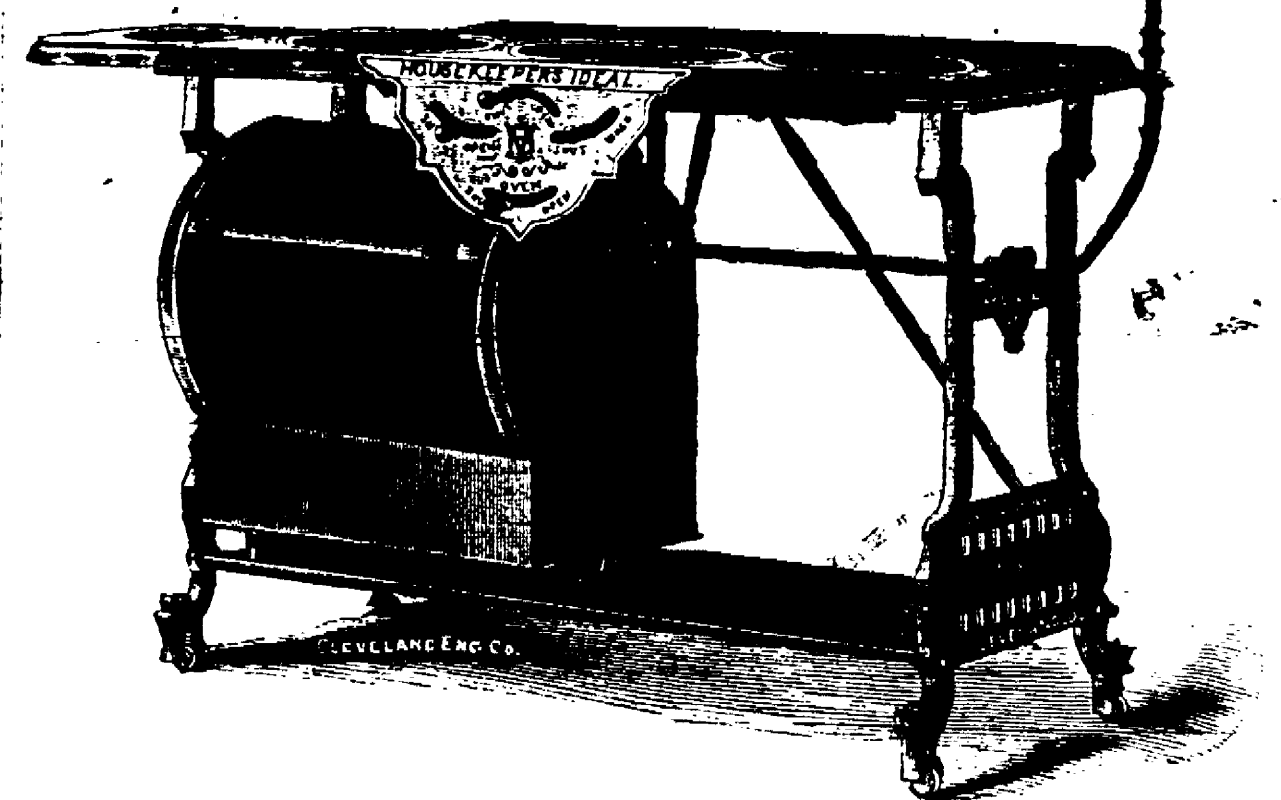

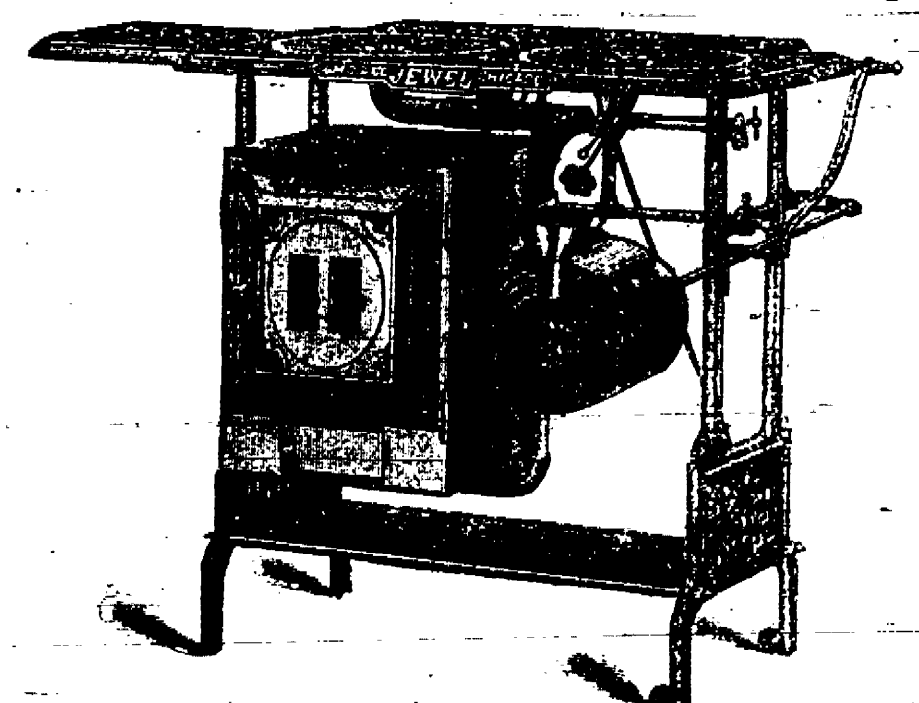
