In a recent speech at Greenville, Congressman Tarsney, speaking of his action on the oleomargarine bill, said:

"I learn, as I proceed through this campaign, that not only in this county, but in Gratiot, Shiawassee and Isabella, parties are going about among the farmers for the purpose of prejudicing them against us, who say: 'Don't vote for Tarsney, he voted against the oleomargarine bill in Congress,' giving no reason why, but seeking to create the impression that in some way I voted against the interests of the farmer. I did vote against the so-called oleomargarine bill and have no apology to make for that vote, but for the purpose of informing those who purposely seek to mislead and those who do not fully understand why, I will most cheerfully make an explanation. During the past session a bill came into the House, the expressed object of which was to raise revenue. An examination of the bill disclosed the fact that the purpose was to levy a tax upon a product called 'oleomargarine.' Now I concede the power of Congress to levy a tax upon any product, whether imported or domestic, for the purpose of raising revenue. I did not concede its power to levy a tax to raise revenue when we did not need revenue. We have for years been collecting from the people more money than the government can legitimately use, nearly \$100,000,000 annually, therefore it is evident that we do not need more and ought not to tax more. Again, it is a matter for the state legislature and not for Congress to deal with. If it be a

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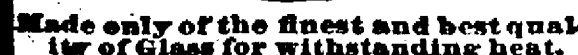

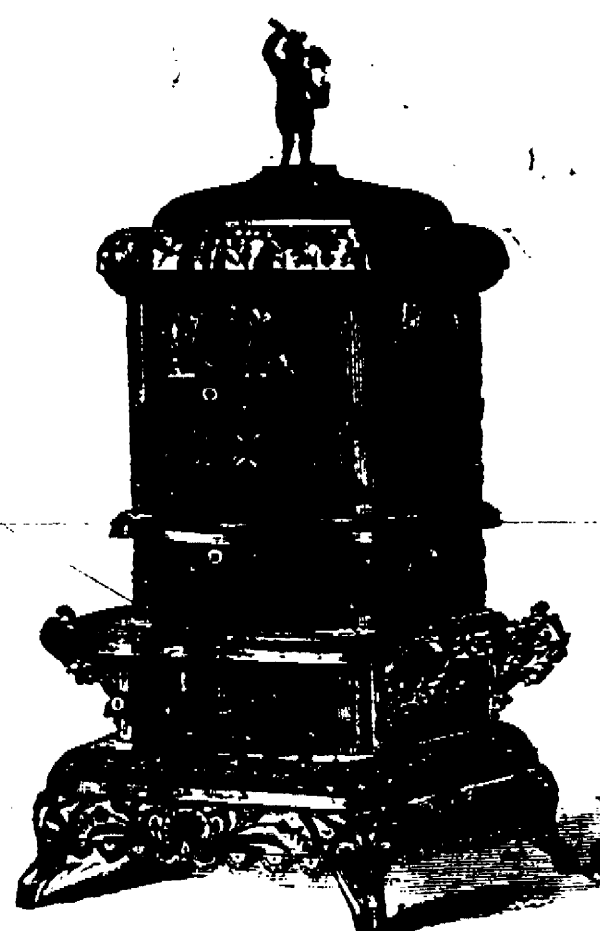
