THE PRESIDENT LOCKED OUT. An amusing incident occurred in connection with the reception. The President had yone out in his carriage just before the reception began and did not return until about 5:20, when the doors of the White House were closed. The officer on duty had also shut the gates of the southern entrance. The President left his carriage and walked quietly to the side gate opposite the Treasury Department. It was also locked. The crowd who were hanging around quickly caught on to the situation, and came running up to see the sight of a "locked out" President. Before matters grew any more complicated, however, the officer of the guard had been informed of the President's predicament and had opened the gates
