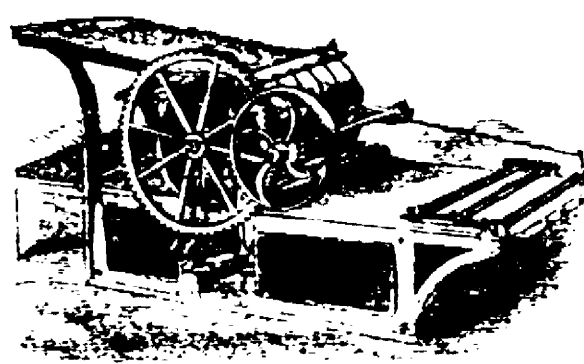

The 4th at Henderson The Doctors at Cheshaning

A Large Crowd—Excellent Music—A Superb Oration—A Copious Rain—A Joyous Day

For the first time in the history of the village of Henderson, Michigan, the Fourth of July was celebrated in a manner that will long be remembered. The day was a grand success in every particular. The village was thronged with people from all quarters, and at 10 o'clock the procession started for the west bank of the Cheshaning river, where the Henderson Association had arranged for a large picnic. The young girls dressed in white, and the boys in blue, and wearing of was naming the states, and principal territories demanding admission as states, surrounding a young woman representing the goddess of Liberty, and all riding upon an immense platform, were a beautiful feature in the march. The Quackenbush Post of the G. A. R. followed in a car, and were in turn followed by the Crane Post of Henderson; the Owosso Woman's Relief Corps came next in carriages, and scores of teams brought up the rear.

Chaplain Alfonso Crane offered a very brief, but most comprehensive and affecting prayer. Comrade O. S. Smith, of Owosso, read the Declaration of Independence with such enthusiasm as to awaken the patriotism of the entire audience who cheered him as earnestly as though he had read an absolutely new production.

Charles Holman, of Corunna, delivered a magnificent oration, in which he mingled wisdom and wit with snatches of original poetry, (and the fervor seized him several times while preparing his address, keeping his hearers intensely interested to the last word and making them hungry for more instruction and enjoyment.

Music, vocal and instrumental, came in at proper intervals, and most beautiful of all, the singing of the band of forty girls standing upon their chariot—their rendering of the "Star Spangled Banner" was peculiarly effective. Rain, which had been threatening, set in at the close of the oration and with very little abatement continued for three hours, shower following shower, flooding the gutters and drenching the people. The crowd returned to the village as best and when they could, wading through the mud or wet grass, and presenting a most bedraggled appearance but retaining a courage which could not be drowned out by any number of floods. Singing, shouting, jokes and laughter mingled with the roar of the storm and the crash of thunder; everybody was resolved to be patriotic and happy whatever the circumstances.

Supervisor Crane was President and Frank Smith was Marshal of the day and both did all that mortals could do to steer the celebration through the perils which beset it on every hand.

At three o'clock, the clouds broke and the sun came out, so did the people. Sports of various kinds were inaugurated upon the streets, and amusements ran riot with hilarity prevailing.

Commander Wiley gave the drill of the Quackenbush Post which elicited the warmest admiration. The men were in high spirits and appeared to good advantage in the parade. They had escorted the Relief Corps to the celebration and the ladies, not to be outdone, procured a box of the best Havana cigars and "treated" the Post, who stood up in line like men and drew their portion with three cheers for the Corps and three more for Crane Post whose guests they were on the Fourth.

Balloon ascensions, fire-works, lemonade and ice cream filled up the evening and the people up to the time of starting for home by trains and wagons when the guests left, declaring that they had had a most glorious Fourth of July.
