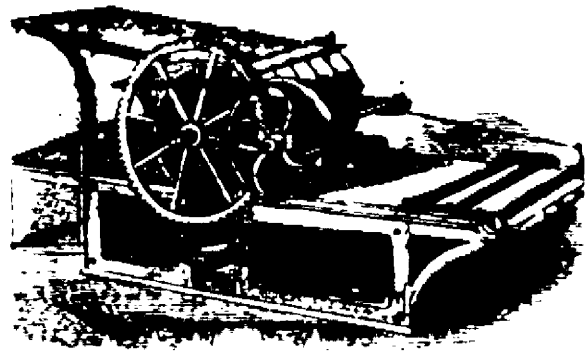

GENERAL NEWS.

Owing to long continued dry weather, a water famine is threatened at Hillsboro, Ill., as well as at New Philadelphia, Ohio. At the former place typhoid fever is alarmingly prevalent because of the drought.

Gold and silver coins bearing the date of 1831 were unearthed in Kentucky, recently, by laborers on the Maysville and Big Sandy railway. The gold coins have the figure of a fish upon them and the word Bolivia.

In a recent article Sir Charles Dilke argues that Great Britain should spend \$2,000,000 for new rifles and 22,500,000 in fortifying military and commercial stations, in order to be able to cope with her neighbors in case of war.

The leaders of the rebellion in the Knights of Labor organization think that their expulsion is only a matter of time, and in consequence are about as they will band together in new districts and start an independent order.

The funeral of ex-Minister Washburne at Galena Thursday called to the city many prominent people from a distance and a large number of the early settlers of Jo Daviess county, former friends and associates of the deceased.

The formation of trusts seems to be exceedingly popular at the present time. The latest scheme of the sort is the organization of a "paper bag trust." The name is not awe-inspiring, but it will represent a capital of \$2,000,000.

Reports from Halifax show that the Nova Scotia coal output will be 10 per cent greater than last year. Cape Breton ports have already shipped 50,000 tons ahead of last year and American coal is gradually being crowded out.

Between \$8,000 and \$10,000 of the money raised in St. Louis for the entertainment of the Grand Army men in that city was not expended, and it is now proposed to use it to secure the national political conventions that will meet next year.

The assistant manager of the Rocking Chair ranch in Collinsworth county, Texas, denies that notice has been given to settlers to leave the ranch. Gov. Ross and Land Commissioner Hall are determined to protect all bona fide settlers.

At a meeting of employing job printers held in Chicago Saturday, it was decided to strenuously resist the demand of the Chicago Typographical union for a nine-hour day. One employer has already begun the fight by discharging union printers.

A new through line from the Atlantic to the Pacific is promised, owing to an alliance that has been formed by the Northern Pacific, Duluth, South Shore and Atlantic, Michigan Central, and New York Central and Hudson River railroads.

In spite of rainy weather, thousands of people from Virginia and adjacent states were present in Richmond Thursday at the ceremony of laying the corner stone of the Lee monument. A number of prominent ex-confederate generals took part in the parade.

The large increase in the sugar trade between Demarara and this country and a corresponding decrease in the trade with England has resulted in the withdrawal of British steamers from their regular routes in order that they may carry sugar to the United States. "Bat" Shea, a desperate criminal, who was serving a twenty years sentence at Joliet, Ill., choked himself to death Friday night by placing his neck in a loop made by hanging his suspenders from his bedstead and letting the weight of his body rest thereon.

The state board of health of Indiana reports that the various asylums subject to their inspection are in a most excellent condition. One member of the board declares that there is not a better managed institution on the continent than the Indiana Hospital for the insane.

The steam whaler Orea, which arrived in San Francisco Wednesday

A correspondent at Salt Lake City writes that the leaders of the Mormons have been so harassed and annoyed of late that they would be quite willing to openly forbid the practice of polygamy if they were not afraid that by so doing they would endanger the entire church structure.

A despondent apostle is quoted as saying that the objectionable practice would be discontinued, though the belief in its rightfulness and divine authorization would always be asserted.

The hearing of a writ of error was concluded in the United States supreme court Friday. The concluding arguments were made by State's Attorney Grinnell and General Butler.

The latter of whom complained that matter had been introduced into the case that did not appear in the record, and that the lives of his clients had thus been put in jeopardy. He asked for an extension of time in which to discuss this extraneous matter, but it was not granted.

An attempt was made by unknown persons to wreck a passenger train on the Chicago, Rock Island and Pacific Railroad, between Joliet and Morris, Thursday night, by placing a heavy telegraph pole across the track.

The obstruction was evidently intended for the passenger train, but it so happened that a freight train was the first to come along, striking the obstruction and wrecking the engine and eight cars, killing the engineer

and fireman, and fatally injuring a brakeman. The Rock Island Railroad management offer a reward of \$2,000 for the arrest of those guilty of the outrage.

The steamer Vernon, of Chicago, her entire crew of twenty-two persons and ten or twelve passengers were lost in the gulf off Manitowoc Saturday morning. She was bound for Chicago with an assorted cargo, and being overloaded, was unable to cope with the terrible seas. There are no survivors, hence the story of the disaster can only be conjectured, except so much of it as came under the observation of the crews of other storm-torn craft that passed the spot where the Vernon made her final plunge.

Captain Moraw, of the steamer Superior, brought the first news of the disaster when he ran his partly disabled vessel into Milwaukee for shelter from the storm.

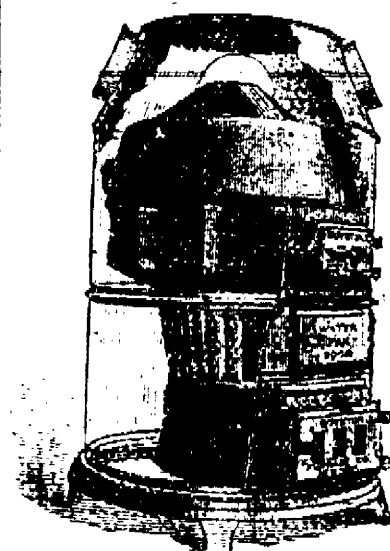
