How Gen. Putnam Swore.

In the year 1839 I was taken by my father to see a Revolutionary pensioner by the name of Samuel Green, then living in the town of Bernardston, Mass., at an extreme age. Mr. Greene related that he was in the army under Gen. Putnam, and was engaged in the battle of Brooklyn heights. He represented Putnam as a man who was accustomed to accentuate his_speech with language drawn from the armory of theological warfare. Among a great many forms of adjuration a favorite one was: "God take it all." At the battle of Brooklyn the Americans had at one of their lines erected a rude breastwork of logs and had stopped the spaces between the logs with large pieces of turf. During the fight a cannon ball from the enemy knocked out one of these pieces of turf which in its flight hit Putnam and knocked him down. Putnam quickly sprang to his feet and exclaimed; God take it all! They mean to kill folk, don't they?" -Hartford Courant.





On Friday afternoon Col. 




