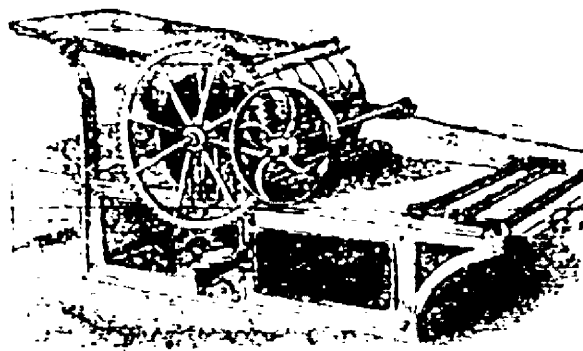

American Indian Mummies.
A Mexican archeologist, Senor Marguerite, has recently made an interesting discovery of naturally mummified human bodies in a cavern in the Sierra Madre Mountains. The cavern is of a natural origin, and lies at the height of about 7,000 feet above the sea. The mummies of the opening had been artificially closed with mud bricks and stones, so contrived as not only to close out the entrance, but also to prevent the entrance of air. In the cave the desiccated remains of four human bodies were found, apparently all members of one family, the father, mother, a boy, and a girl. The bodies were in the position so commonly given to the dead by American Indians; they were in a sitting posture, the hands crossed over the breast, and the head inclined forward toward the knees. They all were placed with their faces toward the east, and were shrouded in burial garments.

In an article concerning these remains in a recent number of *Nature*, the writer assumes that the preservation of the bodies was due to the peculiarly high and dry atmosphere of this southern cone and elevated level. In this conclusion he is mistaken, for the reason that in one case of a human body, discovered about fifteen years ago in a cavern near the National Cave in Kentucky, a similar natural desiccation had taken place. The remains were those of a child 12 or 14 years of age. The unfortunate creature had evidently been lost in the cavern, and had wandered until starvation brought about death. The position of the body was that of perfect repose, showing that the sleep of exhaustion had passed into the rest of death. In this case, as in that of the remains found by Senor Marguerite, the integument was well preserved, there being no trace of decay in any part of the form, even something of the expression of the face remained despite the emaciated look given by the process of desiccation.

Wherever the circumstances of burial are such as would be afforded by any cavern in this country, where the process of the germs which conduct the fermentative process of decay is prevented, and where the air has an ordinary dryness, a like process of mummification would certainly ensue. It thus seems probable that the Egyptians took as a necessary amount of pains to preserve their dead in the mummified condition. In their dry climate the same end could have been attained by much simpler processes. As far as the preservation of form is concerned these mummies of Mexico or Kentucky are bodies as well preserved as any of those from Egyptian burial places.

CONGRESSIONAL

(CONTINUED FROM 1ST PAGE)

At 11 o'clock Messrs. McMillin, Kelly, and McCracken of Arkansas, the members of the House committee appointed to wait on the president to inquire if he had any further communication to make, appeared at the main doors of the Senate chamber and announced, whereupon Senators Sherman and Sutherland joined them and retired. Two minutes later the justices of the supreme court were announced, and becoming solemnly were escorted to their seats to the right of the presiding officer.

At 11:30 Captain Bassett announced the president of the United States, and a great crush fell. President Cleveland entered arm-in-arm with Senator Cockrell, and preceded by Captain Bassett and followed by members of his cabinet, he walked to the seat assigned him in front of the clerk's desk. The right of the president was taken by Mr. Ingalls, who walked arm-in-arm with Senator Cul- lion. At 11:39 President Ben. T. Morgan rose and closed the fiftieth congress.

MARCH 5.—The opening prayer in the Senate had allusions to the peaceful and hopeful change in the Administration of the government.

After the reading of yesterday's journal Mr. Edmunds reported that the committee which had been appointed yesterday to wait on the president of the United States and inform him of the meeting of the Senate in extraordinary session had performed that duty and had been informed by the president that he would, early to-day, deliver a message to the Senate in writing.

Mr. Stewart offered a resolution declaring it to be the sense of the Senate that the business interests of the country require the purchase by the Secretary of the Treasury of \$100,000 worth of silver bullion per month for coinage.

Mr. Morgan and Mr. Harris made a point of order on the resolution, the latter stating that it was purely legislative in its character.

Mr. Blair presented the credentials of Mr. Marston, appointed by the Governor of New Hampshire to fill the vacancy caused by the termination of Mr. Chandler's term, and the failure of the Legislature to elect a Senator. The credentials were read.

In the meantime, Mr. Prudden, one of the President's secretaries, had delivered a message in writing before the Cabinet appointments as follows:

JAMES G. BLAINE of Maine, secretary of state.

WILLIAM WINDOM of Minnesota, secretary of the treasury.

REINHOLD PROCTOR of Vermont, secretary of war.

JOHN W. NOBLE of Missouri, secretary of the navy.

JOHN W. WAXAMAKER of Pennsylvania, postmaster-general.

W. H. H. MILLER of Indiana, attorney-general.

JEREMIAH RUSK of Wisconsin, secretary of the interior.

On motion of Mr. Hale the Senate proceeded to consider them with closed doors. The Senate promptly confirmed them all, and adjourned at 12:45.

The Senate simply met, and adjourned to day, but afterwards the republican senators held a caucus and appointed Senators Platt, Allison, Plumb, Dolph, Manderson, Lusk, and Quay a committee from the democratic side and arranged to fill vacancies on the republican side.

The committee consists of Senators Harris, Cockrell, and Kenna, and an effort will be made to complete reorganization of the committees before the Senate adjourns.

MARCH 7.—The vice-president was not present at the session of the Senate to-day, and Mr. Sherman offered a resolution that during his absence Mr. Ingalls should be president of the Senate pro tempore. An amendment for the resolution was offered by Mr. Harris substituting the name of Mr. Ingalls for that of Mr. Sherman. The amendment was rejected—yeas, 37; nays, 29—and the resolution was agreed to. Mr. Ingalls thereupon entered upon the duties of presiding officer pro tem, the oath of office being administered to him by Mr. Sherman, and it was ordered that the president of the United States be notified of Mr. Ingalls's election.

The Senate adjourned over to Monday at the suggestion of Senator Cul- lion, who, with the president this morning and learned that he would not be ready to send in nominations before that time.

After adjournment of the Senate the democratic members held a caucus at which the subject of representation upon the committees was under consideration. Messrs. Gorman, Cockrell, Voorhees, Harris, Ransom, Walthall, and Blackburn were appointed a committee to confer with the republican caucus committee on adjournment of committees.

In the caucus there was a sentiment ex-

pressed favorable to the abolishing of certain committees that have practically no duties to perform. It was the opinion that since every Senator is provided a clerk, chairmanships are unnecessary, if not useless, unless there are reasons for the accumulation of the chairmanships, which is not now the case. Senator Aldrich, chairman of the committee on rules, and Architect Clark will get together as soon as possible for the purpose of devising some rearrangement of apices, by which every committee will have a room if possible.

President Harrison sent the following nominations for the cabinet to the senate Tuesday: Secretary of State—James G. Blaine of Maine; Secretary of the Treasury—William Windom of Minnesota; Secretary of War—Reinhold Proctor of Vermont; Postmaster General—John W. Waxmaker of Pennsylvania; Attorney General—W. H. Miller of Indiana; Secretary of the Navy—Benjamin F. Tracy of New York; Secretary of the Interior—John W. Noble of Missouri; Secretary of Agriculture—Jeremiah Rusk of Wisconsin. The nominations were promptly confirmed.

Arguments in the contest for the governorship of West Virginia were heard Friday in the Supreme court. The position taken by counsel for Gov. Wilson is that the declaration of the result is absolutely necessary to give Gen. Goff a title and without such declaration no court has the right to declare him governor; that the whole matter is in the hands of the legislature. Goff's counsel insisted that there is no wrong without a remedy; that the people have elected Goff and the certificates show it, and if the legislature did not do its duty the courts must see that justice is done. It is believed that the court will hand down a decision early this week.

An important land suit is in progress at Kansas City. The plaintiff is the Inter-State Land Company and the defendant the Maxwell Land Grant Company. Fifty million acres of land are involved, taking in the east half of New Mexico, a portion of the southeast corner of Colorado, near Trinidad, about half of the neutral strip, and a large piece of Western Texas. The plaintiff's claim that March 13, 1882, the States of Coahuila and Texas, as a part of old Mexico, ceded to Jose Manuel Roynella and John Charles Beales the grant described. Roynella finally turned his claim over to Beales, and at the latter's death his heirs became the undisputed possessors and sold the immense tract to the Inter-State Land Company. The Maxwell company under a grant claim ownership, and the decision remains with the courts.

The interstate convention of the miners and operators of the bituminous coal regions of the United States is in session at Columbus, Ohio. There are indications that there will be trouble before a settlement is reached on a scale of wages to rule in the various districts. In the western Pennsylvania region, the largest in the country, the operators say they must have a reduction over last year of at least 5 cents per ton, while representatives of the miners state that it has been decided to stand for an advance of 4 cents per ton, and that in no event will they accept a reduction. On account of the mild weather in the north and northwest, large quantities of coal still remain unsold. Prices are away down and operators say they will close their mines in preference to paying an advance in wages. A reduction in wages here carries with it a proportionate reduction in all the other bituminous regions. A big miners' strike may be the result.

A startling story of a horrible massacre has reached Cheyenne. A party of French tourists, in charge of a guide named Ferry, started from Virginia City, Montana, to show the tourists through the Yellowstone park, in violation of the United States laws, the parties having traveled from San Francisco for the express purpose of going through the park during the absence of the horde of summer excursionists. Ferry procured an overland outfit, and with two wagons drawn by eight mules the party entered the park from the west side, and spent several weeks in viewing the scenery and killing game. The guide's story of the massacre, which he says was committed by the Indians, is a most graphic recital. Just before dawn on the day of the murder blood-curdling yells and a fusillade of shots were heard, and roused Ferry. He realized the situation, and crawling through the brush, took refuge in the mouth of a sleeping geyser. From there he could hear the piteous groans of the foreigners, mingled with the yelling of the Redskins. The women were scalped, and their long tresses, matted with blood, dangled from the belt of the chief of the Indians. The heads of the men were hacked and their bodies frightfully disfigured. After their fiendish work was completed the savages departed and Ferry made his escape.

Congressman R. W. Townsend of Illinois, a sterling Democrat, is dead at Washington.

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
