A Washington special to the Detroit Free Press says the Michigan Republican Association is on the point of being disrupted by the rival aspirants for office, who are trying to control it.

President Harrison is beset on all sides by conflicting claims of different states for grand places. Michigan gets many a set back in its aspirations. Senator Palmer's appointment to Spain and several other favors do not offset the loss of a representative in the cabinet for the state, and some Republicans are beginning to think the state does not fare so well under a Republican as it did under a Democratic administration. And this, after all the work and trouble spent to carry Michigan for Harrison when it was on the verge of being captured by the Democrats.

Of all the tender and tender farewells to Mrs. Cleveland the prettiest was that of Secretary Bayard. Just as the train was about to start he said to her, after his country's good-bye. "Good-bye. You brought nothing but sunshine with you, and you are taking a great deal of it away."—Philadelphia Record.

NON PARTISAN JUDICIARY.

Some Reasons Why Judge Sherwood Should be Returned.

The republican press seems to think that in the ensuing judicial contest it has on hand a political struggle for place in which the usual appeal to prejudices and party spirit is to form the principal incentive to giving to the state an able and independent judiciary. This, however, is not, and never has been, the view taken by the intelligent voters of this state. So far as relates to our supreme court, the great business interests of the country and the law men engaged in their noble and unselfish, unimpaired, and unimpaired, are not given to changing judges of ability and experience upon out party without cause. The selection of the members of that court should be removed just as far from party politics and prejudices and political methods as possible and such is the unbiased feeling of all our people.

No person has ever occupied a seat upon that bench with greater satisfaction to the bar, to the people and the state than has Chief Justice Sherwood during the last six years. The great labor and ability he has brought to bear in the discharge of his duties has not only astonished his friends, but commanded the respect of his enemies and assigned to him a place among the "Chief Justices" in the country and he has shown himself in every case he has written more than master of the subject presented and of the questions involved in the solution. He was re-nominated at a rising vote in the convention re-nominating him and before the question could be fairly put every delegate was in his hands and we do not believe there is an honest man in the state who would place in jeopardy an election result less than 50000, and a third by the necessities of partisan interference and policy. —Kalamazoo Gazette.

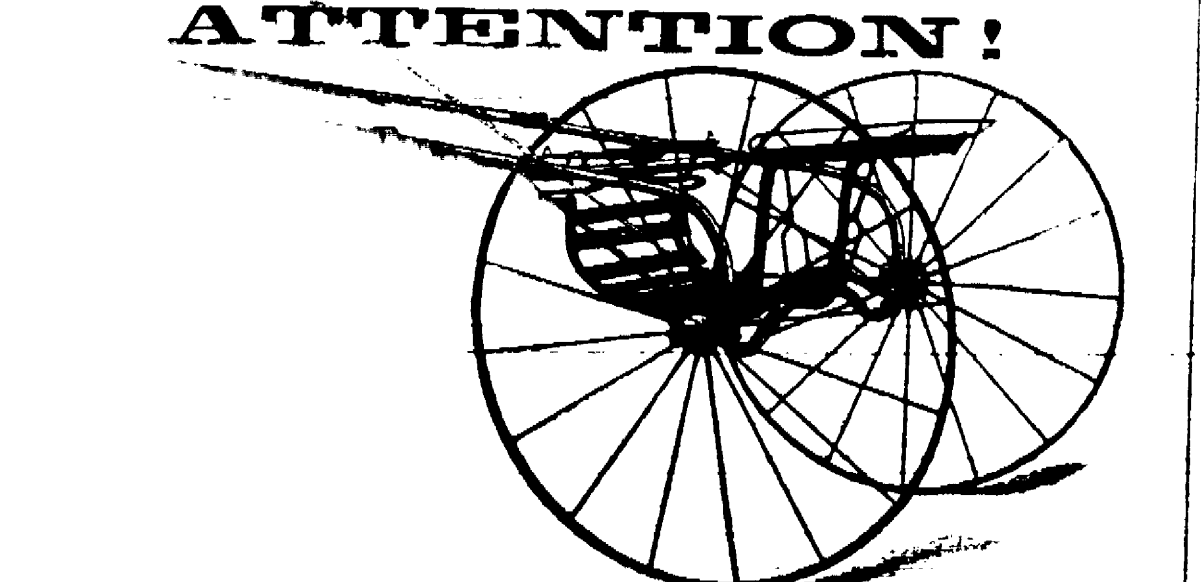

GENERAL NEWS.

The Secretary of the Navy has received a number of petitions as to the disposition of John Ericsson's remains, who rendered the government such valuable aid at a critical moment.

The engineers of the late Park Central Hotel, at Hartford, Conn., have been held to the Supreme Court on a charge of manslaughter, in causing the explosion of the boiler by negligence.

Contracts for the construction of new war vessels, embodying the latest approved ideas of high speed and heavy armament, will be let within a few months by the Secretary of War.

Five of the six miners entombed in the Black Diamond colliery, near Mount Carmel, Pa., have been rescued alive and well. The sixth man, who is believed to be dead, can not be reached.

It is stated that on March 4 the Pennsylvania Railroad company landed 105,000 visitors at Washington. The revenue to the company from the inaugural business, it is said, will amount to \$500,000.

A Winnipeg (Manitoba) special says there is no truth in the rumor that Lord Lansdale has starved to death, and he is not in the locality where the two trappers are reported to have lost their lives.

A committee of the New York Stock Exchange on Friday expunged from the list \$27,000 collateral trust bonds of the Illinois Central Road, to make the list agree with the company's annual report.

At the session of the G. A. R. of Indiana, at Indianapolis Thursday Charles M. Francis, of Crawfordsville, was chosen Commander, and resolutions in memoriam of General Phil Sheridan were adopted.

The Catholic Total Abstinence News, issued at Philadelphia, comes out square against prohibition on the ground that it will open the flood-gates of illegal sale and take us back to the anti-high license period.

A dispatch from Tien-tsin to the Hamburg correspondent says it is reported there that the natives have risen on the Kwang-si frontier and that they have destroyed ten block-houses and killed 100 Frenchmen.

Thursday at Charleston, W. Va., the State Supreme Court decided against the claim of President Carr of the Senate, to the Governorship. Wilson will continue to act until the Goff-Fleming contest is settled.

Emmon Blaine has resigned the position of general freight and passenger agent of the Chicago, Santa Fe and California railroad, and will be associated with the management of the West Virginia Central road.

The Paradise Club of Anglers, of New York, have just decided to purchase 70,000 acres of forest and fifty trout lakes in various parts of the country. This will make the largest game preserve in the world.

At noon Thursday a battery of boilers at the West Point Boiler Works of R. Monroe & Sons, at Pittsburgh, Pa., exploded, wrecking the building and killing five men. Fourteen others were wounded, one fatally.

The South Birmingham (Ala.) Coal and Coke Company was organized Saturday with a capital of \$1,000,000. It owns 3,000 acres of coal land near Birmingham, and will build at once 100 coke ovens and a refinery.

Jim Whitney, the ball player, has purchased four lots in Boston, and says that if he can make no satisfactory arrangement with some club for the season, he will devote his time to supervising the erection of four houses.

Ex-President Cleveland, accompanied by Secretaries Vilas, Whitney and Bayard, and ex-Postmaster Dickinson, left Washington Monday for Florida, where they expect to make a short stay and will probably visit Cuba.

The Ohio House Wednesday passed a bill appropriating \$5,000 for the erection of a monument over the graves of the eight Andrews raiders who were executed by the Confederate authorities at Atlanta, Ga., in June, 1862.

The oil market at Pittsburg, Pa., was in a flurry Wednesday, and the excitement was such as had not been seen on the exchange for months, the fluctuations during the day being so rapid that it was impossible to follow them.

A nest of boilers exploded in the St. Nicholas colliery, near Mahanoy City, Pa., Wednesday, severely injuring several persons and killing the child of Mrs. Louisa Hoffman, who was passing at the time with the child in her arms.

By the explosion of an underground trap at the Standard Oil Refinery, at Lima, Ohio, Wednesday, John Cushing, a laborer, was literally annihilated. He was standing on the trap at the time of the explosion, and has not been seen since.

The report of the Department of Agriculture for March shows the proportion of merchantable wheat and corn averages 82 per cent, which is less than in 1894-95 87, and the lowest State percentages are in the principal wheat-growing States.

The Warren Tube Works at Warren, Ohio, which cost \$250,000 to erect three years ago, was appraised Tuesday at \$30,000, and will be offered at sheriff's sale. This property has four times been offered by the sheriff, and three times appraised.

The American Spool and Bobbin Association, a trust, organized in 1886, has gone to pieces. The principal cause of the dissolution was that no penalty was fixed for the cutting of rates, members of the association would not keep faith.

General J. B. Weaver and the Hon. E. H. Gillette it is rumored will purchase the Northwestern News, of Davenport, Iowa, and consolidate it with the Iowa Tribune, to be published at Des Moines as the organ of the third and fourth parties.

Mike Kelly went from New York to Boston a few days ago to recite "Casey at the Bat" at the Elks' benefit. He met a number of friends and failed to appear at the benefit. The feeling against his being appointed captain of the Boston nine is strong.

The jury in the case of Engineer Cook, charged with criminal negligence which resulted in the collision at Mud Run in October last, by which sixty persons were killed, returned a verdict of not guilty, after a deliberation of twenty-one hours.

The Hon. Aldace F. Walker, of Vermont, a member of the Interstate Commerce Commission at Washington, has accepted the chairmanship of the new Interstate Railway Association. He will resign as a member of the Interstate Commerce Commission.

Ex-President Grover Cleveland made his first public appearance as a private citizen in New York at the one hundred and fifth anniversary of the Friendly Sons of St. Patrick at Belmont's, replying to the toast "The United States" in a patriotic manner.

It is reported that the Newfoundland government will issue no licenses to American fishermen this season, because of alleged violations of the license given them last season. Fishermen say that cutters are already patrolling the coast, and that every port is closely guarded.

At Waverly, Iowa, Judge Badtch granted an injunction against the Burlington, Cedar Rapids and Northern Railroad, restraining them from allowing their cars to be used as warehouses for goods which the company knew to be contraband under the laws of that State.

George S. Rees, foreman of the squib factory at Plymouth, Pa., which exploded, killing ten girls and wounding many others, confessed before dying that it was he and not Katie Jones who caused the explosion. He was smoking and a spark from his pipe ignited a keg of powder.
