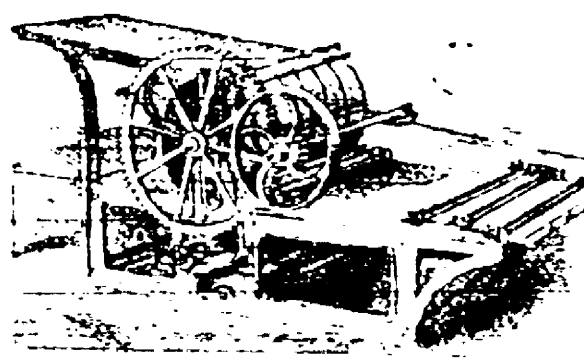

There were many people present at the meeting of the Owosso Press Association, held at the Owosso Press, on Monday evening, May 1st, 1889.

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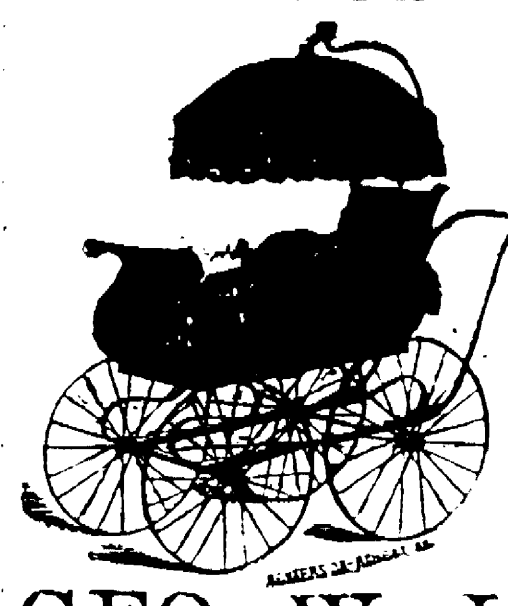

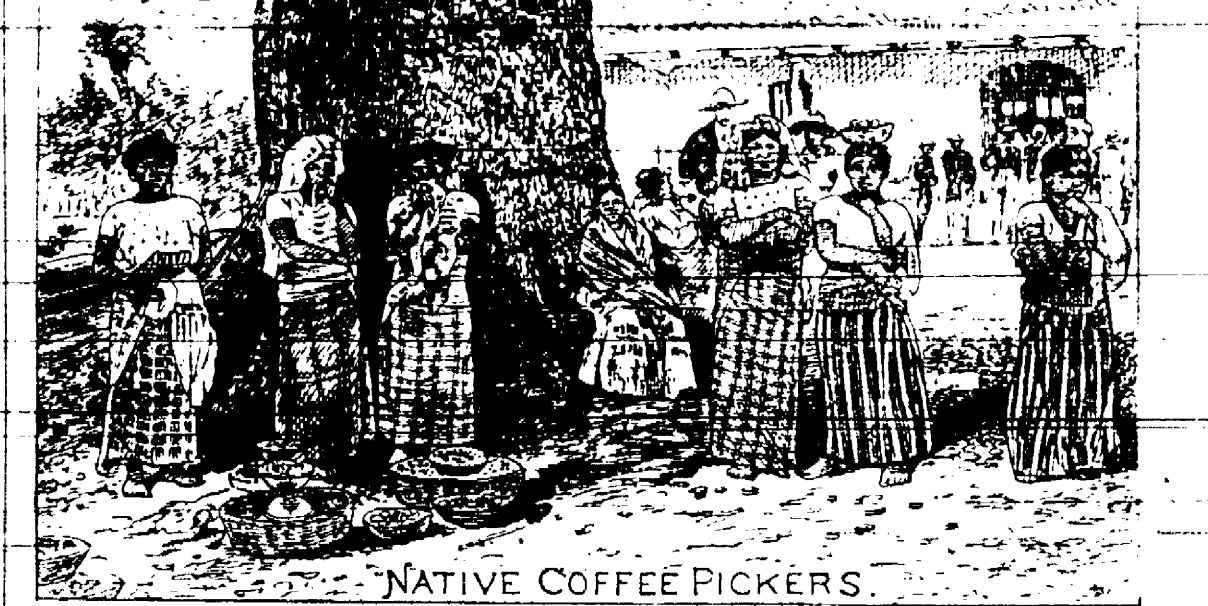

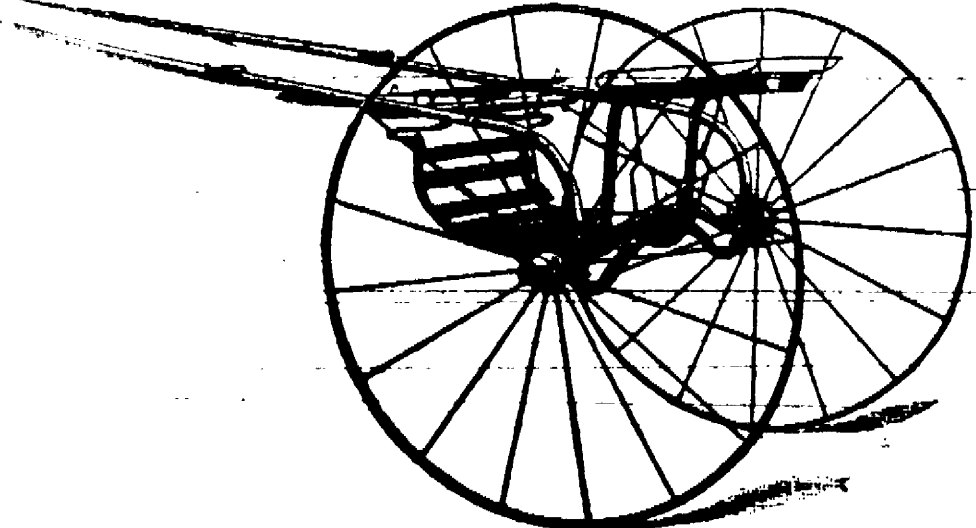

GENERAL NEWS.

It is reported that the mind of the famous authoress, Mrs. Harriet Beecher Stowe, has become clouded, and that she is now, as regards intellectual power, a mere child. It is said that when forty friends visit her she greets them with a vacant stare, and ignores their presence. The reason of her father, the Rev. Lyman Beecher, was deranged during the closing years of his life.

Experiments are being made at the Homestead Steel Works of Carnegie, Phipps & Co. with the Holman-Tilford invention for manufacturing steel which, as alleged, is likely to revolutionize the process in the near future. The gentlemen interested in the invention are negotiating for the purpose of a plant, which they intend to remove to and operate in Louisville.

A gang of Italians started in to pave a street in East Buffalo, occupied by Poles. Many of the Poles are out of work, and they resented the employment of the Italians. This led to an encounter between the two races, in which one of the Italians had his skull fractured and another was frightfully beaten with clubs. The Italians have armed themselves and threaten to retaliate.

Gov. Luis E. Torres, governor of Lower California, has sent the following message to Senator Valdespino, Mexican consul at San Diego: "Please publish through the press that the richness of the Santa Clara placers has been much exaggerated. None but practical miners find gold. Possibly new discoveries may be made but to date the placers found do not justify the excitement that has been caused."

The *Tradesman*, published at Chattanooga, says that the first quarter of 1889 shows a continuance of the remarkable industrial development of the Southern States. During the quarter there have been a number of strong corporations organized in the South, resulting in the influx of millions of Northern capital. Tennessee, Alabama, and Georgia seem to have received the most attention at the hands of Northern capitalists, although much outside money was invested in Kentucky and Virginia.

Of forty-five railroads which reported for the second week of March forty show fair increases. For the third week of March the gains were \$101,886 on the Northern Pacific, \$34,541 on the St. Paul, \$29,733 on the Pittsburg and Western, \$18,845 on the Milwaukee, Lake Shore and Western, \$11,071 on the Chicago and Atlantic, \$4,097 on the Milwaukee and Northern, and \$2,166 on the Louisville, New Albany and Chicago. The trading statement for February is expected to show a net gain of \$200,000.

The Hon. Jacob Sleeper, one of the most philanthropic of Bostonians and one of the best known Methodists in America, died at Boston Saturday at the age of 87. He amassed a fortune in the wholesale clothing business and in real estate, and has delighted to disburse it with unsparring hand. Among Mr. Sleeper's largest gifts have been a splendid building which bears his name to Boston University, a \$10,000 concert hall to the New England conservatory, the erection of the Wesleyan Missionary home at Newton, and the memorial chapel at Wesleyan University.

The United States Senate refused to confirm Murat Halstead as Minister to Germany on a vote of 19 to 25. Dear Richard Smith, of the *Commercial Gazette*, in an editorial on the rejection of Mr. Halstead, remarks: "He was rejected by Senatorial frauds because he had the courage of his convictions and was not afraid to tell the truth, and perhaps, too, it may lead to a line of thought that will abolish the United States Senate altogether with its star chamber proceedings, or compel a change in the methods of election that will bring that body closer to the people and force its members outside of the money influence."

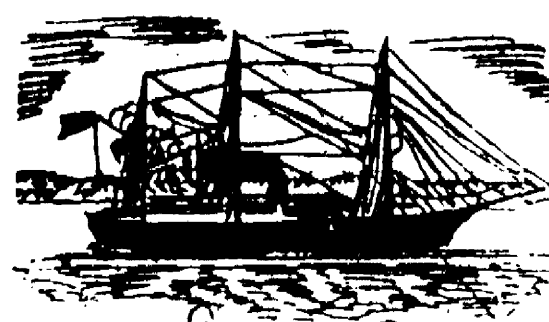
