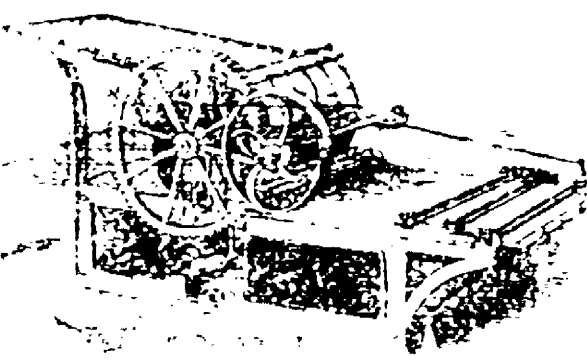

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The annual report of President Ashby shows a steady and healthy growth of the trade of the road and the consequent increase in value of its property. The gross earnings of the road for the year are: Freight, \$4,112,900; passenger, \$1,720,000; mail, \$15,820,000; express, \$12,300,000; rentals, \$1,800,000; miscellaneous, \$23,300,000. Total, \$25,750,000. Operating expenses, \$4,330,000. Net earnings, \$21,420,000.

The report says: "The property owned at Owosso and the surrounding territory and the house erected there, is valued at not less than \$75,000. The addition to this, which has been made by the iron works, which the track was originally laid on, has been increased by 50 percent steel.

The consolidation of the Owosso company has been ratified since the report and it is the intention of the Owosso and north of Owosso and provide transportation facilities for early development.

At the Lake Michigan terminal a large iron plant will be located for the manufacture of charcoal pig iron, the iron ore to come from the Escanaba district and the charcoal to be made from the hard wood through which lines of the company's road are now being built.

The Ann Arbor system when completed, will consist of 400 miles of track, starting from Toledo, O., and traversing north by west the State of Michigan, crossing and connecting with every trunk line in the State and exchanging traffic with them all.

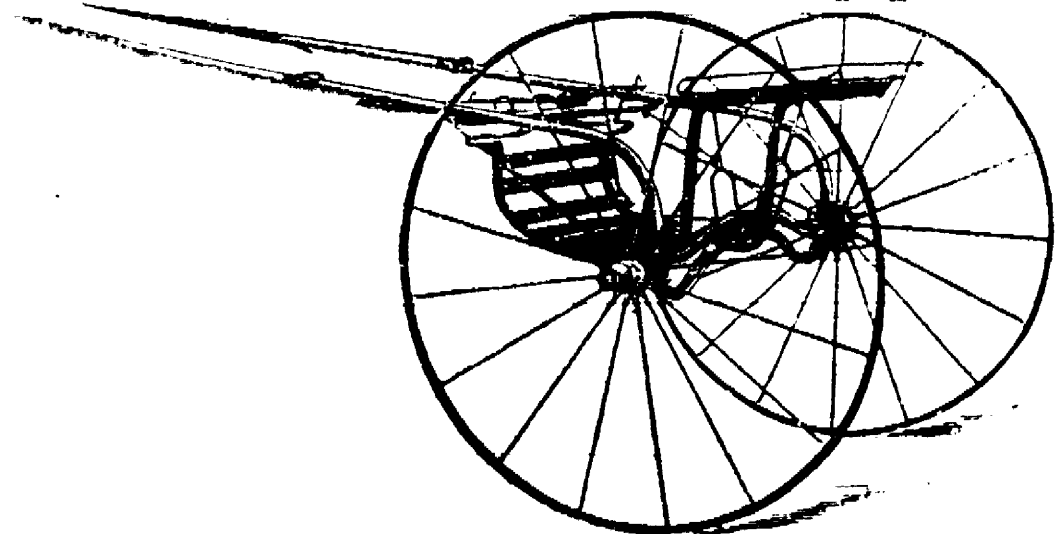

Ill., were paid last week has turned out
to be light weight. The men are indig-
nant, and the company is investigating.A bill was passed by the Wisconsin
House Tuesday compelling all building
and loan associations doing business in
the State to deposit with the State Treas-
urer securities to the actual value of
\$100,000 for the protection of depositors.Two Oklahoma boomers at Elmore,
Kan., quarreled over the right to a cer-

outrages be made penal offenses.While Charles Rice, of Sugar Creek

outstanding indebtedness is removed.

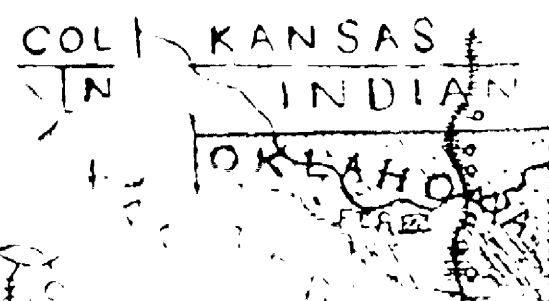
