The Iowa Dental Association has elected the following officers for the ensuing year: President, E. M. Sturges, Glenwood; Vice-President, F. R. Ross, Cedar Rapids; Secretary, J. W. Miller, Des Moines; Treasurer, W. H. DeFord, Anamosa.

Forest fires are said to have destroyed the villages of Bruce's Crossing and O'Brien, and partly wiped out Stambaugh, in Michigan. Near Norway, Mich., the flames reached the Norway mine, burning the engine house and twenty dwellings.

Superintendent Bechtel, of the Chicago, Burlington and Quincy Railroad was arrested at Des Moines, for failing to have posted in freight houses and passenger rooms notices indicating where the schedule of rates and fares might be found.

The bridge across the Rio Grande connecting Nuevo Laredo, Mexico, and Laredo, Tex., has been completed and opened with appropriate ceremonies, which were participated in by United States and Mexican troops and business men of both towns.

It is reported from Ottawa, Ont., that negotiations are in progress for either a consolidation of the Northern Pacific, the Manitoba, and the Northwestern Roads into one system, or a traffic agreement that will permit trains of either road to pass over the other's track.

Mrs. Royal E. Fox, whose funeral was held at Syracuse, N. Y., Friday, was another victim of "Christian Science." Her husband was a firm believer in the efficacy of faith, and when his wife was suffering from a bitting attack refused to summon a regular physician.

Yale men have at last found a place to rest their weary frames much more comfortable than was the historic "benches." The new roof is the flight of broad granite steps of the new recitation building, occupying almost the identical spot which the fence covered.

The steamship City of Paris reached Sandy Hook Wednesday forenoon, having covered the distance from Queens-town in five days, twenty-three hours, and seven minutes, lowering all previous records. She also made the longest run recorded for a single day—511 miles.

The country publishers of Iowa are about to institute a boycott against publishers of patent medicines. Petitions are being circulated asking assistance, and a pledge to refuse to patronize any auxiliary whose patent advertisements they cannot control. About fifty have signed the petition.

The town of Beaver Dam, Ohio, was visited Monday night by a fire which destroyed the entire business portion of the town, besides many residences. The loss is estimated at between \$80,000 and \$100,000, with an insurance of only \$15,000. It is not thought that the burned district will be rebuilt.

The dwelling-house of Watson Bownes at Westchester, N. Y., was destroyed by fire Tuesday. The household consisted of Watson Bownes, his wife, his mother, two children, and two servants. Mr. Bownes, carried his wife out, but both were severely burned. The others all perished in the flames.

Miss Annie Vancil, of DuQuoin, Ill., died Tuesday of starvation. She had weeks ago her mother was adjudged insane and sent to an asylum. Miss Vancil declared she would eat nothing until her mother was released. She lived seventy-five days, the last thirty of which she fasted absolutely nothing.

Monday at Manchester, N. H., John Jenki, aged 19, a Polish Jew, was sentenced to four years in the industrial school for attempting to murder a boy younger than himself. He has also at various times stabbed boys with a pocketknife, committed other acts of cruelty, and is called the Jesse Pomeroy of New Hampshire.

The president made the following appointments Friday: George D. Reynolds, of Missouri, to be United States attorney for the eastern district of Missouri; Elbert E. Kimball, of Missouri, to be United States attorney for the western district of Missouri; Richard Farr, of Virginia, to be United States marshal for the eastern district of Virginia; Joseph P. Wilson, of Idaho territory, to be United States marshal for the territory of Idaho. Also the following collectors of internal revenue: Levi S. Wilcox, for the Eighth district of Illinois; Samuel D. Wargessle, for the Twenty-third district of Pennsylvania.

THE BUTLER-KIMBROUGH ROW. The interest incident of the row between Gen. Butler and Admiral Kimbrough is rather to the discomfiture of the former. When the search at the navy department for the missing log book of the Harriet Lane failed to give any clue to the missing book Gen. Butler openly stated his suspicion that it had been made away with. Evidence has recently been obtained showing that when the Harriet Lane was captured off Galveston her log book fell into the hands of Gen. Magruder, commanding the Confederate forces at that point, and has never been heard of since.

WITH POMP AND CEREMONY. The funeral of William Fitzgibbon, Sunday, was one of the largest ever seen in Washington. The deceased was one of the best known Masons in the United States, and the funeral was attended by every lodge in this city and several from Baltimore. Mr. Fitzgibbon had attained the thirty-third degree in Masonry, and services were conducted in accordance with this rank. This is said to be only the second time this ceremonial has been used in America. It was celebrated at midnight, and lasted two hours, and was attended by Masons only. At 2 p. m. public services were held.
