D. 1889, at the outlet of the drain and the farm of G. R. Lyon, in the city of Owosso, open for the purpose of letting a certain drain known as the "Wheeler Drain," located and established in the City of Owosso, and Township of Galesburg, and described as follows, to-wit:

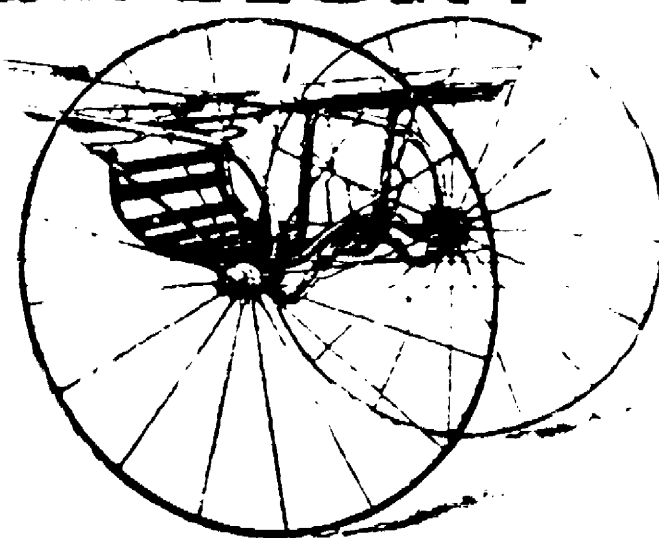

Real Estate Transfers.

(Under the Act of March 2nd, 1889.)

Wm. J. Brown, the Widow, Kate, who was abducted from the same and who returned home a few days ago in a homely condition.

A section 11 feet in length was captured in Lake Michigan, Wis., a few days ago. It was found to be a cross two years ago and was thought of many two years since that time.

Members of the legislature, authorized a special relief fund for the aid of business families. This fund is created by a property tax not exceeding one cent on a dollar.

The State Board of Health has issued a proclamation, forbidding a reward of \$500 for the arrest and conviction of the murderer of John and Hattie Eklund, of this county, Iowa.

The English House of Commons has agreed, by a vote of 171 to 155, to grant a lump sum of £100,000 as an indemnity to the railway companies, for the loss of their property in Ireland.

The Transcontinental Association is trying to find out whether it is alive or dead. Vain attempts were made to hold a meeting at Chicago, but not enough members were present to be called to order.

A plan to secure an equalization of wages throughout the country was discussed by the leather workers in convention at Philadelphia, Pa. Chicago workers receiving the best pay and work the least hours.

A telegram was received at New York Wednesday from the Korean legation at Washington saying they do not credit the rumor that missionaries have been sentenced to death in Korea for teaching Christianity.

By the collapse of a vein in the Central mine at Hyde Park, Pa., houses and gardens were damaged and the residents badly frightened. The ground is traversed by fissures from a few inches to a foot in width.

The Chippewa Indian commission are having hard sliding at White Earth. Several stormy sessions have been held during the last ten days, but up to date not a single signature to the Nelson bill has been secured.

Pittsburg steel manufacturers disclaim all intention of selling out to English capitalists. They do not think Englishmen care to invest \$100,000,000 for the privilege of controlling America's iron industries.

Owing to the effects of the storm and the low prices received, nearly 1,000,000 quarts of cultivated blackberries will be left to rot on the vines at Laurel, Md., and in portions of Delaware bordering on the Maryland line.

Dr. Combe of Brownsville, Tex., who was lately dispatched by the Marine Hospital Bureau to the northeast coast of Mexico, reports from Tampico that the United States Consul says there is no yellow fever at that place.

Edgar T. Brown, whose mysterious disappearance from and return to his home in Wadonia, Kan., caused great anxiety, has recovered sufficiently to reveal to his wife and children and tell of privation to which he was subjected.

The suspension of the Rev. Dr. Quigley, formerly pastor of St. Francis de Sales Church, Toledo, O., by Bishop Gilman of Cleveland, has not been approved at Rome, and the clergyman has been fully restored to his rights.

Captain D. S. Harris, who in 1823 made the trip from Cincinnati to Galena, Ill., in a keel boat, celebrated the eighty-first anniversary of his birth at the latter place Wednesday. He has resided there for sixty-six years.

Ex-State Senator R. J. Creighton, the convicted jury-briber who returned to San Francisco recently and surrendered to the police after being a fugitive from justice for a year and a half, was sentenced to five years' imprisonment.

The Richmond Paper Company, of Providence, R. I., suspended Friday morning. The company suspended some time ago, and has been working under a suspension. The latest statement shows assets of \$884,000 and liabilities of \$608,000.

Unsettled weather in Great Britain and on the continent has caused an advance in the price of wheat.

Near Marion, Ind., Mrs. Susanna Jones, 70 years old, was set upon and nearly torn to pieces by dogs.

Dr. Pubek, a prominent physician of Nebraska City, Neb., has been arrested for sending objectionable matter through the mails.

According to all indications the subscription for the shares of the North American Salt Company has been unsuccessful.

Miss Kate Drexel, of Philadelphia, has just given a sum sufficient to establish a church and school for negroes of the Catholic faith.

Ex-President Cleveland is to be the guest of ex-Commissioner C. C. Baldwin, of New York, at the latter's Newport residence.

It is said that the wholesale fruit merchants of New York will combine to form a trust for the control of the Florida orange crop.

Clouds have destroyed much property Sunday night at Ashland, Wis., and at Janesville, Wis., Sycamore, Ill., and other places.

It is reported at Keokuk, Iowa, that the general offices of the Burlington system will be removed about Jan. 1 from that city to St. Louis.

Judge Dugan of New York, dismissed the writ of habeas corpus in Henry S. Lee's case Friday, and the prisoner was returned to the New York State Jail.

The District Conference of the Indianapolis M. E. Church declares for total abstinence for the individual and absolute prohibition for the State.

It is said that the truck system will be given a black eye by the state board of charities in its report on the great coal strikes of northern Illinois.

The first bale of cotton from the new Texas crop was taken to Austin Thursday. The Texas cotton crop this year will, it is said, reach 2,000,000 bales.

A report has been circulated to the effect that Sam Bryant is to sell his interest in Proctor Knott and Come-to-Taw to his partner, George Scroggin.

The law requiring licenses for the practice of medicine and dentistry has been declared unconstitutional by the supreme court of New Hampshire.

Judge Field of the Circuit court of Kansas City in a recent decision declared the statute allowing religious associations to be incorporated unconstitutional.

Many claims are being filed at the Land Office at Guthrie, Oklahoma.
