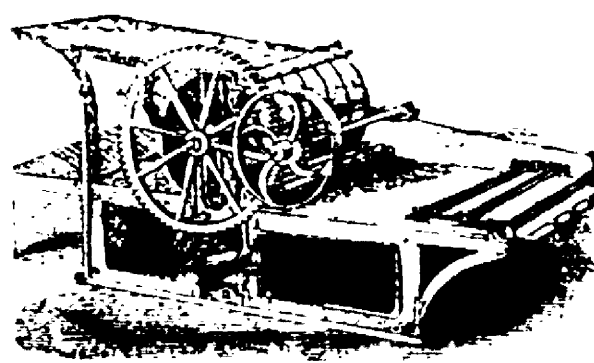

Death of Jeannette Wilcox.

Miss Jeannette Wilcox, of Corunna, for many years deputy Register of Deeds, of this county, died last Thursday, from an operation for cancer. The Independent says:

The operation was performed and the patient was apparently recovering when she suddenly began to sink, and died in a few moments. Deceased was 40 years of age and a most estimable and popular lady.

Byron Items.

Byron, Aug. 3, 1890.

Most of the citizens of Byron and vicinity assembled at the Baptist Church, Sunday morning, to listen to the Rev. E. E. Dresser, of Cheboygan Falls, Wis., a son-in-law of Rev. S. A. Cole. His sermonizing and oratory were highly spoken of by all.

The plate glass is being set in the Comstock stores; wood work and walls are completed in extra style and finish.

The citizens of Byron met on Tuesday evening to make arrangements for the Reunion of the 10th, 11th and 23d Regiments of Mich. Infantry, to be held in Byron, August 27.

The murder of the Murray family at Argentine still remains a mystery, young Crosby having been discharged for want of sufficient evidence to convict.

Miss Myrtle Cyphers is visiting her many friends in Byron, and will return to her home in Verona, Huron Co., after a period of two weeks.

At Toronto, Ont., July 30.

Department commander of the Grand Army from the eight states present to Wisconsin met at Chicago, Monday and agreed to endorse the proposed determination to discourage general attendance at the Milwaukee encampment. The fact that the railways have refused to make satisfactory rates for comrades furnishes the reason for this action. As every one interested in the encampment admits, this decision practically destroys the reunion feature of the gathering at Milwaukee.

The body of John A. Sullivan is in the hands of Mississippi officers. The champion slugger was taken before Judge O'Brien of New York and admitted by identity as the person called for in the writ of extradition. He said he was willing to go south and take his medicine. He fought, he said, not because he wanted to, but he would have been branded as a poltroon had he backed out. He was sorry he had transgressed any law, but would not attempt to sneak away to avoid punishment. He was turned over to Dr. Sheriff Condit and started for Mississippi.

The Schooner Black Diamond, captured by the American cutter Rush, arrived at Victoria, B. C., Sunday. A seaman named John Bakansson was paid \$100 as prize money and ordered to take the vessel to Suva. When out of a sight of the coast the captain headed for Victoria. Bakansson says he was well treated by the schooner's crew. He made an official report to Vice Consul Marvin, who wired the facts to Consul Stevens in San Francisco. Great satisfaction is felt at Victoria over the Black Diamond's escape. It is thought it will bring about a speedy settlement of the matter.

The Chippewa commission at Red Lake, Minn., secured the signatures of a large number in excess of that required. At White Earth the signing was almost unanimous. Thus far the Indians have yielded between three and four hundred names, containing the most valuable list of names yet secured. The commission is now secured for the lumbermen the free use of the streams running through the diminished reservation. Some of the negotiations have been long and tedious, but universal satisfaction in the Indians have been the result. The commission is on its way to the Pillagers of the Lack Lakes reservation.

Near Kansas City, Sunday, two road agents held up the passengers on a through stage of the Wabash western express. They secured about \$175 in money and watches. When they started to leave the coach they met the conductor, who pluckily attacked them. He had no weapon, but he carried his lantern in his hand and with that he dealt one of the men a vicious blow on the head, smashing the lantern's glass, and extinguishing the light. Simultaneously with the assault the other robber fired a shot at him from his revolver. The aim was bad and the bullet missed its mark. The first robber had by this time recovered himself and he took a shot at the conductor. His aim was no more precise than his partner's. The robbers then with one more parting shot swung off from the stop of the car. As they left the conductor buried his lantern after him.

Canadians are in a perfect frame of excitement over the report of the capture of the British schooner Black Diamond by the United States revenue cutter Richard Rush in Behring sea. July 11 the Rush overtook the Black Diamond and ordered her to give up. The captain of the Black Diamond refused to do this. Thereupon the commander of the Rush ordered a sailing of ports and running out of guns, which caused the schooner to hoist her flag. Sheppard and Lieut. Tuttle boarded the English craft and asked for her papers. The officers of the Black Diamond refused to surrender, but refused to deliver the ship's papers. Capt. Sheppard, once he had seen the ship and forced the hinges of the strong box and the captain's most thereby securing the papers. A search of the vessel disclosed 103 seal skins which had just been taken in Behring sea. Commander Captain Sheppard placed a non-commissioned officer from the Rush in charge of the Black Diamond and ordered the vessel to be taken to Suva to await further instructions.
