S. E. Sweet, now a resident of Tennessee, one of the men driven from Forest City, Ark., during the riot of May 19 last, has brought suit in the United States courts at Helena, Ark., to recover \$100,000 from thirty-five of the leading men of Forest City, who, he charges, drove him from his home.

Dr. W. B. Fletcher, superintendent of the Indiana Hospital for the Insane, scouts the idea that the bacillus of consumption was developed in the elixir-of-life extract. He has offered a prize of \$20 for a demonstration of bacillus tuberculosis in any fluid, new or old, extracted from the glands of a lamb.

Services were held at Winchester, Va., Friday, around the grave of General Daniel Morgan, of revolutionary fame, by 300 teachers from different parts of the State who are attending the Peabody Normal Institute. The procession of teachers was preceded by thirteen young ladies representing the colonies.

A Burlington & Missouri passenger train of three cars met with a serious accident near Lincoln, Neb., Sunday. The brake-beam broke and dropped down, forcing open a switch, and the smoker took the switch and was derailed and with the car in the rear rolled down a high embankment. Eighteen people were injured.

Deputy United States Marshal Nagle, the slayer of Judge Terry, was released from jail at Stockton, Cal., on a writ of habeas corpus and taken to San Francisco by Marshal Franks. The Department of Justice at Washington has telegraphed United States Attorney Carey, at San Francisco, instructing him to undertake the defense of Nagle on behalf of the Government.

The Pike county (Ind.) newspapers have been criticizing the Farmers' Mutual Benefit Association, which has established granger stores in the county, and the members of the association solved, at a recent picnic, to boycott any paper which opposes them. The papers defy them. The News declares that it may be the means of making 600 subscribers pay up. The fight is a bitter one.

Judge Field was arrested Friday, charged with participation in the killing of Judge Terry. The warrant was served in the United States circuit court, under a writ of habeas corpus issued by Judge Field for himself he was at once arraigned before Judge Sawyer and Field was released on his own recognizance and a bond of \$5,000. The supreme court of California denied a motion to adjourn in respect to the memory of ex-Judge Terry.

The executive committee of the National League of Republican Clubs met at Saratoga, N. Y., Tuesday, Vice President James Blanchard, of New York, presiding. The number of delegates to the National Convention is increased 1,000, and the next convention will convene either at Nashville or Chattanooga, Tenn. The special subject under discussion was the organization of Republican clubs throughout the South.

The Robert Morris Land and Coal company of New York has brought suit against the Philadelphia and Reading Coal and Iron company in the United States circuit court for the possession of 8,949 acres of land in Northumberland county, Pa., having coal lying thereunder and timber on it valued at \$30,000,000. The defendant is in possession of the land and is rapidly removing coal and timber from it, 2,000,000 tons of coal being taken out annually.

The forest fires, which have been raging all over Montana for three weeks and have destroyed hundreds of thousands of dollars' worth of timber, have reached most alarming proportions. The big companies have over 300 men out trying to suppress the fire and save their feed, but the small streams are all dried up, and the flames leap over them as quickly as if traveling on an open prairie. In two days the fire traveled over a section sixty miles wide and 100 miles in length.

J. G. Hutchinson, was nominated for governor Thursday by the Iowa republican convention on the twenty-fifth ballot. Twenty-two ballots were taken Wednesday night before the convention adjourned and Wheeler and Hull led in

the race, Hutchinson being third. On the second ballot for Lieutenant Governor, Senator Poyner, of Iowa, was chosen. Judge Given, for Supreme Judge; Henry Sabin, for State Superintendent; and Spencer Smith, for Railroad Commissioner, were nominated by acclamation.

Never in the history of British Columbia has such a run of salmon been known as that now being made on the Fraser river. The total pack so far on the Fraser alone exceeds 276,000, which will be increased to 300,000 cases. The total pack of the whole province will reach 420,000 cases, valued at \$2,420,000. This will exceed by 150,000 cases the largest pack ever put up. This immense run is accounted for by the Dominion government hatcheries on Fraser river. Advances from Alaska state that salmon is running in large quantities all over the coast.

Milwaukee is putting on an attire of decoration and illumination such as was never before seen in preparation for the national Grand Army encampment to be held next week. The display of bunting, flags, and army designs will not be confined to the business streets, but will include largely the residence portion, while the business district will be aglow with colored lights and arches. There will be five or six camps in all on the outskirts of the various districts of the city. Among the camps already chosen for the camps are Grant, Logan, and Badger.

A London telegram, Monday, says no decision has been arrived at by the home secretary in regard to the sentence of Mrs. Maybrick. There is a great body of scientific opinion which is working in behalf of Mrs. Maybrick to this extent, that there is a room for doubt whether she administered the arsenic from which her husband died. This opinion proceeding from eminent sources, holds that there is equally grave doubt as to Mrs. Maybrick's innocence, but the element of uncertainty is such as to justify the interference of the home secretary.

Dr. Longfellow, of Cincinnati, who has experimented with the Brodie-Sequard elixir, says he has treated forty-nine patients with the elixir. Of that number 40 per cent have been benefited, some a great deal, others less. In but one case had any special inflammation resulted, and that was far from dangerous. Results so far have been permanent notwithstanding the names of Brodie and Sequard. Dr. Longfellow attributed his success with the elixir to its proper administration. He says no papers have paid him for his experiments, nor has any chemist been paid.

General Passenger Agent Barker of the Monon route telegraphed the Grand Army encampment management at Milwaukee Thursday that his company would make a rate of 1 cent a mile to the encampment at Milwaukee. This is very encouraging to the managers, as they hope it may yet have the effect of bringing a uniform rate of 1 cent a mile and largely increase the attendance. The work of securing subscriptions to the guarantee fund is progressing rapidly and about \$175,000 of the \$250,000 has been signed. Chairman Geiffum is of the opinion that not a cent of the guaranty fund will be called in. With fine weather, he says, the naval battle scene and the tax fund will more than cover expenses.

David S. Terry, ex-Supreme court justice of California, was shot and killed Wednesday in the railway eating station at Lathrop, Cal., by Deputy United States Marshal David Nagle. The shooting was the result of a personal assault which Judge Terry was making upon Justice Stephen J. Field of the United States supreme bench while the latter was seated at the breakfast table. Judge Terry had approached Justice Field from the rear and slapped the jurist in the face with his hand, and was in the act of striking him a second time when Deputy Nagle, who had risen and warned Judge Terry to stop the attack, drew his revolver and shot the latter through the heart, killing him instantly. The deputy was acting as a body guard to Justice Field under strict orders emanating from the department of justice at Washington to protect the person of the jurist from personal assault at all hazards.

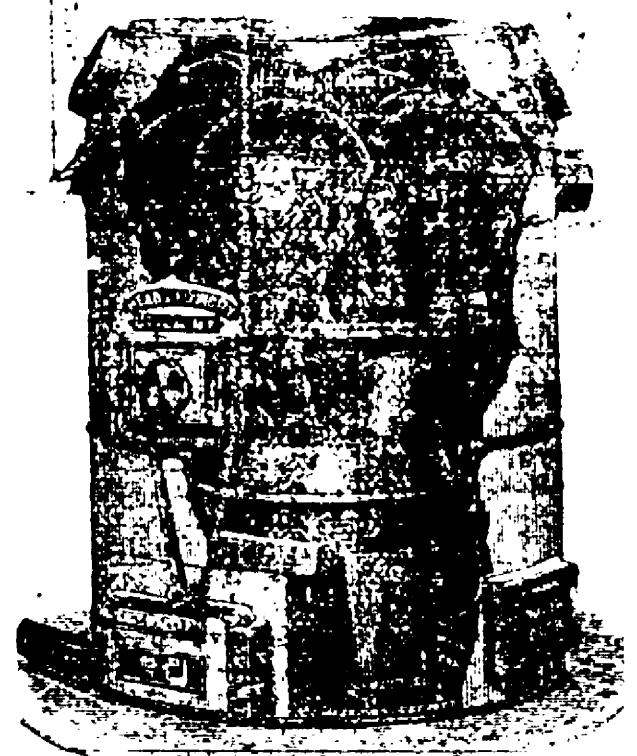
