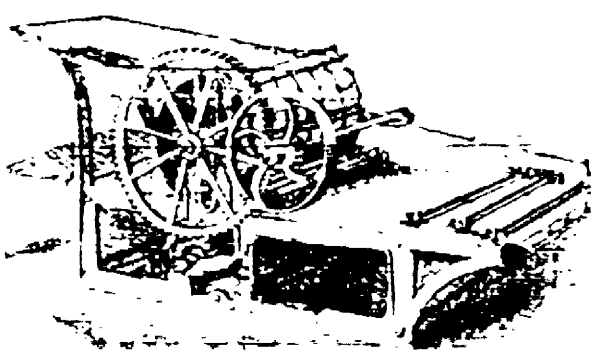

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ROMANTIC STORY

OF A GREAT RUSSIAN ARTIST AND HIS WONDERFUL PAINTING.

Konstantin Makoffski's Immortal National Russian Picture and How It Was Painted. Almost the Genius of Insanity—How the Czar Lost the Picture.

When Konstantin Makoffski set himself to the task of painting his famous picture of "The Russian Wedding Feast," he was already a great Russian artist, but not yet world famous. He conceived the scheme of painting a grand picture that should be preserved forever in the imperial art gallery of the Czar, as an enduring monument of Russian art. This picture must be distinctly Russian, and at the same time

immortal. This was the most difficult task an artist could attempt—to paint a picture that should be both national and immortal. Think over all the immortal pictures in the world, and there are not a dozen that are distinctly national, after you leave the classic works of Greece and Rome. To be national a picture must not only depict men and women plainly belonging to a particular nation, amid a scene that belongs to that nation alone, but also engaged in an action that cannot be found in any other nation—not an act of history either, which is only made national by history. Many paintings are distinctly French, or German, or Italian, or Spanish, or English, by their style, their figures and costumes, and their accessories; but they are not national, because the action they show is not particular to their country, and might happen elsewhere. And to be immortal a picture must, however limited by nationality, appeal to the admiration of all other countries.

Konstantin Makoffski became in a short time a man possessed by

AN ALMOST INSANE MANIA. He dreamed of his picture by night; he wrought at it at all hours; he drew and redrew, painted and repainted. He shut himself up for long months in his studio, refusing admission to everybody except his wife, and admitting her only when forced by exhaustion and hunger. As the work grew, he became emaciated, fierce, sullen, almost mad, consumed by an intense enthusiasm. Finally, however, the picture was completed to the satisfaction of his mercurial fancy. Then he admitted his wife to his studio and pointed proudly to this immortal work of his genius. The woman shed tears of joy, because now she knew, to regain her husband's society. The painter gained from prolonged extinction.

The picture was sent to the Czar. The Imperial family and the artists came to witness its unveiling.

MORE THAN DELIGHTED with the great work. But the Czar, ambitious to have Russian art take the lead in Europe, sent the picture to the world's art exhibition, then open in Antwerp. There the splendid Russian picture took the admiration of all Europe by storm. It was unanimously voted the masterpiece of the exhibition, and this award was confirmed by the praises of the artists of Europe—as the greatest painting of modern art.

Then the painting was sold, under the rules. The Czar expected to bid in for the Russian Imperial gallery; but an American—Mr. Charles W. Schuman, of New York—overbid the Czar, who wanted money for his armies, and bore off the prize at a fabulous price. In New York Mr. Schuman built an art gallery expressly for this one picture. He would not allow it to be shown elsewhere for a long time, but at last he yielded to the public wish, and consented to loan his treasure to the Detroit International Exposition, to be exhibited in Detroit at

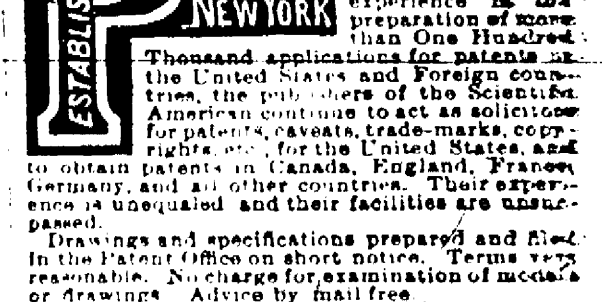

The British Parliament was prorogued Friday till November 10.

A rushing natural-gas well has been struck near Washington, Ill.

Henry W. Grout, of Ticonderoga, N.Y., is dying of a cancerous trouble.

The Times brewery at Toronto has been sold to an English syndicate for \$1,200,000.

It is estimated that the Illinois corn crop will not exceed last year's average.

John I. Sullivan is drunk again in Boston and is making things lively for his enemies.

The Cronin trial at Chicago, began Friday. It is thought it will take nearly a month to secure a jury.

John Grass, the great chief of the Blackfoot tribe of Sioux Indians, is seriously ill and is not expected to recover.

The Western Union has raised its rates between New York, Boston and Philadelphia from 15 to 33 per cent.

"Granny" Boston died on Tuesday at Murphy, N.C., aged 121. She remembered the battle of King's Mountain.

The Blue Grass Exposition at Creston, Ia., closed Saturday. The attendance on the last day was exceptionally large.

The Kansas Methodist Ministers' Association at Topeka, Kansas, declared prohibition in that state to be a success.

Dr. Frick, who was with Gen. Gordon at Khartoum, has returned to Berlin after fifteen years spent in Africa.

Henry M. Shaw, St. Louis, benefactor, was buried Saturday in the garden (his gift to the city) which bears his name.

It is thought that Deputy Marshal Neale will never be brought to trial for the killing of Judge Terry, of California.

J. R. Johnson, of Pittsburgh, was on Wednesday nominated for State Treasurer by the Pennsylvania Prohibition Convention.

The wine product of California this year will be about 12,000,000 gallons, and the brandy output will reach 1,000,000 gallons.

It is said there is prospect of the miners of Sreator, La Salle and Peru going to work at an early day on a satisfactory basis.

Mrs. Anna Whittemore, notorious throughout the country, has been arrested in New York City on a charge of common theft.

Much excitement exists at Ottawa, Ill., over the discovery of apparently rich veins of coal in the immediate neighborhood.

The gross earnings of the Union Pacific Railway for July were \$2,716,577, an increase over the same month last year of \$172,514.

Water broke into the Alleghany Mine, at Frostburg, Md., Friday, imprisoning thirty workmen. It is not yet known whether any lives have been lost.

During the first six months of the present year 37,000 Germans emigrated to America; the same number emigrated during the first six months of 1898.

The Michigan state board of health reports diphtheria at eight places; scarlet fever in six places; typhoid fever in fourteen places; measles in three places.

The assignee of Lewis Brothers & Co., the woolen commission-men who failed recently at New York, places their total liabilities at \$2,243,481; assets, \$1,329,029.

At Helena, Tuesday, the Montana Democratic State Convention nominated S. K. Toole for Governor, Martin Magnus for Congress, and other State officers.

Manufacturers of window glass have formed a trust, to be known as the "United Glass Company." A trust is also contemplated by the makers of table glass.

The omission of any reference to the Behring sea difficulty or the position the British government intends taking in the queen's speech proroguing parliament has caused great indignation at Ottawa, where it was fully expected that an intimation would be given of the policy Lord Salisbury intends following in the matter.

At San Francisco Judge Shafter dismissed the motion of Mrs. Sarah Althea Terry for the appointment of a receiver for the Sharon estate, as the supreme court had granted a new trial of the Sharon divorce case. The order to show cause why the case should not be struck from the calendar owing to the death of the defendant was set for hearing Sept. 11.

John Dubois, of Pennsylvania the young lumber king, and Payne, Cochran & Co. have purchased the plant and the property of the Superior Lumber company, of Ashland, Wis. Ex-Secretary Vilas was the principal owner. The property consists of 50,000 acres of pine timber and a number of mills with the capacity of 40,000,000 feet a year. It is the largest transaction of the kind in years.

The total increased valuation of taxable property in Kansas over 1888 is \$7,577,750.20. The increase in railroad property valuation is \$4,665,135.05. The six richest counties in the state, according to the valuation of the state board of equalization, are: Shawnee, Sedgwick, Wyandotte, Sumner, Leavenworth and Atchison. The total valuation of the state for 1889 is \$369,315,073.40.

A monument to the memory of the confederate dead who fell in the battle near Manassas was unveiled Friday in the presence of the townspeople and a number of persons from the surrounding country. The monument is thirty-five feet high and is a plain monolith, built of brownstone taken from the battlefield. The orators of the day were Senator Daniel and Gen. W. H. F. Lee, son of Robert E. Lee.

Albert Brierley, the Liverpool merchant who has gained world-wide notoriety through his connection with the Maybrick murder, was a cabin passenger on the Cunard steamship Seythia, which arrived at East Boston Monday. To a reporter he said that he had come to America to escape notoriety and that he had no statement to make. He admitted, however, that he had paid the costs of the trial, amounting to \$3,500.

Carlisle D. Graham, the Philadelphia cooper, went over the center of the Horseshoe falls in his barrel-boat Sunday morning, and twenty-five minutes later was picked up comparatively unhurt in the eddy below the falls. His barrel was beaten and wrenched somewhat, but was still watertight and perhaps in a condition to go over the falls again. About fifty people witnessed the feat, which, in order to avoid arrest, was conducted very quietly.

A great many dead at Johnston were interred among the unknown because friends or relatives could not get around to all the morgues in the first days after the flood to identify them. They were buried at different places and it has been determined to have them all lifted and reinterred in a cemetery that has been set apart for that purpose. When these bodies are removed a careful examination will be made, when it is believed quite a number will be identified.

Reinhold Holzmay, alias "Black Bart," the Wisconsin stage robber, was caught at Republic, Mich., Saturday morning. Property was found on his person proving him to have been the man who held up the Ogishie stage last Monday and fatally shot one of the passengers. He has confessed to the Ogishie robbery and other crimes. He was captured by City Marshal Glode and Justice of the Peace E. E. Weiser, and was taken to Bessemer to answer for the killing of A. Fleischbein, of Belleville, Ill., at Ogishie.

Advices from Central Illinois indicate that the dry and heated term is having a very serious effect upon the late corn and pasture. The early corn is ripening fast and will not be damaged to any considerable extent, even if the drought continues. The late corn would be of great advantage at this time, as it would

insure the better holding of even the early planted corn. There has never been a more dawning prospect for corn in this section of the state until within the past ten days, and a copious shower would insure one of the largest yields of corn ever gathered in central Illinois.

Nearly 200,000 men are now on strike in London. The *Economist* predicts a disastrous result for the strikers if they obtain the sixpence rate with the four-hour minimum. It says: "The number of men seeking work at the docks will largely increase. The companies will employ more permanent workmen and avail themselves of fewer casual employees. Only a few will be benefited. The lot of the many will be harder than ever. The law of the survival of the fittest will be exemplified by the strike, the wide-reaching consequences of which will be unprecedented in London's history."

In reference to the agitation as to the removal of Gen. Grant's body to Arlington, George W. Childs says that he is confident that Gen. Grant's body will not be removed from the tomb at Riverside park. As to the story that Mrs. Grant would consent to the removal, Mr. Childs said: "I receive letters constantly from Mrs. Grant. I received one this week. She has never mentioned anything about the removal of her husband's body to the cemetery at Arlington. If she favored the removal of the body I should have heard of it. The body cannot be removed to Arlington without the consent of Mrs. Grant, and I do not believe that she will ever consent to it."

The wheat crop of the Northwest is now practically all secured and out of harm's way. Advices during the past week fully confirm previous estimates placed on the crop. Dakota advices, except from the Red River Valley and some scattered sections, continue to be discouraging, the averages given ranging all the way from three to ten bushels per acre with thousands of acres left uncut. The Minnesota averages, on the contrary, are far above those of last season. The past week has been warm and there has been very little rain anywhere in the Northwest. The heat is favorable to the corn, which is coming forward well, and promises to be a fine crop.

Gen. Sherman was seen at his home in New York Monday concerning the alleged discourtesy shown him by certain members of Phil Sheridan post, of Oak Park, Ill. He said: "There was no discourtesy offered me. I got in the wrong car, and naturally got out when I found out my mistake. The porter of the car was to blame, as he conducted me to the wrong seat. You newspapermen never tell the truth. You couldn't tell the truth if you wanted to, now could you? I never met a newspaper man in my life who could. You may say you are an exception to the general run of reporters, but I know better. I am confident that you won't write what I have just told you. You'll lie about it, because it isn't possible for you to tell the truth."

The national encampment of the Grand Army of the Republic completed its work at Milwaukee Friday and adjourned and die after installing the new officers. At the final session a resolution was adopted reiterating the Columbus encampment's expression on the subject of pensions. It favors the "disability bill" and a per diem service pension law. A resolution was adopted making five members a quorum in place of less than fifty members. The vote of the right to vote in the national encampment was defeated. A letter from Mrs. Sheridan was read returning thanks for the memorial page and portrait of Gen. Sheridan which had been given in the report of last year's proceedings. Gen. McMahon's resolution, which was in effect an endorsement of Judge Bussey's recent decision that the charge of desertion shall be no bar to the securing of a pension, was the occasion of a very heated debate, participated in by a large number of delegates. The committee reported against its adoption and the report was sustained. After the encampment the new council of administration met, but its proceedings were of no public interest.

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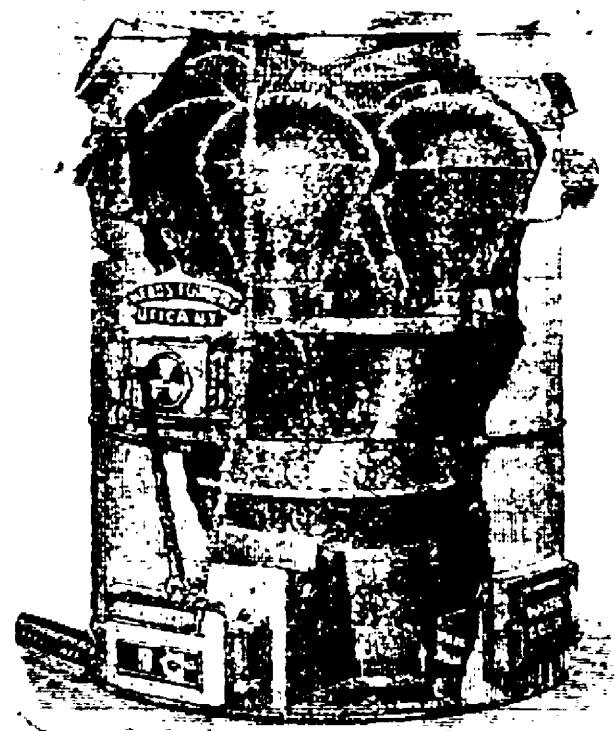
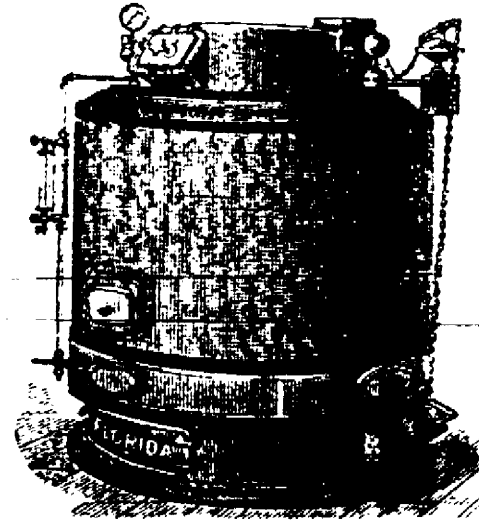
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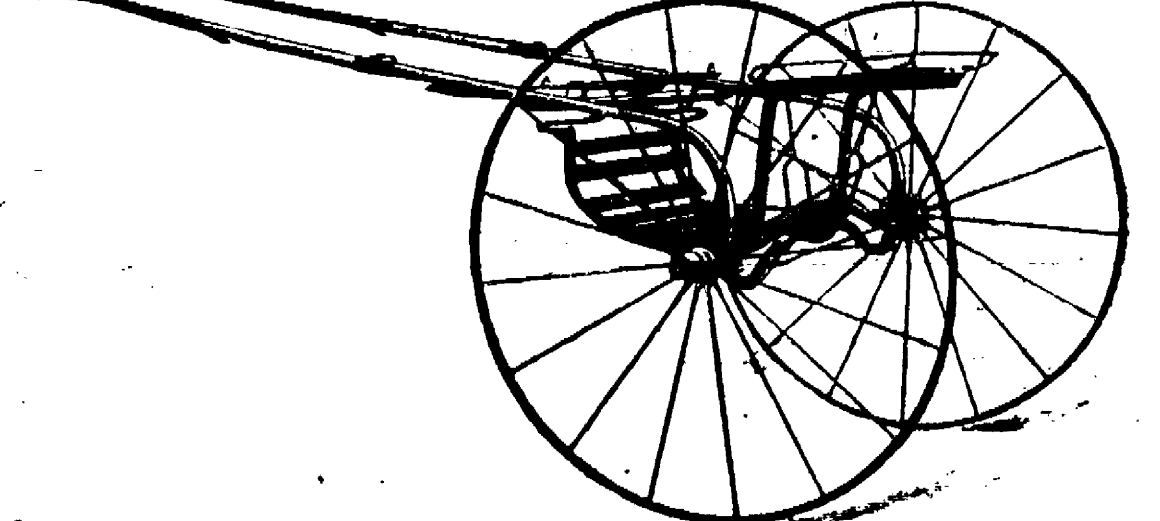
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
