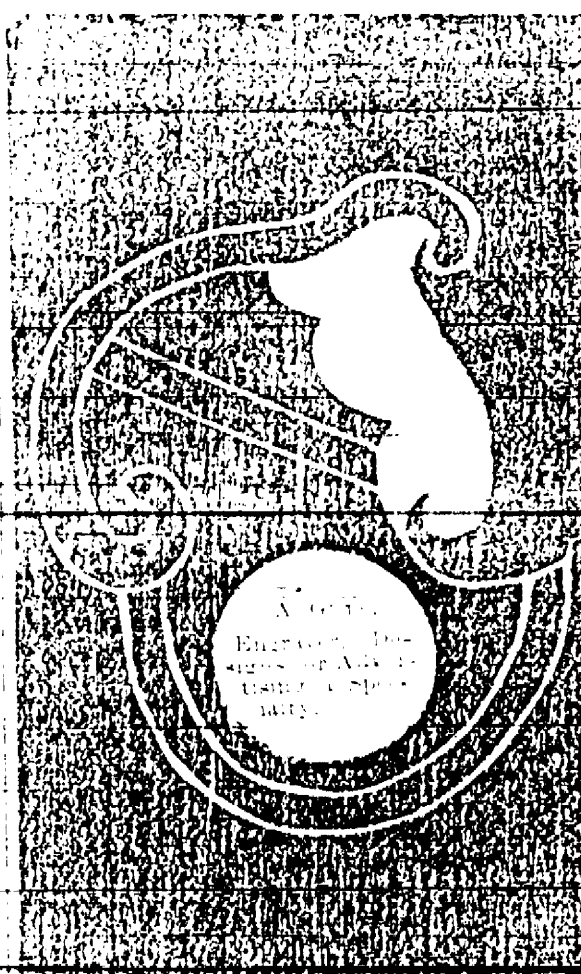

As the county prisoners of Marion County, Mississippi, are usually hired out, it is expected that there will be active bidding when the services of Kilrain and Sullivan are placed on the market. It is stated that the farmers, charcoal contractors, lumbermen, and others are anxious to test the skill of the fighters as toilers.

Pennsylvania has a law that no peddlers shall sell goods in the state that are manufactured outside its boundaries, and an arrest has just been made for an Elmira, N. Y., house. The firm will carry the case to the highest courts and test the constitutionality of the law.

In the United States Circuit court at St. Louis, Judge Thayer rendered a decision that the counterfeiting of the union label used on cigars cannot be prevented or punished. The ruling will affect the cigar-makers' organization in the United States and Canada. It is claimed, very seriously, as it practically decides that their label is of no value whatever.

An exceptionally rich strike has been made in the Eastern View mine at San Pedro, N.M., the ore assaying eighty-nine ounces of silver and considerable gold. The strike was 100 feet down in the mine, and the ore appears to be inexhaustible. It was purchased by Johnson & Wright for a song, and they have refused \$20,000. There is much excitement among miners in New Mexico.

Orders have been received at Pierre, Dak. from the secretary of the interior by Indian agents and the police to arrest any person who attempts to enter upon the Sioux reservation lands. A portion of the garrison from Fort Sully has been stationed at Pierre, with strict orders to head off "boomers" and intruders. Some railroad surveyors and employees are now on the reservation looking after the interests of the Northwestern railroad.

Near East Point, Ga., Thursday night a number of negroes were scourged with whips by "regulators," the victims making night hideous with their screams. The outrage was the result of the lynching of a negro boy for assaulting a white girl. The Legislature refused to pass a resolution denouncing the night raiders, but the Governor has offered a reward of \$100 for any person convicted of having taken part in the affair.

The grand jury in Fayette County, W. Va., has been investigating the lynching of Bill Turner, colored, and has unearthed a fiendish plot. It appears that Turner was hired to murder Charles West, a white man. Turner was captured and the men who hired him organized a mob and lynched him to prevent a confession. Influential men are implicated in the plot and three have already fled from their homes.

Dr. Llewellyn A. Powell has been convicted of manslaughter for killing Ralph Smith at Redwood City, Cal., two years ago. Smith was editor of a paper at that city and published an article to which Powell took exception. When the men met a quarrel ensued, in which Smith was killed. Powell was tried twice in Redwood City, but the jury disagreed both times. A change of venue was taken to San Francisco.

Bob Younger, the Missouri outlaw, is lying in a strop on the penitentiary at Stillwater, Minn. He does not now recognize even his sister, who has been at his bedside constantly for two months. Dr. Merrill says he will probably die in the next twenty-four hours, though he may live a day or two. His brothers Jim and Cole, serving life sentences with him, are vitally affected. They are allowed to be with him a large part of the time.

The preliminary steps were taken Wednesday at Knoxville, Pa., for a combination of all the coke producers outside of the Frick and McClellan companies. The small producers think that they can only compete with the large

companies now controlling the region by banding together in this way, and that with their 1,500 ovens they will be able to get better transportation and other rates than they could alone. The demand for coke exceeds the supply and it is understood that the price for October will be \$1.50 per ton.

The national bankruptcy congress which was in session at Minneapolis adjourned Wednesday, subject to the call of the chairman. The committee on bills decided that the question of a trustee receiving pay after having been removed for cause should be left to the court, and that if an assignment was proved to be fraudulent the bankrupt should not be discharged by the court. Several unimportant amendments were made to the Torrey bill, and a committee of five was appointed to urge President Harrison to recommend it to congress.

While grading a street on a high hill in Sidney, Ohio, Friday, a huge stone wall was unearthed where no one ever saw buildings. It is about ten feet wide on top, increasing in width as the excavations are made, and is supposed to be about twenty feet high. It is built of "unmixed" blocks, of which over 300 loads have been hauled out. The hill at the point of discovery is seventy feet above the level of the town. The stones were found about four feet under the surface, being accidentally struck while cutting a grade. It is supposed to be the work of moundbuilders.

The Johns Hopkins University, the pride of Baltimore and the state of Maryland is in financial distress. From the proud position which a magnificent endowment and a princely income had given it, it has fallen to a place where the salaries of its teachers must be cut, and its trustees must pass the hat and beg for money. Its founder, the kindly old quaker, gave to this university millions of dollars and an income amounting almost to hundreds of thousands. Out of all there can now be found a pile of school buildings, a breadth of farm land that is worth no more than when he died, and a pile of paper representing shares in the Baltimore & Ohio, a railroad not paying dividends.

A monster tidal wave created havoc on the Far Rockaway beach Sunday. The sea which had been rolling high, began to increase, coming in large billows shoreward and breaking in thundering roars on the beach. There were large crowds watching the sea at what they supposed was a safe distance when at about 4:30 o'clock a tidal wave rolled upon the beach, several feet beyond the previous high-water mark. It broke over at least 2,000 men, women, and children who were sitting, walking, or standing on the strand. It came unperceived by the great majority, and although there was a general scramble to get beyond its reach but few were successful in wholly escaping its grasp. The great majority of the crowd suffered a thorough drenching.

Three hundred people were killed and about 1,000 injured, many fatally at Antwerp, Friday, by the explosion of a large quantity of dynamite in the Carvelian factory yesterday. The factory was located immediately adjoining several large petroleum warehouses, in which were stored 80,000 barrels of oil. These warehouses were set on fire, and in less than an hour an area of about two acres was in flames, the loss being estimated at many millions. The factory was located in the vicinity of the bourse, which at the time of the explosion was crowded. Burning fragments of the factory were hurled against the bourse, setting it on fire and creating a panic among the members, several of whom were injured. Many persons in and near the building were also badly wounded. The fire which started in the cartridge factory on Friday has at last been extinguished. Several more corpses have been found and the number of the dead will certainly reach 200. King Leopold and the cabinet ministers visited the hospitals Monday where the sufferers by the fire are being cared for. The arrest of M. Corvillan, the proprietor of the cartridge factory, has been ordered.
