That is a fair sample of a "Table d'Hôte" dinner, such a one as I am at at the moment suffering from. They are awfully slow—it takes a full hour to get through with one. Between times, the people lean back and pick their teeth in the most open and above board manner, women as well as men, an operation that is not appreciated. This is really the only meal I have seen in Italy during the day. You lunch in the morning on butter and oleo in the morning, eat anything you can for dinner and fill up each evening from seven to eight, at the "Table d'Hôte." They never have butter for this meal, but the bread dry. It seems strange at first but one soon gets used to it. This has no butter at dinner—the universal custom wherever I have been when I got out of that prison. I was transferred to an Italian "posimento" where the food was sleek and smooth and nicely adjusted to the royal blood, all that saved me from being taken for a prince was the absence of the universal *muscate*. Speaking of a *muscate*, the Italian is the only man who knows how to wear and keep one. He never slobbers over it, it never gets in the gravy to be sucked dead; it never looks like the tangled undergrowth about the mouth of a cavern—in fact, he is the only man who can wear a mustache and still be neat and clean and not turn your stomach up on the opposite hill at meals. I forgive him for a great many things for this one bit of rare, unobtainable grace.

Monday at 4.30 and arrived at Genoa at 5.30. Next morning there, then went to Pisa. Climbed the leaning tower and went into its wonderful old Cathedral and Campo Santa, or burial ground, the latter adorned with most curious paintings representing torment of the damned, the torments of the living, the torments of Satan, etc. There was also a representation of the taking of Eve from Adam; the angel was pulling her hair full grown, only her feet left in Adam's side, and Adam appeared peaceful and unconscious. The artist's literal interpretation of the Bible story is very striking.

From Thak I came direct to Ranchi, seven hours' ride, 200 miles; arrived here yesterday noon and spent the afternoon in walking over the city and locating the Coosumam temple.

In the evening I went to see the full moon, very lucky arrangement on the part of Luna. The Coosumam temple large enough by daylight, but the red tinkling is just brought out at night. Gracious! but it was so long from home and some smoking of a fellow is always a temptation. I got a good view, learned my fate at once, and as usual put my hand to my eyes and nose and said, "Good evening." The thing happened and finally returned to my rooming place, Good evening. I have been told that my lot in the Coosumam temple is a good one, but I will leave you to predict of me. I am glad to hear you had travelled all day in your car and very pleasant. Heavens, coming riding to me—showed me the car and boasts there is for the state drivers, so outrageous as frequently to offend western notions of propriety. The display of apples, in the most awesome form ever appeared, in a quantity of quality, all being home-grown, so we mention some of the rarest. One straight branch 2 ft. long, without leaf or twig, carrying seven maturing apples, was of the King variety, the largest of the lot. The red, yellow and green fruit, being of a peck of glossy apples. Still a greater variety, a branch from an apple tree containing many blossoms, buds, fruit and a number of the matured apples. Also a branch of eleven light luscious apples, which were large and heavy, the weight of eleven egg plums; a plate of fine egg melons and a nest of double-yolk eggs laid by a cross of Langshan and a Brahma. These received the attention they deserved.

The vegetable boothman was tired of completing all kinds of reports. A grand show of potatoes, some new and rare varieties that were conspicuous for their size; onions, tomatoes, and beans were unsuitably fine. Three heads of cabbage, weighing respectively 8, 8, 14 and 20 lbs.—everything was equal—good. Grains, samples of many kinds there, making the display a good one.

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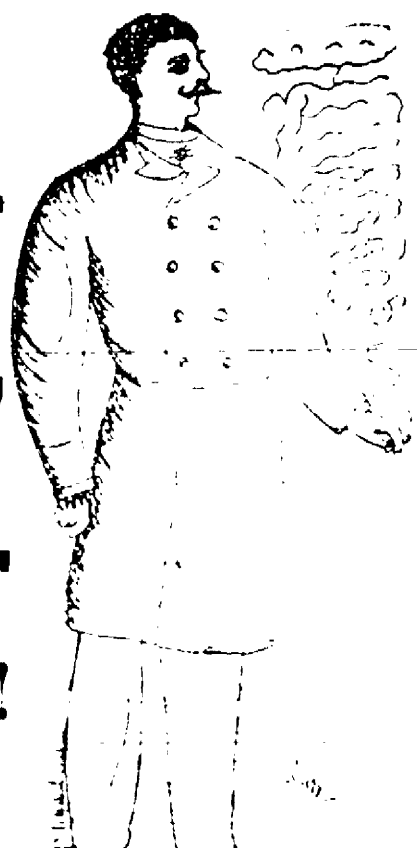

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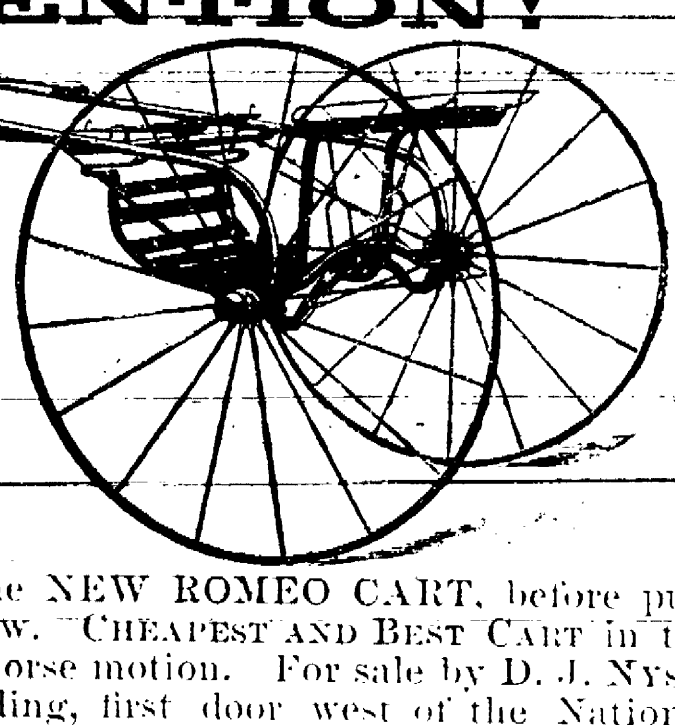
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
