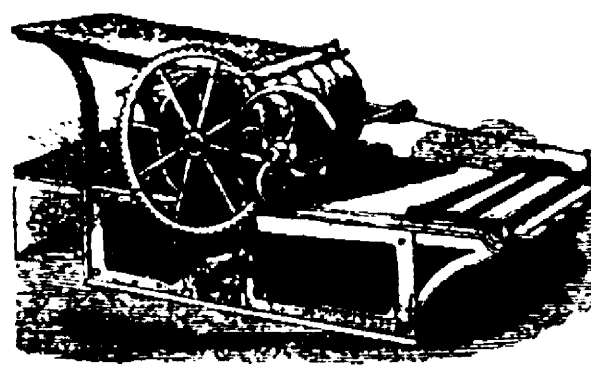

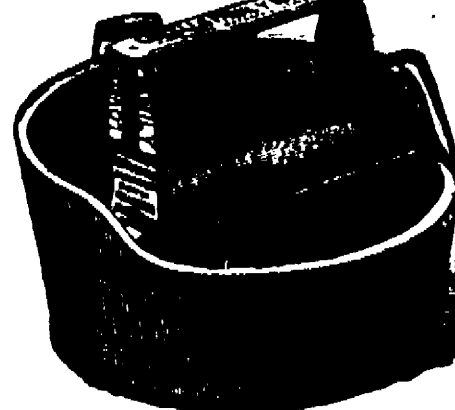

Old Time Elections.

In these days of legislative attempts to reform ballot box corruptions it is interesting to learn how voting at elections was done in times when the ballot box was respected. Gen. Z. E. Priest, of Herkimer Co., N. Y., some two years ago gave the following description of the manner of conducting elections in that State when he was a young man, and doubtless some readers of The Press may remember the same times:

"The election continued for three days, instead of being finished in one as at present. The three Town Assessors constituted the Board of Election Inspectors, and each one would take charge of a ballot box, one taking the State, another the county, and the other the Congressional box. On the morning of the first day of election they would begin taking votes, say at Palm's Hollow; then in the afternoon they would drive to Jacksonburg to accommodate all who lived in that neighborhood. The next morning they would be at Little Falls, and so on. After the election was over for the day, the hole in the lid of the ballot box would be carefully covered with a piece of paper and each inspector would seal the box under his charge. Then Inspector No. 1 would give his box to No. 2, and No. 2 hand his to No. 3, and so on, but each one would retain the key belonging to his own box. The ballot boxes were then conveyed to the houses of the inspectors where they would be kept during the night. In the morning they would be brought back. Each inspector would look at the seal on his box to see that it had not been tampered with, and unlock it to see that everything was all right. Then the polls would again be opened. General Priest says that in those days no one seemed to think of such a thing as stuffing the ballot box, and it was perfectly safe."

GENERAL NEWS.

The Chicago (Wau) Mutual Insurance Company has decided to go out of business rather than to submit to the ruling of Insurance Commissioner Chubb that the State law, requiring that 50 per cent of its cash receipts should be set aside for reinsurance, must be complied with.

Nick Schaeffer was convicted at Topeka, Kan., Tuesday of violating the State prohibition law by selling hard cider. Judge Guinn in charging the jury said it was a violation of the law to sell hard liquor, under whatever name, which contained as much as 6 or 10 per cent of alcohol.

Lawyer Ryan of Milwaukee has cast off his pretty young wife. He says he caught her at a private wine party, in company with a Mr. Falk, a Mr. Brand, and a young woman, at a road house near Milwaukee last Wednesday night. All the interested parties are well known in Milwaukee society.

Near Beaver Falls, Pa., Wednesday morning, a freight train dived into the rear of the Chicago limited express, east-bound on the Fort Wayne Road. The passengers escaped with ease and bruises, but a brakeman was killed, and the engineer and fireman of the freight were seriously wounded.

It has been ascertained that the Trademans Bank, of Conshohocken, Pa., is hopelessly involved by the embezzlements of the absconding cashier, W. H. Croson, whose shortage will reach \$90,000. The concern will be wound up, but it is reassured that depositors will lose nothing.

The two-mile steel bridge of the Illinois Central Road spanning the Ohio River at Cairo, was formally tested on Tuesday, a number of officials and invited guests being present. The test was in every way satisfactory, and the first regular train crossed the structure.

Gov. Mollette, of South Dakota, in speaking of the policy of the government in the new State, says the strictest economy will be necessary. He estimates the total revenue at \$2,000,000, a sum to the amount of \$200,000, he says, is necessary. In relation to a patron the governor holds that the territorial laws are in force until superseded by acts of the state legislature. The governor is a commissioner to conduct the election in sealed packages, and a contribution made by county officers.
