Latterly he has busied himself around his brother's farm just south of this city, in which he seemed to take great pleasure. He was quiet, unassuming, and much respected. Funeral services took place at the family residence, Tuesday, Rev. D. W. Sharts officiating. Burial in Oakhill cemetery.

Late Tuesday night the examination of the women supposed to be Mrs. Bender and her daughter Kate was concluded at Owosso, Kan., the Justice deciding to hold the suspects without bail to the grand jury, causing much surprise to the general public, who do not believe that the women have any connection with the Bender family.

It is stated that the Cherokee Live Stock Association, fearing that the threat of the Secretary of the Interior—that they would be removed by force from springing they did not vacate the Cherokee cattle voluntarily—would be carried out, are gradually marketing their cattle, and expect to dispose of the bulk of their stock before the Secretary's order goes into effect.

Edison's company is formed and plans completed for placing phonographs in the various postoffices in Mexico, for the accommodation of persons unable to write. Talking will be done in the phonograph and the cylinder containing the message will be forwarded by mail to the party designed, who can receive it through a phonograph or have it transcribed at his pleasure.

The independent oil deal in the Ohio field reported a few days ago has been completed. It embraces the reorganization of the Cleveland Oil company with a capital stock of \$800,000 and leases on 40,000 acres of valuable land. The principal movers in the deal are Ohio and Pennsylvania oil men. A pipe line to some convenient shipping point is contemplated, and it is probable that the refineries will be erected in the field.

Fire is raging in the Anaconda copper mine at Butte, Mont. It broke out Saturday in the cross-cut of the St. Lawrence mine. The drift sucked the sparks and cinders into the Anaconda, and a perilous blaze soon developed in the 800-foot level of the latter. A great many men were at work here and it is believed that nearly all have perished. Besides these, four men lost their lives in trying to effect a rescue.

Finding fortune in Fulton street, New York, Mrs. Hannah B. Southworth, a widow, shot and killed Stephen Pettus, a merchant, who was also Secretary and Treasurer of the Brooklyn Union Elevated Railroad. The woman alleges that four years ago her victim drugged and assaulted her; that later he aided in procuring malpractice to hide her shame, and after that failed to keep his promise in other respects. When arrested and examined the woman gave evidence of serious mental trouble.

COMMON COUNCIL.

Regular meeting Monday evening, November 25, Mayor Fremont presiding with all the Aldermen in attendance. A petition was presented, signed by A. J. Patterson and a number of business men, asking for the construction of a 10 foot sidewalk on the south side of Main Street, from Washington Street west to the river bridge. Referred to proper committee.

Accounts were presented amounting to about \$2,737.00; \$2,523.40 was for water works purposes.

City Marshal's report was presented for the past two weeks; amount expended \$48.86. Report accepted.

The Clerk presented the following report from the water works committee:

To the Honorable Mayor and Common Council:

GENTLEMEN:—Below find statement of amount of due on contract:

Bourbon Copper and Brass Works \$327.00
 Galvan Valve and Hydrant Co. 153.90
 Gordon Steam Pump Co. 1,741.00

Total, \$2,222.50

These amounts are due six months after completion and final test of work.

The Gordon Steam Pump Co., when machinery and boilers are set up in running order, \$1,000.00.

D. M. Atkinson, P. & F. Co., on completion of contract and adjustment \$1,810.30.

Detroit Pipe and Foundry Co., inside of 30 days \$2,500.00.

The committee reported favorably on the petition to grant Melvin & Berry, road cart manufacturers, a bonus of \$500 to help them erect new buildings.

After remarks it was moved to lay the report on the table for one week.

The committee on water rates made a report which was accepted and a report.

A resolution was presented and passed for the opening of a street in West Owosso to be known as Lyon Street.

The water works committee was instructed to purchase a tapping machine for the tapping of water mains.

The committee on fire department was authorized to purchase the West Owosso land building and have the same moved to land leased from M. Wood & Co., to be used as a house, also for election purposes, the building to be known as house No. 2.

A communication was presented from the water works committee asking the council to authorize them to handle the case of Myers & Son against the city, until the water works are turned over to the city. Moved that the same be laid on the table. Carried.

An application from Henry Robbins & Son for a license for doing plumbing was presented. The application was granted.

The clerk was instructed to draw an order for \$6,000 for 30 days, from Second National Bank, at 7 per cent. interest, to be placed to the credit of the water works fund.

The clerk was instructed to have 1,000 copies of the water works ordinance and the water rates printed.

which is placed at \$10,000,000.

R. G. Wood, who gained notoriety

through alleged connection with the

Ohio ballot-box contract forgery, has

been arrested at Cincinnati, charged

with libel. It is thought that General

Sherman, Ben Butterworth, and Gov-

ernor Elect James E. Campbell are

pushing the case against Wood.

On Thursday at New York a jury returned a verdict for \$41,000 against the Savings Life Assurance Society in favor of the widow of a man who was murdered in Mexico. The company had refused to pay the insurance on the ground that, by going out of the United States, the insured became liable for an extra premium.

Thursday at Pittsburgh the iron firm of Long & Co. and the Lawrence Bank failed for large amounts, the bank's liabilities being placed at \$700,000. Great excitement prevails among workmen who have deposits in the bank. The failure of the iron company, it is said, is not wholly responsible for the bank disaster.

Judge Brewer, of the United States Circuit Court at Topeka, has been called upon to test the validity of the Kansas laws forbidding the sale within that state of imported meats. It goes before him on a writ of habeas corpus sued out by L. A. Kieffer, agent of the Swift packing house, who was sentenced for selling the meat.

Sherman Aubrey, a simple-minded youth of 19, has confessed at Elizabethtown, Ky., that for 50 cents and an old watch he murdered his cousin, Ira Aubrey, whose body was found in a fence corner several days ago. The young man, whose story is doubted, says that the stepmother of his victim induced him to commit the murder.

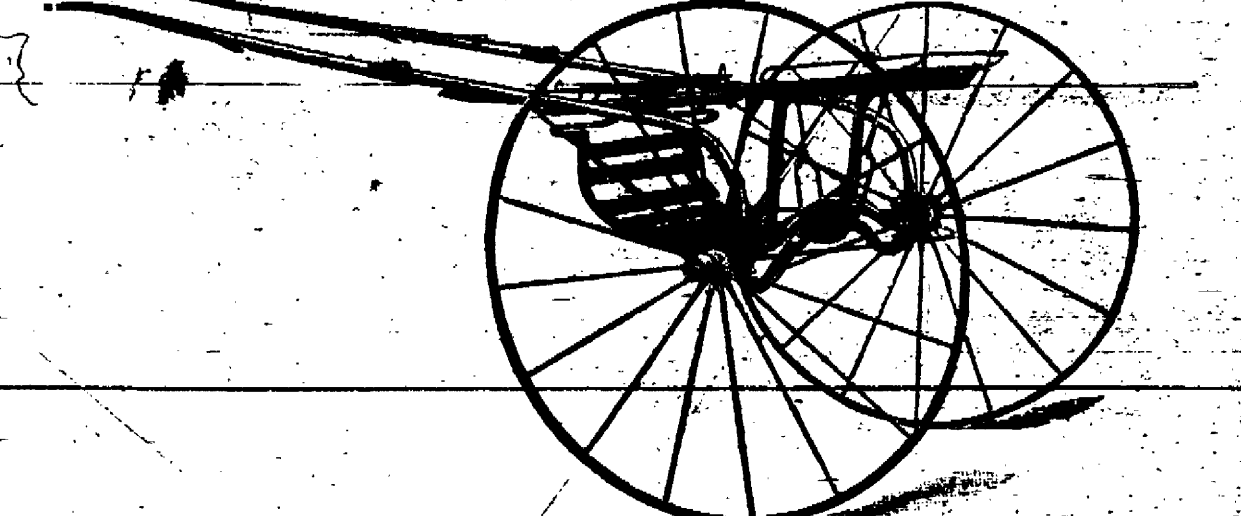
