



The national silver convention, in seeator ever anticipated. There are nearly 1,000 delegates. The primary object of the convention is to memorialize Congress on the following questions: The effect demonetization of silver has upon restoring silver to unlimited coinage; easibility and desirability of a more general use of silver as money, and other kindred matters. Thirty thousand dollars has been set aside for the enter-tainment of the delegates.

The question recently raised in a North Dakota land office by an attorney or the Northern Pacific railroad claiming the repeal of the Preemption law as to the four new States under Sec. 17 of the Omnibus bill is receiving no atten-tion in South Dakota. John Metcalf, a most wonderful proluction of the last century, was born at Knaresborough, Yorkshire, England, n 1777, says the St. Louis Republic. A calamity had overtaken him which would have benumbed the faculties of a less courageous man forever. When he arrived at man's estate he was owner of a house, a small farm, and a horse and carriage. At the age of 28 he was a well known carrier, engaged in the occupation of carrying persons through the crowded streets to and from places of amusement. In all this hazardous work he was as trusty as any man with two eyes, and got into but few difficulties from which he could not easily extricate himself. He became a great hunter and followed the hounds with as much pleasure and as surely as the most keen-eved hunter. He had his own horse, and began the study of surveying and bridge-building.
